The 2002 drought required the implementation of extraordinary measures to meet the needs of water users throughout the District

The winter of 2002 began as a dry winter, but not unusually dry. A dry and warm spring turned 2002 into a record dry year.

To meet water demands, District water users had to carefully manage existing storage, arrange for alternative supplies, reduce demands to minimum critical levels and develop new partnerships.

The efforts of the District and its water users were successful, maybe too successful. Despite the severity of the 2002 drought, with the exception of the agricultural sector, most District residents were not inconvenienced. Questions remain as to whether or not the District is better prepared to live through the next severe drought.
