## Instructions

To receive funding from the Water Supply Reserve Account (WSRA), a proposed water activity must be approved by the local Basin Roundtable **AND** the Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB). The process for Basin Roundtable consideration and approval is outlined in materials in Appendix 1.

Once approved by the local Basin Roundtable, the applicant should submit this application with a detailed statement of work including budget and schedule as Exhibit A to CWCB staff by the application deadline.

WSRA applications are due with the roundtable letter of support 60 calendar days prior to the bi-monthly Board meeting at which it will be considered. Board meetings are held in January, March, May, July, September, and November. Meeting details, including scheduled dates, agendas, etc. are posted on the CWCB website at: <a href="http://cwcb.state.co.us">http://cwcb.state.co.us</a> Applications to the WSRA Basin Account are considered at every board meeting, while applications to the WSRA Statewide Account are only considered at the March and September board meetings.

The owners of the irrigated and non-irrigated lands, and the lands embraced in the incorporated limits of towns, all situated within the limits of Jackson County, petitioned for the formation of the Jackson County Water Conservancy District under the provisions of Article VI of Chapter 149, Colorado Revised Statutes 1953, as amended, and the Jackson County Water Conservancy District was created by order of the District Court in and for the County of Jackson State of Colorado on the 7th day of November 1961. The board consists of 7elected directors, 1 from each division.

The Jackson County Water Conservancy District (JCWCD) was formed as a political subdivision of the State of Colorado and a body corporate with all the powers of a public corporation with the boundaries of the District being co-extensive with the exterior boundary lines of Jackson County, Colorado. The District was established to obtain, from water originating in Colorado, the highest duty for domestic uses, irrigation, and future development pursuant to the equitable apportionment provisions of *Nebraska v. Wyoming*, 325 U.S. 589 (1945) as modified in 345 U.S. 981 (1953) (the "U.S. Supreme Court Decree").

The proposed application is consistent with the Section 37-75-102 Colorado Revised Statutes. This project is seeking to identify and obtain water supplies in order to augment junior water uses in the basin, working within Colorado's current water rights allocation system. The current system of allocating water within Colorado will not be superseded, abrogated, or otherwise impaired by this project. Nothing in this project shall be interpreted to repeal or in any manner amend the existing water rights adjudication system, nor restrict the ability of a water right's holder to use or to dispose of that water right in any manner permitted under Colorado Law.

b) The water activity underwent an evaluation and approval process and was approved by the Basin Roundtable (BRT) and the application includes a description of the results of the BRTs evaluation and approval of the activity. water within Colorado shall not be superseded, abrogated, or otherwise impaired by this article. Nothing in this article shall be interpreted to repeal or in any manner amend the existing water rights adjudication system. The General Assembly affirms the state constitution's recognition of water rights as a private usufructuary property right, and this article is not intended to restrict the ability of the holder of a water right to use or to dispose of that water right in any manner permitted under Colorado law. (2) The General Assembly affirms the protections for contractual and property rights recognized by the contract and takings protections under the state constitution and related statutes. As a stated goal in the North Platte Basin Implementation Plan, the basin seeks to:

- Maintain and maximize the consumptive use of water permitted in the Equitable Apportionment Decree and the baseline depletion allowance of the Three State Agreement
- Increase economic development and diversification through strategic water use and development

The development of a basin-wide augmentation plan was identified as a planned project in the Basin Implementation Plan in order to meet these stated goals. During the Basin Implementation Plan development, the roundtable and local water users discussed the feasibility of the project, including potential sources for augmentation supplies, and potential uses to be augmented. Potential supplies and uses were not fully vetted during these discussions; therefore the first tasks in this scope of services will develop the full list of supplies and uses.

The goal of the project is to identify and secure several small augmentation supplies throughout the basin that would augment depletions in many of the major tributaries in the basin, including the North Fork North Platte River, Little Grizzly Creek, Grizzly Creek, Illinois River, Michigan River, Canadian River, and North Platte River mainstem basins (see Exhibit B for basin map).

The viability of each potential supply will be analyzed in terms of water availability during various hydrological scenarios, ensuring that new depletions augmented under this plan will not injure existing uses. Additionally, the technical consultants will work with the Division 6 office to ensure that each of the augmentation plan components are in full compliance with current administration in the basin.

2. Please provide a brief narrative of any related studies or permitting issues.

The feasibility of a basin-wide augmentation plan has not been previously studied in the North Platte Basin. The inclusion of the augmentation plan as a planned project in the North Platte Basin Implementation Plan was prompted, in part, by recent requests for augmentation water made to both Jackson County Water Conservancy District and the Division 6 office.

Additionally, the Statewide Water Supply Initiative (SWSI, 2007) reported a small water supply "gap" to meet future municipal and industrial development in the basin, yet also identified concerns over lack of growth and economic

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development in the basin. These recent requests, as well as reported basin water needs and concerns, indicate there is clearly a need for augmentation water in the basin.

The primary tools available to the District to analyze augmentation supplies and plan operations in the basin are the Colorado Decision Support System (CDSS) North Platte River Basin Consumptive Use and Surface Allocation Models. These models allow the technical consultants to quickly analyze a wide variety of augmentation plan supplies and operations in several locations to see how these new uses may respond to the existing users and under different hydrological conditions. These tools can be used to quickly explore the feasibility of several options and plan operations. The CDSS models and supporting documentation can be found on the State's CDSS website.

3. Statement of Work, Detailed Budget, and Project Schedule

Statement of Work, Detailed Budget, and Project Schedule are provided in Exhibit A

The statement of work will form the basis for the contract between the Applicant and the State of Colorado. In short, the Applicant is agreeing to undertake the work for the compensation outlined in the statement of work and budget, and in return, the State of Colorado is receiving the deliverables/products specified. Please note that costs incurred prior to execution of a contract or purchase order are not subject to reimbursement. All WSRA funds are disbursed on a reimbursement basis after review invoices and appropriate backup material.

#### REPORTING AND FINAL DELIVERABLE

Reporting: The applicant shall provide the CWCB a progress report every 6 months, beginning from the date of the executed contract. The progress report shall describe the completion or partial completion of the tasks identified in the statement of work including a description of any major issues that have occurred and any corrective action taken to address these issues.

Final Deliverable: At completion of the project, the applicant shall provide the CWCB a final report that summarizes the project and documents how the project was completed. This report may contain photographs, summaries of meetings and engineering reports/designs.

#### **PAYMENT**

Payment will be made based on actual expenditures and invoicing by the applicant. Invoices from any other entity (i.e. subcontractors) cannot be processed by the State. The request for payment must include a description of the work accomplished by major task, and estimate of the percent completion for individual tasks and the entire water activity in relation to the percentage of budget spent, identification of any major issues and proposed or implemented corrective actions. The last 10 percent of the entire water activity budget will be withheld until final project/water activity documentation is completed. All products, data and information developed as a result of this grant must be provided to the CWCB in hard copy and electronic format as part of the project documentation. This information

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will in turn be made widely available to Basin Roundtables and the general public and help promote the development of a common technical platform.
