
The Town of Rangely is very pleased that our grant presentation to the Yampa/White/Green River Basin Roundtable has been approved and recommended to the Colorado Water Conservation Board for consideration. Please find attached a detailed summary of the project, tasks and budget required to effectively complete our master planning for the flow study.

The Town currently operates a raw water irrigation system that supplies water to the parks, schools, college, hospital, town, golf course and cemetery properties. This system is efficient for the areas it serves and economical to deliver. The Town has had many inquiries from residents, businesses and non-profits as to the feasibility of expanding this system to serve the rest of the community. We have considered this possibility and are working to develop a master plan for this purpose.

Raw water has many benefits within our community in terms of utilizing untreated and metered water for the purpose of irrigation including, energy savings, chemical and infrastructure savings in the design and operation of the Town's water treatment plant. Residential usage of potable water for the average homeowner in Rangely indicates that roughly 50% of the annualized usage is applied to irrigation. The benefits to our current treatment facility is substantial as we assess the expansion of the raw water system in Rangely.

We believe that the Roundtable viewed our project as creative and beneficial for the community and we do thank them for their recommendation. Instructions

To receive funding from the Water Supply Reserve Account (WSRA), a proposed water activity must be approved by the local Basin Roundtable **AND** the Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCBC). The process for Basin Roundtable consideration and approval is outlined in materials in Appendix 1.

Once approved by the local Basin Roundtable, the applicant should submit this application **with a detailed statement of work including budget and schedule as Exhibit A** to CWCBC staff by the application deadline.

WSRA applications are due with the roundtable letter of support 60 calendar days prior to the bi-monthly Board meeting at which it will be considered. Board meetings are held in January, March, May, July, September, and November. Meeting details, including scheduled dates, agendas, etc. are posted on the CWCBC website at: <http://cwcb.state.co.us> Applications to the WSRA Basin Account are considered at every board meeting, while applications to the WSRA Statewide Account are only considered at the March and September board meetings.

The Town of Rangely will be conducting a flow study on its raw water irrigation system so that it will be able to better utilize its existing system and also to understand the capabilities of expansion. The study will include a complete review of the existing system, an investigation of the feasibility of an upper pressure zone and connecting other systems, and the analysis of components needed for expansion. This study will also include capital costs associated with the expansion of the system for the entire community of Rangely, Colorado. The funding from WSRA will be used to help fund approximately 50% of the flow study cost.

- a) The water activity is consistent with Section 37-75-102 Colorado Revised Statutes.¹

The flow study is consistent with Section 37-75-102 of the Colorado Revised Statutes. The Town of Rangely owns the necessary water rights for the expansion of the raw water irrigation system.

- b) The water activity underwent an evaluation and approval process and was approved by the Basin Roundtable (BRT) and the application includes a description of the results of the BRT's evaluation and approval of the activity. At a minimum, the description must include the level of agreement reached by the roundtable, including any minority opinion(s) if there was not general agreement for the activity. The flow study was presented to the Basin Roundtable on July 18th, 2012. The decision for approval was unanimous in the affirmative. The minutes of that meeting is attached to this application.

¹ 37-75-102. Water rights - protections. (1) It is the policy of the General Assembly that the current system of allocating water within Colorado shall not be superseded, abrogated, or otherwise impaired by this article. Nothing in this article shall be interpreted to repeal or in any manner amend the existing water rights adjudication system. The General Assembly affirms the state constitution's recognition of water rights as a private usufructuary property right, and this article is not intended to restrict the ability of the holder of a water right to use or to dispose of that water right in any manner permitted under Colorado law. (2) The General Assembly affirms the protections for contractual and property rights recognized by the contract and takings protections under the state constitution and related statutes. This article shall not be implemented in any way that would diminish, impair, or cause injury to any property or contractual right created by intergovernmental agreements, contracts, stipulations among parties to water cases, terms and conditions in water decrees, or any other similar document related to the allocation or use of water. This article shall not be construed to supersede, abrogate, or cause injury to vested water rights or decreed conditional water rights. The General Assembly affirms that this article does not impair, limit, or otherwise affect the rights of persons or entities to enter into agreements, contracts, or memoranda of understanding with other persons or entities relating to the appropriation, movement, or use of water under other provisions of law.

Past expenditures directly related to the project may be considered as matching funds if the expenditures occurred within 9 months of the date the application was submitted to the CWCB. The Town of Rangely will provide approximately 50% of the total cost of the flow study which is expected to be \$25,000.00.

Evaluation Criteria – the following criteria will be utilized to further evaluate the merits of the water activity proposed for funding from the Statewide Account. In evaluation of proposed water activities, preference will be given to projects that meet one or more criteria from each of the three “tiers” or categories. Each “tier” is grouped in level of importance. For instance, projects that meet Tier 1 criteria will outweigh projects that only meet Tier 3 criteria. WSRA grant requests for projects that may qualify for loans through the CWCB loan program will receive preference in the Statewide Evaluation Criteria if the grant request is part of a CWCB loan/WSRA grant package. The Town of Rangely has two decreed points of diversion points for its 1958 water rights (either water right may be diverted at either point) associated with the Case Number W3331. These are described as follows:

- A diversion from the White River, the New Water Plant facility point of diversion, which supplies water to the Town's domestic water treatment plant. The water treatment plant supplies the potable water needs of the community, including lawn irrigation.
- A second diversion point from the White River the Old Water Plant facility point of diversion, supplies non-potable water to the Town's bulk water users in the summertime. This source is not treated. It is used to provide irrigation water for the larger green spaces in the community, such as parks, schools, golf course, recreation, etc...


PAYMENT

Payment will be made based on actual expenditures and invoicing by the applicant. Invoices from any other entity (i.e. subcontractors) cannot be processed by the State. The request for payment must include a description of the work accomplished by major task, and estimate of the percent completion for individual tasks and the entire water activity in relation to the percentage of budget spent, identification of any major issues and proposed or implemented corrective actions. The last 5 percent of the entire water activity budget will be withheld until final project/water activity documentation is completed. All products, data and information developed as a result of this grant must be provided to the CWCB in hard copy and electronic format as part of the project documentation. This information will in turn be made widely available to Basin Roundtables and the general public and help promote the development of a common technical platform.
