

- Many uses compete for a limited amount of water.



### The Water Plan seeks to guide the development and protection of water resources support:

- Vibrant and sustainable cities.
- Viable and productive agriculture.
- Robust skiing, recreation and tourism industries.
- Efficient and effective water infrastructure promoting smart land use.
- A strong environment that includes healthy watersheds, rivers and streams, and wildlife.

Preparing for uncertainty in the climate, economy, population, and public values is a major challenge.



#### No & Low Regret Actions:

- Minimize permanent "buy & dry" of ag lands by supporting alternatives.
- Preserve options for developing unallocated water on the West Slope.
- Establish low to medium conservation strategies.
- Implement projects to support environmental and recreational uses.
- Support projects that are already planned.
- Implement storage and other infrastructure projects.
- Implement water re-use strategies.

Summarized from Colorado's Water Plan

#### Measurable Objectives in the Plan:

- Eliminate projected urban supply-demand gap.
- Achieve 400,000 acre feet/ yr of urban water conservation.
- 75% of Coloradans will live in communities with land-use plans that include watersaving actions by 2025.
- Agricultural productivity will keep pace with growing needs.
- Develop 400,000 acre feet of additional storage by 2050.
- Raise \$100 million annually for water projects, starting in 2020.
- Improve public awareness & engagement on water.

## Colorado Basin Implementation Plan

This plan was developed as part of the statewide water planning process by the Colorado Basin Roundtable, a group of water managers and stakeholders charged by Colorado's legislature with identifying and addressing local water needs.

The plan states that the Colorado River Basin Roundtable "envisions a Colorado River basin that is home to thriving communities benefiting from vibrant, healthy rivers and outstanding water quality that provides for all of the Colorado Basin's needs..."

"This document's strongest finding is that another major transmountain diversion of water from the Colorado mainstem to Eastern Colorado should be prevented as damaging to our recreational economy, environment and agriculture. Within Colorado, 15 major TMDs already move water from Western Colorado to the Front Range and Eastern Colorado. 450,000 to 600,000 acre-feet of water annually leaves the Colorado River system to support municipalities and farms east of the Divide."

### Colorado Basin Implementation Plan Themes:

- Protect & Restore **Healthy Streams**, Rivers, Lakes and Riparian Areas
- Sustain Agriculture
- Secure Safe **Drinking water**
- Develop Local Water Conscious Land Use Strategies
- Assure Dependable Basin Administration (Protect Shoshone call)
- Encourage High Level of Basinwide Conservation
