

The successful Arkansas Basin Roundtable PEPO Coordinator and Workgroup has been in existence since February 2016 and is complementary to the implementation of the ArkBIP and CWP. The group’s goal is to increase the public’s knowledge of water issues facing us today and into the future. A second goal of the program is to assist Colorado’s citizens to understand and get involved in water issues. PEPO’s Education to Action program utilizes outreach, education, and public engagement efforts to ensure that multi-faceted audiences have access to accurate information and are empowered to participate in stakeholder decision-making processes. With completion of the ArkBIP and CWP it is imperative that PEPO’s Education to Action program sustains its momentum for outreach and educational activities and funding for these activities are provided as ArkBIP and CWP identified projects are plan for and implemented.

Colorado’s Water Plan calls for an outreach, education, public engagement, and innovation grant fund in Chapter 9.5.

The overall goal of the Engagement & Innovation Grant Fund is to enhance Colorado’s water communication, outreach, education, and public engagement efforts; advance Colorado’s water supply planning process; and support a statewide water innovation ecosystem.

The grant application supports the implementation of projects and programs within the Arkansas Basin Implementation Plan (ArkBiP) and Colorado’s Water Plan (CWP) through education, outreach, communication, and participation utilizing various types of collaborations and partnerships throughout the entire Arkansas Basin. This application includes one task with six different projects and partners. Each project has its own goals and objectives that support the implementation of the ArkBiP & CWP.
Who is/are the target audience(s)? How will you reach them? How will you involve the community?
The target audience varies with each task and the location. For the most part, audiences will be the general public, policy and decision makers, and the stakeholders and beneficiaries of the ArkBiP identified water projects.

This application includes 6 different projects in collaboration with many different partners. The collaboration process will be inclusive to all interested parties. As a start the partners may be, the Arkansas Basin Roundtable, Arkansas River Basin Water Forum, Otero & Crowley County school districts, NRCS, 4-H clubs, Future Farmers of America, City of Pueblo, Colorado State Extension Service, Colorado State University-Pueblo, and six ArkBiP identified project partners.

What research, evidence, and data support your project?

The projects in this application all assist with the implementation of the ArkBIP and CWP. It would be difficult to cite specific research, evidence and data that supports each of the various projects. Although the CWP states that Coloradans are paying more attention to water issues today and are becoming increasingly aware of the limitations of our water supply. In a recent survey performed by BBC Research, more than 2/3s of those polled believe that Colorado does not have enough water for the next 40 years. In addition, the poll found that, despite concerns, most Coloradans are unaware of the main uses of water in the state and are uncertain about how to best meet our state’s future water needs. The ARBWF was created to generate dialogue among water users and decision makers in the Arkansas River Basin and is a leader in water education within the basin. It is our intention to use outreach, education, and public engagement provided by the PEPO Coordinator, the PEPO Workgroup and partners to help ensure that Coloradans have access to accurate information & are empowered to participate in stakeholder decision-making processes.

Short term challenges will be to keep all partners/projects informed and organized. Long-term challenges could be that some projects may not have sufficient funding in the future to move forward with planned outreach, education and public engagement projects or into implementation.

<p>The ARBWF is identified in the ArkBIP as an integral part of the education and outreach effort for the Arkansas Basin Roundtable. The partnership has brought diverse water interests together for fruitful dialogues for several years now. Both see the value in utilizing the ARBWF and PEPO to provide leadership for public education and outreach projects that further the implementation of ArkBIP identified projects.</p>
<p>Describe how the project achieves the basin roundtable's PEPO Education Action Plans.</p>
<p>As stated in the ArkBIP: "Through various methods of reaching out to the public, PEPO has been a catalyst to productive partnerships among community leaders, media outlets, and active citizen groups supporting collaboration across the basin." An important task listed in the current Ark Basin Roundtable's Education Action Plan is Task 1 - Participation, Partnership Building and Arkansas Basin Specific Education. Task 1 identifies the support, assistance, and guidance of the PEPO Coordinator for education and outreach events. Several groups have reached out to the Coordinator requesting support and/or expertise on water related education through their events. This provides an opportunity for Arkansas Basin specific education utilizing these events. The goal for this task is to engage the public on topics that have not been represented or misrepresented in the past which are identified in the ArkBIP and CWP. The PEPO Coordinator can learn through these experiences and identify areas of water resource education that need to be explored further. By joining these local programs, the PEPO Coordinator has an opportunity to provide water education to a larger audience and solicit participation for future PEPO events. The PEPO Coordinator also has an opportunity to build partnerships and gain sponsors for the implementation of PEPO sponsored Creek Week, Water Festivals, and Education to Action Events.</p>

Project Objectives:

1. ARBWF, PEPO, and partners will plan, coordinate and implement a new Community or Children’s Water Festival where such a program does not currently exist, and the partnership will continue to support existing festivals.
2. The goal is to have at least 50 volunteers, representing local partnering organizations participating in Creek Week on the Arkansas River. The event will connect people with the river and will encourage those who attends or observes these activities to consider the importance and value of the river.
3. Webisodes will be created that will address topics and areas of concern identified in the ArkBIP. The webisodes will be available on the Roundtables website and will be available to the featured ArkBIP identified projects to educate stakeholders and interested parties about the projects.
4. Support the annual ARBWF VIP Dinner and associated educational programs and materials that are provided to those in attendance.

5. The Education to Action Program will work as a platform to bring together key stakeholders to provide education and support regarding ArkBIP identified projects. It will assist projects in gaining exposure and support needed to move these projects forward.
6. Support for the PEPO Coordinator position. The PEPO Coordinator is responsible for the organization, coordination, task management, and reporting on all proposed educational ArkBIP projects.

Task 1 – Education/Outreach Programming
Description of Task:
<p>Community or Children Water Festival</p> <p>There is a need for increased education and outreach to our youth regarding water usage, quality, conservation, and history in the Arkansas River Basin. The PEPO workgroup is committed to providing communities with the necessary resources and tools to educate their citizens on water related topics. This program will provide education and outreach through community-led water festivals. The program will support and gain knowledge from existing water festivals in Trinidad, Salida, Buena Vista, and Colorado Springs, which PEPO has been very active in developing and/or supporting. The program will provide organization and implementation of a new water festival in Otero/Crowley Counties (where such a program does not currently exist).</p> <p>PEPO will pull on the partnerships already being developed in the Lower Arkansas Valley. Potential partners are Colorado Parks and Wildlife, La Junta and Ordway Parks and Recreation, Lower Arkansas Valley Water Conservancy District, Natural Resource Conservation Service, Crowley & Otero Counties Cooperative Extension, local school districts, City of La Junta, Town of Ordway, and Otero Junior College. PEPO and partners will plan, coordinate and implement a new Community or Children’s Water Festival where such a program does not currently exist.</p>
Method/Procedure:

Tasks

PEPO will secure partnerships in the lower Arkansas valley to plan, coordinate and implement a Water Festival that will take place in 2019. PEPO will provide resources, management, festival planning, outreach with local partners, project coordination, funding, volunteer organization, and implement the new Water Festival. PEPO will partner with the Colorado Foundation for Agriculture to utilize the Understanding Water Activity Book as an educational resource for teachers in preparation for the water festival.

Successful implementation of this program will build the foundation for water education that can be used for years to come. This program will give communities the necessary resources and tools needed to continue this educational effort on their own far into the future. This program will support the development and implementation of Children's/Community Water Festivals in areas where water festivals do not currently exist. The goal will be to connect with 100 - 250 individuals per community festival or 300 – 400 elementary students if a Children's Water Festival is chosen by the partners instead.

Creek Week Implementation on the Arkansas River

Creek Week is Colorado's largest cleanup event in the state hosted by Colorado Springs Utilities. The event occurs over 9 days and extends across all 8 communities within the Fountain Creek Watershed. Over the last 3 years, 5,000 citizens have been engaged to remove 30 tons of litter with the support of private, nonprofit, governmental partners and individuals. Watershed health is an important program and processes which is identified in the Arkansas Basin Implementation Plan. This project will assist in meeting the goals set by the Ark BIP.

In upcoming years, the PEPO workgroup wants to expand this program across the Arkansas River Basin. The PEPO Coordinator and Workgroup would be responsible for overseeing the river cleanup on the Arkansas River. Not only does a cleanup remove trash and plastics from the waterway, it also connects people with the river and encourages those who attend to consider where their trash goes when they throw it out.

The Creek Week cleanup expansion would be a collaborative event that brings together multiple volunteer groups in the community. To emphasize cleaning up on the river, PEPO would collaborate with the local schools and several other organizations to rally a group of volunteers to pick up trash along the river.

Planning for the event would begin in early February where we would reach out to local organizations. By mid-March, we would begin outreach efforts to other local organizations through social media, newsletters, flyers, and direct emails and conversations. The event would occur in May or June. Trash bags and gloves will be provided by in-kind donations and volunteers will be provided with lunch and given headbands to thank them for their service. All the trash that is collected will be hauled to the local landfill by one of the local trash haulers.

The goal is to have at least 50 volunteers, representing five local partnering organizations collecting trash specifically in the riparian area. We also plan to increase Creek Week participation in the community from published newspaper articles and flyers promoting the event in local towns.

Development of Educational Webisodes

The PEPO workgroup will partner with a local film maker to produce 10 – 15 minutes webisodes highlighting three of the tributaries in the Arkansas Basin and three projects that have been or are in the process of being implemented and supported by the Roundtable. The webisodes will be available on the story map located on the Roundtable's website. The three project specific webisodes will be available to the featured projects as a resource to educate stakeholders and interested parties about the projects. The film maker will also produce 12 360° videos (two for each webisode) that will complement the projects and enhance the viewers experience.

Tasks

The PEPO Coordinator will coordinate with the film maker in the creation of the webisodes to ensure that timely and meaningful work is done to ensure the best products are produced for the story map and project partners.

Arkansas River Basin Water Forum Education & Outreach Programs

The Arkansas River Basin Water Forum (ARBWF) was created in 1995 to create dialogue among water users and decision makers in the Arkansas River Basin. The annual Water Forum includes 3-days of presentations, keynote speakers, and educational events. Each year, the Forum is held in a different Arkansas Basin location and focuses on the needs and issues specific to that area. This is a highly successful event that engages policy makers, government agencies and the public to come together and discuss the many issues relating to water resources.

The ARBWF has partnered with the PEPO Workgroup and the Arkansas Basin Roundtable to provide water education and outreach throughout the Arkansas River Basin. This partnership has allowed the expansion and integration of these organizations to pull their resources together and help meet the education and outreach goals identified in the Arkansas Basin Implementation Plan (ArkBIP).

An integral part of the ARBWF is the VIP dinner. The purpose of the VIP Dinner is to educate Ark basin elected officials and policy and decision makers on important water related issues that may affect their communities. This is accomplished through candid discussions with water professionals about the current water issues facing the Arkansas Basin and the State of Colorado. The goal of the hosted dinner is to inspire dinner participants to stay engaged in the water discussion and proactively learn more about this critical resource.

The CWP Engagement and Innovation grant funding will support the annual VIP Dinner and associated educational program and materials that are provided to those in attendance. This includes: the cost of the dinner, venue, the educational program, and to update and publish the ARBWF infographic, which illustrates various water issues and facts. The infographic is provided to all the VIP dinner and the ARBWF attendees (approximately 400 people). Following the Forum a survey will be conducted. The results will provide valuable feedback indicating if goals and objectives were met and if not, what needs to be done to make improvements.

Support the Arkansas Basin Implementation Plan Education to Action Program

Since 2016 the PEPO Workgroup has expanded on funding received from the PEPO Education Action Plan to implement the Education to Action Program. This program supports and provides outreach for ArkBIP identified planned projects. The Education to Action Program annually develops educational programs for ArkBIP identified projects. Once a worthy project has been identified this program provides educational and informative news releases/articles, informal/formal meetings and/or forums/tours to support or promote the project. Each educational effort is developed within the context of an overarching understanding of water and sustainability of the economies within the Ark Basin. These collaborative projects have gained exposure, developed partnerships, and generated potential funding needed to move the projects forward towards implementation. Each year PEPO's Education to Action program has assisted projects that are specific to the ArkBIP Goals and that are working to address the identified issues.

The Education to Action Program will continue to work as a platform to bring together key community and government stakeholders to support ArkBIP identified projects. It will help gain exposure and support needed to move these projects forward. The program will provide outreach for at least six (6) projects. PEPO's intent is to provide project sponsors with resources and outreach that will allow them to gain partnerships, to support cooperation, and secure possible funding for their projects. This program will continue to serve as an example of how to use Education to Action to move proposed projects towards implementation.

Performance Measures

Performance measures for this contract shall include the following:

- (a) Performance standards and evaluation: Grantee will produce detailed deliverables for each task as specified. Grantee shall maintain receipts for all project expenses and documentation of the minimum in-kind contributions (if applicable) per the budget in Exhibit B. Per Water Plan Grant Guidelines, the CWCB will pay out the last 10% of the budget when the Final Report is completed to the satisfaction of CWCB staff. Once the Final Report has been accepted, and final payment has been issued, the purchase order or grant will be closed without any further payment.
- (b) Accountability: Per Water Plan Grant Guidelines full documentation of project progress must be submitted with each invoice for reimbursement. Grantee must confirm that all grant conditions have been complied with on each invoice. In addition, per Water Plan Grant Guidelines, Progress Reports must be submitted at least once every 6 months. A Final Report must be submitted and approved before final project payment.
- (c) Monitoring Requirements: Grantee is responsible for ongoing monitoring of project progress per Exhibit A. Progress shall be detailed in each invoice and in each Progress Report, as detailed above. Additional inspections or field consultations will be arranged as may be necessary.
- (d) Noncompliance Resolution: Payment will be withheld if grantee is not current on all grant conditions. Flagrant disregard for grant conditions will result in a stop work order and cancellation of the Grant Agreement.
