4. Provide a brief description of your organization

Structure & Organization: The Rio Grande Watershed Conservation & Education Initiative (RGWCEI) is a Colorado tax exempt corporation organized exclusively for conservation and education purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code for nonprofit organizations. Nonprofit status was granted effective October 21, 2009.

All of the Board members of RGWCEI except for Mike Gibson are appointed or elected by the five San Luis Valley Conservation Districts, as follows: Center, Costilla, Conejos, Mosca-Hooper, and Rio Grande Conservation Districts – each of which are organizations constituting the Rio Grande Watershed Association of Conservation Districts (RGWACD or the Association). The tax exempt status of that predecessor organization is established with the IRS as a consortium of soil conservation districts.

RGWCEI is the successor organization which has taken over the conservation education activities of the RGWACD, a grass roots community organization which is not incorporated, but which consists of various members of natural resources, conservation, and basin-wide watershed groups. RGWCEI now has full responsibility to administer, fund, and expand conservation education activities throughout the Rio Grande Basin.

Purpose: RGWCEI works to expand knowledge, to improve educational resources, and to increase public understanding of resource conservation values and practices in the Rio Grande Basin and to build capacity for these activities by supporting a conservation education specialist and by raising additional funds as a nonprofit organization.

Request for funds: Funds are requested to support a Conservation Education Specialist to coordinate all of RGWCEI's activities. It is assumed that the WRSA funds will not be available until July 1, 2010.

Conservation Education Activities: This request for funding seeks \$25,000.00 in order to support a full time Conservation Education Specialist for RGWCEI for 2010 and 2011. With details below in the Scope of Work, this position designs, plans, implements and administers the following: educating youth throughout San Luis Valley's K-12 schools on natural resource and conservation issues; developing educational materials and curricula centered on conservation in agriculture; leading educational field trips for youth; coordinating the Colorado Association of Conservation District's 6th grade conservation poster contest in the San Luis Valley; coordinating the Soil and Water and Range Science sections of the Beaver Creek Junior Natural Resources summer Camp; providing in-the-field project learning opportunities for students in grades 6 through 12 so that they can participate in regional and state science and engineering fairs; and putting on the wonderfully popular celebration of the San Luis Valley Water Festival. The 60 teachers who were trained in the 08-09 school year continue to receive ongoing training touch-backs to enhance student learning and increase their level of awareness. The emphasis on conservation issues in 2010-2011 will be supported by the continued base programs of project learning, opportunities for students in grades 4-12, the annual poster and essay contest, the continuation of the summer Beaver Creek Junior Natural Resources Camp, and meetings and seminars with environmental, conservation and education groups. These along with the "Kids Water Festival" and "Junior Ranger Day" will continue to be apart of the teaching with pre-lesson, classroom and field activities, and follow-up assessment activity, for a total of around 5 hours of student engagement per topic. The continued popularity of the program with teachers and improvement in student test scores demonstrate the increased teacher and student knowledge base accomplished by the program. With the now two year success of the Teachers Workshop and the growing interest from the public; a hand-on natural resources outreach program for the community is being developed for the spring and summer of 2010.

Focus on Water: These and similar activities represent a powerful educational focus on water. More than 75% of the Conservation Education Specialist's activities run parallel to the Rio Grande Interbasin Roundtable's Basin-wide vision of keeping a sustainable balance between limited water supplies and tomorrow's growing water demands for consumptive and non-consumptive needs. The full time commitment of a Conservation Education Specialist working with teachers, administrators, and students in all school districts of the San Luis Valley and community members is essential at this time if the future generations are to live up to the visioning statement of the Rio Grande Interbasin Basin Roundtable in its *Response to IBCC December 9, 2008*. Simply stated, our Roundtable seeks "to have a sustainable water resource while recognizing Colorado Water Law." Children and young adults understand this; they recognize the need for water at a basic level; they are articulate about their experiences in the outdoors; and their enthusiastic responses to the hands-in/hands-on programs of RGWCEI give hope for a more educated and engaged public on issues affecting the Rio Grande Basin's water and on achieving the Basin's vision for 2030 and beyond.

Raising Public Understanding: As stated above, RGWCEI is expanding its work beyond the school districts and into the wider communities that RGWCEI serves. Raising the level of public understanding on conservation issues compliments the work of the Rio Grande Basin Roundtable and the rich mix of informative and educational lectures, slide shows, and presentations which take place at its monthly meetings. Conserving water today and in the future requires educating today's communities, raising the overall level of public awareness and understanding of issues relating to the management of the Basin's natural water supply, and openly discussing and analyzing the issues faced by our communities as they struggle to satisfy changing demands within the Rio Grande Basin. Public education is critical as we prepare tomorrow's leaders to support the economic, environmental and community values and qualities which the people of the San Luis Valley attach to conserving land, water, range, and wetlands.

Need for Funding: With the exception of its Conservation Education Specialist, all positions in RGWCEI are non-paid positions. At the time of its incorporation, RGWCEI took over all funds of the Association designated for conservation education activities, consisting of more than 25% of that organization's total assets, or \$19,586.00. The community-based conservation organizations represented by the five San Luis Valley Conservation Districts have contributed \$2,000.00 per year for the past 19 years, with these funds earmarked for conservation education. This commitment will continue into the foreseeable future to this new nonprofit organization. This amount, however, is not

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sufficient to retain the full time employment of the Conservation Education Specialist.

This water activity is educational in nature. It in no way affects the current system of allocating water within Colorado, nor does it diminish, impair or cause injury to any property or contractual right created by intergovernmental agreements, contracts, stipulations, etc.. nor does it impair, limit or otherwise affect any persons or entities relating to the appropriation, movement, or use of water. Just the opposite. By educating the Basin's youth and extending that education to the general public, the RGWCEI contributes to reducing conflicts, seeking and resolving difficult compromises, and exploring local and regional alternatives to help close the gap between the Colorado's available water resources and the increasing demands made upon them.

b) The water activity underwent an evaluation and approval process and was approved by the Basin Roundtable (BRT) and the application includes a description of the results of the BRTs evaluation and approval of the activity. ¹ 37-75-102. Water rights - protections. (1) It is the policy of the General Assembly that the current system of allocating water within Colorado shall not be superseded, abrogated, or otherwise impaired by this article. Nothing in this article shall be interpreted to repeal or in any manner amend the existing water rights adjudication system. The General Assembly affirms the state constitution's recognition of water rights as a private usufructuary property right, and this article is not intended to restrict the ability of the holder of a water right to use or to dispose of that water right in any manner permitted under Colorado law. (2) The General Assembly affirms the protections for contractual and property rights recognized by the contract and takings protections under the state constitution and related statutes. This article shall not be implemented in any way that would diminish, impair, or cause injury to any property or contractual right created by intergovernmental agreements, contracts, stipulations among parties to water cases, terms and conditions in water decrees, or any other similar document related to the allocation or use of water. This article shall not be construed to supersede, abrogate, or cause injury to vested water rights or decreed conditional water rights. The General Assembly affirms that this article does not impair, limit, or otherwise affect the rights of persons or entities to enter into agreements, contracts, or memoranda of understanding with other persons or entities relating to the appropriation, movement, or use of water under other provisions of law.

² 37-75-104 (2)(c). 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Specifically describe how the water activity <u>either</u> furthers the Roundtable's basin-wide water needs assessment or meets a consumptive or non-consumptive water supply need identified in the Roundtable's working needs assessment.

This proposal requests \$25,000.00 to support the full time position of a Conservation Education Specialist for two years at \$12,500 per year. This will allow RGWCEI to improve and expand its focus on the Rio Grande Basin's consumptive and nonconsumptive water and natural resource needs and to build organizational capacity for its comprehensive program of conservation education. RGWCEI will do so using methods that have proven affective previously. For instance, last year this program developed resource conservation curricula for 14 school districts, trained 90 teachers, and directly involved more than 7,000 children in grades K-12 with hands-on conservation experiences. As a nonprofit emerging from a 20-year history of conservation education, RGWCEI mirrors the goals of the Rio Grande Basin Roundtable, supporting its basin-wide water needs assessment process, fostering conservation leadership, and building a solid base of public understanding of the complex issues involved in meeting this basin's main goal: bringing the Rio Grande Basin water supply and demand into balance while meeting the consumptive and non-consumptive needs. Expanding conservation education and creating a more informed public are essential steps in achieving this goal.

As indicated in the WSRA Funding Legislative Criteria, HB 05-1177 (37-75-104), each basin roundtable has powers and responsibilities that include the following: "(c) Basin roundtables shall actively seek the input and advice of affected local governments, water providers, and other interested stakeholders and persons in establishing its needs assessment, and shall propose projects or methods for meeting those needs." The value and potential effectiveness of this public feedback function depends on how well people understand and can articulate and deal with the extremely difficult issues relating to meeting and balancing the consumptive and nonconsumptive water needs in the San Luis Valley. Funding RGWCEI helps the Rio Grande Basin Roundtable to meet its legislative imperative to "(d) [s]erve as a forum for education and debate regarding methods for meeting water supply needs." It also benefits the Roundtable by eliciting greater and better informed public participation so that it can, "(e) [a]s needed, establish roundtable subcommittees or other mechanisms to facilitate dialogue and resolution of issues and conflicts within the basin."

With drought and climate issues looming and large scale agricultural transfers occuring implemented, the State's rural communities are being deeply affected. Resource conservation education in the Rio Grande Basin's schools and throughout our watershed cannot be ignored, not only for the Rio Grande Interbasin Roundtable, but throughout Colorado.

It is clear that RGWCEI plays an important educational role, providing the Roundtable an extended six-county forum for the discussion of the water issues which are so critical to the people of the Valley.

This proposal therefore requests \$25,000 to support the position of Conservation Education Specialist, who will direct the activities of RGWCEI for 2010 and 2011, as described in the Statement of Work. Judy Lopez, who has worked in that capacity for 5 years with the Rio Grande Watershed

providers, and other interested stakeholders and persons in establishing its needs assessment, and shall propose projects or methods for meeting those needs. Recommendations from this assessment shall be forwarded to the Interbasin Compact Committee and other basin roundtables for analysis and consideration after the General Assembly has approved the Interbasin Compact Charter.

For 20 years the Rio Grande Watershed Association of Conservation Districts and its member agencies have worked to provide conservation education. The motivation for these past two decades has been the clear evidence that providing young people with quality comprehensive conservation education plays a major role in their becoming effective decision makers, community leaders, and managers of our natural resource systems. For the past two years, the Association's education program focused successfully on two major components to augment the core topic of "Resource Management": teacher training and the development of student curriculum. In 2010-2011this initiative will continue and the focus will be to expand teacher training, refine the curriculum for publication, and will broaden its scope by adding a series of community education events. An extensive bibliography of studies exists supporting the value of young people's involvement in the "outdoors classroom," and the curriculum developed by RGWCEI is a direct

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application of many scientific, economic, aesthetic, and moral studies which are relevant to this proposal.

This proposal requests \$25,000.00 to support the full time position of a Conservation Education Specialist for two years at \$12,500 per year. This money will be used to partially fund the salary of the conservation education specialist. WRSA funding will allow RGWCEI to improve and expand its activities to the broader community and to focus on the Rio Grande Basin's consumptive and nonconsumptive water and natural resource needs and to build organizational capacity for its comprehensive program of conservation education. Last year this program reached 14 school districts, trained 90 teachers, and directly impacted more than 7,000 children in grades K-14. A new nonprofit emerging from a 20-year history of conservation education, RGWCEI mirrors the goals of the Rio Grande Basin Roundtable, supporting its basin-wide water needs assessment process, fostering conservation leadership, and building a solid base of public understanding of the complex issues involved in meeting this basin's main goal: Bringing the Rio Grande Basin water supply and consumptive and non-consumptive demand into balance. Expanding conservation education and creating a more informed public are essential steps in achieving this goal.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES Conserving water today and in the future requires educating today's communities, raising the overall level of public awareness and understanding of issues relating to the management of the Basin's natural water supply, and openly discussing and analyzing the issues faced by

our communities as they struggle to satisfy changing demands within the Rio Grande Basin. Public education is critical as we prepare tomorrow's leaders to support the economic, environmental and community values and qualities which the people of the San Luis Valley attach to conserving land, water, range, and wetlands

The position of the Conservation Education Specialist will be to accomplish the following each year of WRSA funding:

- Task 1. Provide and expand two levels of in-service training workshops for 60 teachers.
- **Task 2**. Increase the number of students and teachers attending the workshops by approximately 2 % and assess their mastery of scientific material as related to resource conservation in the real world.
- **Task 3**. Assist approximately 87 students annually in the completion of their projects for the 2010 San Luis Valley regional Science Fair and provide opportunities to compete in State and International fairs.
- **Task 4**. Conduct the 5th annual summer "Water Festival" that attracts 300 students from across the San Luis Valley, in collaboration with NRCS, DOWR, DOW, USBR and other agencies, with Valley teachers, and with visiting teachers from the teacher workshops providing hands-on sessions for kids -- all focused on water conservation and on the consumptive and non-consumptive aspects of water.
- **Task 5**. Hold Summer Camps open to valley youth ages 6-13 years old, giving children experience in the outdoors, with the Soil, Water and Range portions of the June Beaver Creek Youth Camp being an integral part of the educational experience. Children will begin to learn the various aspects of the outdoor ecosystems of Water, Soil, Range, Wildlife, and Forests.
- Task 6. Initiate a series of landowner workshops with learning experiences for small land owners centered on conservation planning and the small acreage. Topics include water management, cover crops and water tolerant landscaping. Develop an action plan for a community series. This will be completed in each of the conservation districts in the San Luis Valley, including presentations on the role and activities of the Rio Grande Roundtable, the water issues confronting the basin and related topics that will be available for presentation to the broader community. This will be accomplished by presentations to civic organizations, students at Adams State College, and Community meetings. The presentations will be designed so that they can be used by other members of the Rio Grande Basin's Water Community.
- **Task 7.** Provide Conservation Environmental Representation by serving as the conservation/environmental education voice at conferences, policy meetings, and local/state government planning sessions. Serve as the Rio Grande basin's conservation education voice.

Attachment 2 Insurance Requirements

NOTE: The following insurance requirements taken from the standard contract apply to WSRA projects that exceed \$100,000 in accordance with the policies of the State Controller's Office. Proof of insurance as stated below is necessary prior to the execution of a contract.

13. INSURANCE

Grantee and its Sub-grantees shall obtain and maintain insurance as specified in this section at all times during the term of this Grant: All policies evidencing the insurance coverage required hereunder shall be issued by insurance companies satisfactory to Grantee and the State.

A. Grantee

i. Public Entities

If Grantee is a "public entity" within the meaning of the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, CRS §24-10-101, et seq., as amended (the "GIA"), then Grantee shall maintain at all times during the term of this Grant such liability insurance, by commercial policy or self-insurance, as is necessary to meet its liabilities under the GIA. Grantee shall show proof of such insurance satisfactory to the State, if requested by the State. Grantee shall require each Grant with Subgrantees that are public entities, providing Goods or Services hereunder, to include the insurance requirements necessary to meet Sub-grantee's liabilities under the GIA.

ii. Non-Public Entities

If Grantee is not a "public entity" within the meaning of the GIA, Grantee shall obtain and maintain during the term of this Grant insurance coverage and policies meeting the same requirements set forth in §13(B) with respect to sub-Grantees that are not "public entities".

B. Sub-Grantees

Grantee shall require each Grant with Sub-grantees, other than those that are public entities, providing Goods or Services in connection with this Grant, to include insurance requirements substantially similar to the following:

i. Worker's Compensation

Worker's Compensation Insurance as required by State statute, and Employer's Liability Insurance covering all of Grantee and Sub-grantee employees acting within the course and scope of their employment.

ii. General Liability

Commercial General Liability Insurance written on ISO occurrence form CG 00 01 10/93 or equivalent, covering premises operations, fire damage, independent Grantees, products and completed operations, blanket Grantual liability, personal injury, and advertising liability with minimum limits as follows: (a)\$1,000,000 each occurrence; (b) \$1,000,000 general aggregate; (c) \$1,000,000 products and completed operations aggregate; and (d) \$50,000 any one fire. If any aggregate limit is reduced below \$1,000,000 because of claims made or paid, Sub-grantee shall immediately obtain additional insurance to restore the full aggregate limit and furnish to Grantee a certificate or other document satisfactory to Grantee showing compliance with this provision.

iii. Automobile Liability

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Automobile Liability Insurance covering any auto (including owned, hired and non-owned autos) with a minimum limit of \$1,000,000 each accident combined single limit.

iv. Additional Insured

Grantee and the State shall be named as additional insured on the Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance policies (leases and construction Grants require additional insured coverage for completed operations on endorsements CG 2010 11/85, CG 2037, or equivalent).

v. Primacy of Coverage

Coverage required of Grantee and Sub-grantees shall be primary over any insurance or self-insurance program carried by Grantee or the State.

vi. Cancellation

The above insurance policies shall include provisions preventing cancellation or non-renewal without at least 45 days prior notice to the Grantee and the State by certified mail.

vii. Subrogation Waiver

All insurance policies in any way related to this Grant and secured and maintained by Grantee or its Sub-grantees as required herein shall include clauses stating that each carrier shall waive all rights of recovery, under subrogation or otherwise, against Grantee or the State, its agencies, institutions, organizations, officers, agents, employees, and volunteers.

C. Certificates

Grantee and all Sub-grantees shall provide certificates showing insurance coverage required hereunder to the State within seven business days of the Effective Date of this Grant. No later than 15 days prior to the expiration date of any such coverage, Grantee and each Sub-grantee shall deliver to the State or Grantee certificates of insurance evidencing renewals thereof. In addition, upon request by the State at any other time during the term of this Grant or any sub-grant, Grantee and each Sub-grantee shall, within 10 days of such request, supply to the State evidence satisfactory to the State of compliance with the provisions of this §13.

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Attachment 3 Water Supply Reserve Account Standard Contract

NOTE: The following contract is required for WSRA projects that exceed \$100,000. (Projects under this amount will normally be funded through a purchase order process.) Applicants are encouraged to review the standard contract to understand the terms and conditions required by the State in the event a WSRA grant is awarded. Significant changes to the standard contract require approval of the State Controller's Office and often prolong the contracting process.

It should also be noted that grant funds to be used for the purchase of real property (e.g. water rights, land, conservation easements, etc.) will require additional review and approval. In such cases applicants should expect the grant contracting process to take approximately 3 to 6 months from the date of CWCB approval.
