53 Welcome and Administrative

- 54 Chairman Czaplewski called the meeting to order at 9:30 am Central Time and the group proceeded with 55 introductions.
- 56
- 57 Czaplewski asked for agenda modifications, none were requested.
- 58
- 59 Czaplewski asked for the LAC's recommendation on the minutes of the May 27, 2015 meeting.
- 60

Shadle made a motion to approve the minutes from May 27, 2015 LAC meeting. The motion was seconded by LaGrange and passed unanimously.

64 GC Update and Other Committee Coordination Information

65 GC Update

66 Czaplewski updated the LAC on GC activities. The GC last met on June 9-10, 2015 in Cheyenne, WY.

- The GC discussed the 2014 State of the Platte Report, which reports progress on adaptive management
- ⁶⁸ hypotheses and things the Program has learned so far. The GC approved the new whooping crane
- monitoring protocol for the upcoming season. The USFWS gave a report on the annual PRRIP-related
- water consultations. The ED Office gave a presentation to the GC on the ice jam which occurred at the
- Shoemaker Island complex this winter. The GC approved the Public Access Policy and NGPC contract
- amendment for 2015. The GC meets next on September 8 & 9, 2015 in Kearney, NE.

- 74 Other Committee Coordination
- Farnsworth updated the LAC on recent TAC activities. The TAC and ISAC met jointly in July in
- 76 Kearney, NE. The main topic of discussion at this meeting was review and discussion of the State of the
- 77 Platte Report. They also discussed how to proceed with geomorphology and in-channel vegetation
- monitoring into the future. Remote sensing was discussed as a viable alternative to the current on-the-
- 79 ground transect methodology.

Kenny updated the LAC on recent WAC activities. The WAC met last on August 11 in Ogallala, NE.

- The WAC discussed the process for determining "times of excess" which is when water would be
- available in excess of target flows and able to be captured for later use. The WAC also discussed refining
 the process for determination of hydrologic condition.
- 85

Sackett updated the LAC on recently completed land transactions. PRRIP currently has 12,114.45 acres

- under control or contracted, which includes land in 8 of the 12 associated habitat bridge segments.
- 88

89 <u>Work Plans</u>

- Farnsworth discussed how the current land plan process works and how it might change into the future.
- PRRIP is in the middle of a lot of habitat decisions at the TAC and GC level that have impacts on how the
- land is managed. The LAC walked through each tract of land and discussed the key management actions
- and concepts going forward.
- 94 95 DeBoer:
- Plan is to excavate silt and organic matter from the low portion of the wetland to increase ponded area.
- 97 At this time, pumping is not part of the plan but will be reconsidered annually.

98	Liehs:
99	Wetland project completed. TAC and AMWG will discuss how to implement the flooded cornfield
100	concept into the wetland operations.
101	
102	Plum Creek Complex:
102	Sediment augmentation activities are likely to continue. Instead of pumping as in past years,
103	augmentation will likely occur via mechanical means (channel widening and pushing in islands). The
105	question of whether FSM can create habitat has largely been answered, and the GC is in the process of
106	deciding whether to continue to build islands in the channel and, if so, how much to build.
107	
108	Cottonwood Ranch Complex:
109	A lot of work has already been completed over the years at this property. It is very close in its current
110	condition to currently identified habitat needs. There may be potential for nesting islands, but primarily
111	the habitat on this tract will be maintained as-is.
112	
113	Elm Creek Complex:
114	As with Cottonwood Ranch, much of the major restoration work has already been completed. Some
115	potential for nesting island construction may exist, but mostly maintenance going forward.

117	Pawnee Complex:
118	This complex is the newest addition, and no management has taken place. The near future will consist
119	mostly of acquiring land through purchases, agreements, and easements to facilitate future management.
120	Over the next three years, this complex will be a focus for major restoration activities such as channel
121	widening and tree clearing.
122	
123	Fort Kearny Complex:
124	This complex is also just coming together and will be a focus over the next five years. There will be
125	challenges here working with and around neighboring landowners, but there is a fair amount of work to
126	be done.
127	
128	Shoemaker Island Complex:
129	There are no major restoration activities planned for the future at this complex. Future management will
130	consist primarily of maintaining habitat that has already been constructed and potential minor tree
131	clearing activities.
132	
133	Leaman East:
134	No further restoration activities planned. Property will be maintained as OCSW habitat.
135	The further restoration activities plainied. Troperty will be maintained as 000 W hashall.
136	<u>Alda Pit:</u>
137	Habitat was constructed in 2015 and will be maintained as OCSW into the future. As the pit is mined out,
138	more habitat will be claimed and maintained as it becomes available over the next several years.
