In accordance with Article VIII E (I), the amount of such budget payable by the State of Colorado is sixty percent thereof, or \$4,332.00, and the amount payable by the State of Kansas is forty percent thereof, or \$2,888.00.

Pursuant to provisions of the Compact (Article VIII-E (3)), and of the By-Laws of the Administration (Article VII (5)), the receipts and disbursements of the Administration have been audited for the period commencing November 1, 1962 through October 31, 1963, the end of the Report-year. The report of such audit is hereto attached as Appendix "A".

6. Cooperative Studies and Activities

(a) Article VIII G (1) of the Arkansas River Compact requires the Administration to cooperate with the Chief Official of each of the States of Colorado and Kansas charged with the administration of water rights in their respective States, and with the Federal agencies in systematically determining and correlating the facts pertaining to the flow and diversion of the waters of the Arkansas River and to the operation and siltation of John Martin Reservoir and other related structures. Article VIII-G (2) requests the Director of the United States Geological Survey, the Commissioner of the United States Bureau of Reclamation, and the Chief of Engineers, United States Army, to cooperate and collaborate with the Administration and with appropriate State officials in such determinations and correlations of streamflow and related data. Under the By-laws of the Administration, these cooperative studies and activities are assigned to the Engineering Committee of the Administration.

(b) During the year covered by this report, the Administration has received excellent cooperation from all agencies referred to in the foregoing provisions of the Compact. The Corps of Engineers continued to operate John Martin Reservoir in accordance with the terms of the Compact and the orders of the Administration. In addition, the Corps furnished a revised capacity table for John Martin Reservoir for use beginning November 1, 1962. The United States Geological Survey has continued the operation of the Compact gaging stations and the analyses and compilation of hydrologic data presented in this report and used in the administration of the Compact.

7. Water Supply, Reservoir Operation and Hydrologic Data

No reservoir water was in storage on November 1, 1962 at the beginning of the compact year. Winter water stored at midnight March 31, 1963 was 23,189 acre feet. Irrigators in both Colorado and Kansas demanded release of stored water on April 1, 1963 and releases were started at 8:30 A. M. on that date. Colorado's 600 c.f.s. and Kansas' 400 c.f.s. demands emptied the reservoir at midnight April 12, 1963. With the exception of a small amount of flood storage for five days in late September the reservoir remained empty for the rest of the summer irrigation season.

8. Gaging Stations

Stream-flow records of satisfactory accuracy were obtained at all of the Compact stations. Emphasis was continued on performing additional field work and providing stream-flow data to the Administration and the State officials on a current basis.

Conditions at the station on the Arkansas River at Las Animas remained unfavorable because of the channel by passing the gage. The varying percentage of the flow in this channel made it difficult to maintain current stage-discharge relations for operation. The station should be relocated or channel improvements effected as soon as bridge plans of the Colorado State Highway Department and channel improvement plans of the Corps of Engineers are firm.

No action has been taken on replacement of the radio stage-reporting equipment at the two State line stations. Although this equipment operated satisfactorily most of the time, it is not dependable because of obsolescence and should be replaced with modern radio or telephonic equipment. The installation of radio stage-reporting equipment at the

two inflow stations at Las Animas to facilitate and improve reservoir operations during summer flash floods is planned if the necessary additional funds are provided by the Colorado and Kansas legislatures.

The Administration approved a cooperative agreement with the U. S. Geological Survey for fiscal year July 1, 1963 to June 30, 1964 for \$7,600, \$3,800 from each party. Twelve hundred dollars is for the full operation of the Compact gaging station at Lamar, \$2,400 for partial support of the other five Compact gaging stations, and the remaining \$4,000 for partial procurement of radio equipment for the two inflow stations at Las Animas.

9. Findings of Fact by the Administration

- (a) A special Telephonic Meeting of the Administration was held April 8, 1963 in accordance with Article IV, 3B, of the by-laws for the purpose of declaring the reservoir empty. As a result of this meeting it was decided that the reservoir would become empty on April 12, 1963. Notice was given to the State Engineer of Colorado that unless a change of conditions justify cancellation or modification of this notice, he is required under terms of the compact to administer the rights of water users in Colorado in the manner and for a period of time as set forth in Article VF of the Compact. The reservoir was officially declared empty at 12:00 P.M. April 12, 1963, and the Colorado State Engineer and Division Engineer were duly notified.
- (b) The Secretary was notified Saturday evening, September 21, of some floods in the Purgatoire and, also, some water in the Arkansas at Las Animas. On Sunday, September 22, the Secretary made a trip to the reservoir and upon finding 1,000 cfs being discharged at about 2:00 P.M., decided to drive on up to the gaging stations on the Purgatoire and Arkansas Rivers near Las Animas. He found a considerable flood in the Purgatoire; also, there had been some high water at the gaging station on the Arkansas near Las Animas. With this information at hand, the Secretary decided to call a special telephonic meeting which was held in accordance with Article IV, 3B of the by-laws of the Administration for the purpose of declaring water available for storage in John Martin Reservoir. Water was declared to be available and the gates were adjusted at 5:00 P.M. to discharge 1,000 cfs which was demanded by Colorado and Kansas. State Engineer, J. E. Whitten, for Colorado was notified, as was F. C. Snyder, Division Engineer, at Pueblo.
- (c) A special Telephonic Meeting was held by the Administration on September 24, 1963 in accordance with Article IV, 3B of the by-laws for the purpose of finding the reservoir empty. The reservoir was found to become empty on September 26, 1963. Notice was given to the State Engineer of Colorado that priority administration would commence on that date, unless a change of conditions justified cancellation or modification of this notice. Priority Administration should commence and

decreed rights of water users in Colorado would be administered by the State Engineer. The reservoir was officially declared empty at 3:30 P.M. on September 26, 1963.

The above Findings and Notifications were similar to those published in the Fifth Arkansas River Compact Administration report of 1953, Appendix C.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the receipts and disbursements of the Arkansas River Compact Administration for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1963. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The receipts and disbursements, on a cash basis, are shown in Exhibit A. The receipts shown in Exhibit A represent two years allocations from Colorado and Kansas. The assessments for the year ended October 31, 1962 were not received and deposited until November of 1962 and; therefore, were not recorded until the current year. The assessments for the current year were received in September of 1963.

The disbursements were all supported by vouchers, cancelled checks, and authorization for payment in the minutes of the Compact's meetings.

SCHEDULE 1

The receipts and disbursements for the budget year of July 1, 1962 to June 30, 1963 as compared with budgeted items for that year are shown in Schedule 1. This differs from the report year of November 1, 1962 to October 31, 1963 and is the result of combining the receipts and disbursements for the appropriate months of the current and previous report years.

APPENDIX "C"

CHANGES IN BY-LAWS

Due to an oversight, the Fourteenth Annual Report for the Compact year ending October 31, 1962, did not include information on two changes that were made in the By-Laws.

The first change was made at the regular meeting held on March 27, 1962, proper notice having been included in the call for the meeting. By vote of the Administration, Paragraph 7, Article IV, of the By-Laws was changed to read as follows:

"7. A quorum for any meeting of the Administration and the casting of votes by representatives of the States on the Administration shall be in accord with Paragraph D of Article VIII of the Arkansas River Compact; and any action by the Administration shall be determined by vote as required by such Paragraph D of Article VIII of the Compact. If a quorum is not present at any meeting, the members of the Administration present, one or more, may adjourn from time to time without further notice until a quorum is obtained."

The purpose of this change was to provide a means for postponing regularly-scheduled meetings when a quorum cannot be or is not present.

The second change was approved at the special meeting held in Colorado Springs on September 21, 1962, proper notice having been included in the call for the meeting. The purpose of this change was to eliminate the necessity for holding regular meetings on the fourth Tuesdays in March and July of each year. The change was accomplished by striking Paragraph 2 of Article IV of the By-Laws, renumbering subsequent paragraphs and making appropriate language changes so that Article IV now reads as follows:

MEETINGS

- 1. The annual meeting of the Administration shall be held on the second Tuesday in December of each year.
- 2. (a) Special meetings of the Administration may be called by the Chairman or, in the case of a vacancy in the office of Chairman or inability of the Chairman to act, by the Vice-Chairman. Upon the written request of two or more representatives, it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or Vice-Chairman, as the case may be, to call such a meeting.
- (b) Special telephonic meetings of the Administration may be held by telephonic communications between the several members of

the Administration in respect to all matters arising under Article VF of the Compact; Provided that such special telephonic meetings may be called by the Chairman, Vice-Chairman or any member of the Operations Committee, and in any case at least two representatives of each State shall participate personally in such special telephonic meetings and concur in the action taken as a result of any such meeting. And provided further, that the Secretary of the Administration shall prepare minutes of any special telephonic meeting and such minutes shall be acted upon by the Administration at the next Annual meeting or special meeting held under sub-section (a) hereof.

- 3. Notices of all annual meetings of the Administration shall be sent by the Secretary, or in the case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, or the inability of the Secretary to act, by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, as the case may be, to the members of the Administration by ordinary mail at least ten days in advance of such annual meetings. Notice of special meetings shall be given by the Secretary to the members of the Administration by the most expeditious method so as to allow as much time prior to such special meetings as conditions permit.
- 4. All annual meetings of the Administration shall be held at the principal office of the Administration. Unless otherwise agreed to in advance by all members of the Administration, special meetings shall be held at the office of the Administration.
- 5. The Administration shall keep a record of the proceedings of all its meetings. The minutes of such proceedings shall be preserved in a suitable manner as directed by the Administration. Minutes of proceedings until approved by the Administration shall not be official and shall be furnished only to members of the Administration, its employees, and committees. Distribution of official minutes shall be made by the Secretary in accordance with directives of the Administration.
- 6. A quorum for any meeting of the Administration and the casting of votes by representatives of the States on the Administration shall be in accord with Paragraph D of Article VIII of the Arkansas River Compact; and any action by the Administration shall be determined by vote as required by such Paragraph D of Article VIII of the Compact. If a quorum is not present at any meeting, the members present, one or more, may adjourn from time to time without further notice until a quorum is obtained.
- 7. At each meeting of the Administration, the order of business, unless otherwise agreed, shall be as follows:

Call to order;

Reading of minutes of last meeting;

Approval of minutes of last meeting;

Report of Chairman;

Report of Secretary; Report of Treasurer; Report of Committees; Unfinished business; New business; Adjournment.

- 8. All meetings of the Administration, except executive sessions, shall be open to the public.
- 9. Any meeting of the Administration may be adjourned or continued from time to time and from the place set for the meeting to another place.
- 10. Public notice of all annual and special meetings shall be given in an appropriate manner, determined by the Administration, except in cases where the Administration determines to hold an executive session.
