

The Colorado Rio Grande Restoration Foundation, a non-profit organization, is the fiscal agent for the Rio Grande Headwaters Restoration Project (RGHRP). The mission of RGHRP is to "restore and conserve the historical functions and vitality of the Rio Grande in Colorado for improved water quality, agricultural water use, riparian habitat, wildlife and aquatic species habitat, recreation, and community safety, white meeting the Rio Grande Compact." Since formed, the RGHRP has improved the condition of the Rio Grande by partnering with over 60 landowners and multiple ditch companies. The Colorado Rio Grande Restoration Foundation has twelve previous/current CWCB grants or loans.

The Del Norte Riverfront Project is a community-led effort to improve public access, create recreation infrastructure, and restore riparian habitat along the Rio Grande in the Town of Del Norte, Colorado. The project will encompass the following components:

- 1.) The improvement of 1,600 feet of riparian habitat on the town's property
- 2.) The reconnection of one acre of floodplain
- 3.) The installation of six aquatic habitat structures adjacent to the park
- 4.) The construction of a new boat ramp, access road, and parking area
- 5.) The construction of a new multi-use boating playwave with fish passage

Other funding amounts will contribute to this project including: San Luis Valley Conservation Connection Initiative 2016 (\$40,000), San Luis Valley Conservation Connection Initiative 2017 (\$19,900), Gates Family Foundation (\$75,000) Laura Jane Musser Fund (\$35,000), Rio Grande County (\$20,000), and the Great Outdoors Colorado LPOR Grant (\$344,700). Other CWCB funding includes the CWCB Severance Tax Grant (\$50,000). The Water Plan Grant would pay for 19.1% of the project.

The overall purpose of the Del Norte Riverfront Project is to foster connectivity between the communities and visitors of the San Luis Valley and the Rio Grande. The completed project will enhance the river ecosystem and make the river accessible to all by creating a welcoming, safe space for community members, boaters, and anglers. This will be done through the construction of formal river access, recreation infrastructure, streambank stabilization, and riparian restoration at the town park.

The Del Norte Riverfront Project is a structural project that seeks to connect the community of Del Norte and visitors to the San Luis Valley to the Rio Grande through the construction of formal river access, recreation infrastructure, streambank stabilization, and riparian restoration at the town park. Through these efforts, the Project will address environmental, recreational, and educational needs facing the Rio Grande Basin.

The Project will meet the following Rio Grande Basin Implementation Plan Goals (Rio Grande BIP, Chapter 3):

- 1. Protect, preserve, and/or restore the sustainability of the Rio Grande Basin watersheds by focusing on watershed health and ecosystem function.
- 6. Support the development of projects and methods that have multiple benefits for agricultural, municipal and industrial, and environmental and recreational water needs.
- 11. Protect, preserve, and enhance terrestrial and aquatic wildlife habitats throughout the Basin.
- Conserve, restore, and maintain wetlands and riparian areas for the benefit of a healthy watershed.
- 14. Maintain and enhance water-dependent recreational activities.

In addition to meeting many Rio Grande Basin Goals, the Project also meets several Colorado Water Plan Goals and directly addresses Critical Objective F.

The economy in the San Luis Valley is dominated by agriculture, with approximately \$325 million of agricultural products sold each year (Rio Grande BIP Executive Summary, 8). However, the Town of Del Norte is home to a budding tourism industry, with recently-opened mountain biking and hiking trails. The Rio Grande, a potential asset for fishing and boating, is largely disconnected from the Town despite its close geographic proximity. Supporting and diversifying local economies is key to the Colorado Water Plan (6-157, 10-3); the Project will improve the local economy by providing access to the river through hardened access points, a boat ramp, and a boating playwave. Additionally, fish habitat structures will be installed to improve fishing at the Project site.

The Project is a result of broad, community-led collaboration. First started when the Del Norte Trails Master Plan (Related Studies) laid out details for improvements to the riverfront park, the Project has gained immense community support, and has been shaped through the Plan and input from the public at community events. Recently, support for the Project has also been demonstrated through the awarding of Del Norte Chamber of Commerce's "Most Exciting Project" by public vote. The Project is a partnership between the following local organizations and businesses:

- Rio Grande Headwaters Restoration Project
- The Town of Del Norte
- Rio Grande County
- Upper Rio Grande Economic Development
- Del Norte Trails Organization
- Trout Unlimited
- Riverbend Engineering

Colorado Parks and Wildlife has also supported the Project through consultations about fish passage and environmental impacts, which have influenced Project designs. Each partner brings diverse experience and passion to the Project, ensuring that the Project addresses the needs of both the local community and ecology.



These relationships have resulted in a multipurpose Project, with environmental, recreational, and educational components and direct benefits to the Rio Grande and the Town of Del Norte. Habitat restoration and streambank stabilization on the Town's property and the installation of fish habitat structures will improve riparian and aquatic habitat for many forms of wildlife. Improved wildlife habitat will also create more opportunities for birders and anglers to enjoy the town park. Streambank stabilization will prevent erosion and improve water quality, benefitting water users downstream. The construction of the boat ramp, picnic area, access points, and playwave will create new opportunities for recreation for boaters and families looking to enjoy the river. Lastly, partners will engage and educate the local community through public events, meetings, and volunteer activities related to the Project. The multifaceted, multi-beneficial character of this Project includes many of the actions in Critical Objective F (Colorado Water Plan, 10-12) and meets Environmental Goals 3, 4, and 5 (Colorado Water Plan, 6-157), improving and protecting recreational interests and the environment.

Related Studies

The 2001 Study: The 2001 Study was prompted by local stakeholders when they realized the function of the Rio Grande was deteriorating. The 2001 Study analyzed the condition of the riparian area and structures along a 91-mile reach of the Rio Grande from the town of South Fork to the Alamosa – Conejos County line (Exhibit C). The 2001 Study was sponsored by the San Luis Valley Water Conservancy District and funded with a \$250,000 grant from the Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB). The study evaluated the condition of the river's functions as they related to:

- The condition of riparian habitat and fisheries;
- Accessibility of the river to existing irrigation structures and their condition and performance;
- The protection of lives and property;
- The protection of channel and flood plain from flood damage;
- The maintenance of river channel and over bank capacity;
- The ability to meet Rio Grande Compact requirements.

The 2001 Study found the primary cause of degradation to be sedimentation, and identified measures that could be implemented to holistically improve the river's functions. Along the project reach, there are several areas of degraded riparian habitat, disconnected floodplain due to alluvial berms, and poor aquatic habitat. The Project will employ riparian restoration and streambank stabilization, to improve wildlife habitat and water quality at the project site.

Del Norte Trails Master Plan: The Del Norte Trails Master Plan was a grassroots effort adopted in 2008 to outline objectives and values for trail management and expansion in and around Del Norte. The Plan highlights five key areas for trail expansion, including along the riverfront at the Project site, and identifies important projects, creating sub-plans for each area.

With regard to the riverfront site, the Plan details four main objectives (Del Norte Trails Master Plan, 11):

1. Enhance the existing Rio Grande Riverwalk Boardwalk and Fishing Pier Trailhead, including the installation of informational signs;



- 2. Extend and enhance the existing concrete (ADA) Rio Grande Riverwalk Trail, including providing areas for additional fishing, kayak put-in and take-out, and building a whitewater
- 3. Enhance the existing Town Parks;
- 4. Pursue rail-with-trail possibilities along the existing Railroad right-of-way.

The Del Norte Riverfront Project will use this community-generated plan as a baseline for Project goals, addressing objectives 1-3 by building the boat ramp and playwave and in later phases improving the parks with an amphitheater, nature play area, educational signs, and picnic area.

Water Project Overview:

Project Objectives:

The objectives of the Del Norte Riverfront Project are to:

- 1. Connect the residents of and visitors to the Town of Del Norte to the Rio Grande through the construction of hardened access points, a boat ramp, an access road and parking lot;
- 2. Improve local recreation opportunities through the construction of a multi-use boating playwave;
- 3. Improve aquatic habitat through the installation of six aquatic habitat structures;
- 4. Improve riparian condition by stabilizing 1,600 feet of streambank in the Project area;
- 5. Improve floodplain function and wetland habitat by reconnecting one acre of floodplain to the river;
- 6. Enhance water quality by reducing erosion and sediment input;
- Promote public involvement in river improvement and recreation activities through public education and outreach.

Tasks

Task 1 - Project Design and Permitting

Description of Task:

Complete designs and permitting for the Project elements, which include a rock boat ramp, a grouted rock boating playwave, aquatic habitat structures, streambank stabilization, and riparian revegetation.

Method/Procedure:

Riverbend Engineering, LLC completed the survey, preliminary designs, and final designs for the boat ramp, playwave, habitat structures, and streambank restoration and revegetation. Russell Surveyors was hired to complete a landowner survey of the project area. A wetland delineation and cultural resource survey were completed by Ecosphere Environmental Services for the US Army Corps of Engineers 404 Permit. Riverbend Engineering worked with project partners and the Town of Del Norte to complete all required permits with the US Army Corps of Engineers and town. Throughout the design and permit process, Riverbend Engineering worked with Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) to determine the appropriate design specifications for the playwave and aquatic habitat features. The playwave design includes fish passage for small bodied fish, such as the Rio Grande Chub, as requested by CPW.

Deliverable:

Final designs for the boat ramp, boating playwave, aquatic habitat structures, streambank stabilization, and riparian revegetation (Exhibit C). The three required permits include, US Army Corps of Engineers 404 Permit, a State of Colorado 401 Water Quality Permit, and the Town of Del Norte Permit for Floodplain Development.



Tasks
Task 2 – Construction of Boat Ramp, Parking Lot, and Access Road
Description of Task:
Construct the rock boat ramp, parking lot and gravel access road.
Method/Procedure:
The Town of Del Norte and CRGRF will hire contractors to build the boat ramp, parking lot, and access road through a competitive bid process. The contractor will construct the rock boat ramp by grading and shaping the site, placing large rocks with an excavator, and placing smaller rock rip rap for the ramp base. The parking lot and gravel access road will be built adjacent to the boat ramp. Designs for these elements can be found in Exhibit C.
Deliverable:
A new boat ramp, parking lot, and access road resulting in improved access to the Rio Grande.
Task 3 Construction of Playwave and Habitat Features
Description of Task:
Construct a grouted rock playwave, six aquatic habitat structures, and restore 1,600 feet of streambank and one acre of floodplain through streambank stabilization and riparian revegetation.
Method/Procedure:


The Town of Del Norte and CRGRF will hire contractors to build the grouted rock playwave, aquatic habitat structures, streambank stabilization, and riparian revegetation. Construction of the boating playwave will involve dewatering the river for construction and regrading the riverbed before placing large

rocks, smaller rock rip rap, and grouting the structure with concrete. A fish passage channel will be built into the playwave, allowing for the passage of small bodied fish. A rock grade control structure will be installed downstream of the playwave structure. Construction of the aquatic habitat and streambank stabilization structures will involve channel shaping both up and downstream, as well as the installation of rock habitat clusters, rock deflectors, and native material root wads. Following construction, riparian and wetland revegetation will include planting willow transplants. Additional revegetation will be completed by by Rio Grande Headwaters Restoration Project staff and community volunteers.

Task 4 – Monitoring
Description of Task:
Monitor the project site before and during construction. Monitor the site for two years following construction using the RGHRP Sampling and Analysis Plan (SAP).




Map 1: Project Location within the Rio Grande Watershed




Map 2: Project Elements and Location within the Town of Del Norte, CO




Del Norte, CO Town Map



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
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




Figure 2. The existing fishing dock is the only river-related infrastructure in the park. The project will construct new aquatic habitat next to the dock, improving fishing opportunities in the park. In addition, the planned playwave will be constructed in the stretch of river seen above.
