- Review and Approval Minutes
 - Steve Wolff offered to meet with Wendy on some editorial suggestions, but no content changes.
 - Al Pfister moved to approve the January 19th Roundtable minutes. Ken Curtis seconded. The motion passed by unanimous consent.
- Officer Reports
 - o Celene Hawkins from CWCB introduced her replacement, Lorelei Cloud
- WSRF Basin Roundtable Fund Balance is currently at \$538,646.

4. Public Education, Participation & Outreach (PEPO) Liaison Report-Elaine Chick

- Roundtable Website
 - The new website is ³/₄ complete and will be put on hold until October until the new grant funding is initiated.

- Elaine is currently donating her time and just completed two amazing events in January:
 - 1. The Southwestern Water Conservation District Seminar which was filmed at the Sky Ute Casino and reported having 272 attendees.
 - 2. The Children's Water Festival (which is back from a three year suspension). There were over 760 attendees and 28 presenters.
- The Southwest Basin Handbook is a new project being developed. It will become a segment that falls under the All Basins Umbrella handbook that will detail rules and regulations.
- PEPO's 6 month progress report is due this month. The grant is good through the end of September. On June 7th a meeting will be held to identify the PEPO priorities. One priority is to purchase a computer with Acrobat Pro that can be used to upload documents to the website that meets the ADA compliance standards. Over 200 Adobe PDF documents on the website are noncompliant per ADA standards.
 - Bruce Whitehead moved to purchase a computer and Adobe Pro with a cap of \$1500. Steve Wolff seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous consent.

5. Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB) Update-Jeff Rodriguez SAVE THE DATES:

Jeff added that the Umbrella Handbook that Elaine Chick mentioned earlier will be a great orientation piece for IBCC, Roundtables, and PEPO.

- The June 1st WSRF grant applications that have been forwarded from the roundtables to the CWCB board in September. The next funding cycle begins in July.
- Turf Program: 1st application cycle closed at the end of March 2023 and will reopen July 1 through September 30, 2023.
- Technical Assistance- is live now; applications are being accepted on a rolling basis.
- Amendment guidelines provided special funding of \$450,000 not to exceed \$750,000 in the 2022-2023 fiscal year. It is anticipated that the funding will return to the normal \$300,000 per basin annually this coming fiscal year.

Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB) Update Laura Spann

- Water Plan Funding and Water Supply Reserve Funds comes from sports betting, Federal mineral leases and severance taxes. \$25 million set aside for 2023 and 2024. The resulting loan programs are meant to protect aging infrastructure, water reserves that contribute to storage and supply, dredging, watershed health projects and ag projects. She noted that preference will be given to funding requests that share multiple benefits and promote increased water storage. CWCB will help identify the right funding for water projects that advance statewide solutions.

6. Colorado River Issues Subcommittee-Ken Curtis

- Amy Ostdiek and Michelle Garrison provided a great summary of the Colorado River Compact. It is important to note that the news does not always reflect detail and events actually happening.
- New legislation created a task force on the Colorado River Compact. This new task force will determine the motion within the next 10 days. There is an increased emphasis on tribal input and West Slope interests.
- Bruce Whitehead expressed anticipated controversy between Industrial, Municipalities, and Roundtables with regard to Senate Bill 285.
- This new task force has seemingly bypassed IBCC which will potentially make IBCC less relevant.

7. WSRF Grant Requests

- MSI Post 416 Fire Recovery (\$17,943.00) Scott Roberts
 - The project will support water interest groups with education regarding impacts to, recovery of, water quality and restoration of aquatic life following a wildfire over a five year time period.
 - Mely Whiting moved to approve. Brandon Johnson seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous consent.
- CoAg Water Request (\$75,000) Greg Peterson
 - The intent of the request is to keep water in agriculture. The design is to collect funds that can be regranted to farmers with small projects. Priority is given to

farmers that are going to be profitable, and that show strategies that can scale up. These projects measure economical viability, measure impact on soil, consumption, and profitability. CoAg is looking for farmers and ranchers with new ideas. Categories under consideration include 1) Alternative crops, 2) Efficiency, 3) Hay & Forage, 4) Livestock, 5) Soil Projects. To date \$375,000 has been distributed to approximately 30 projects in the amount of \$2,000 to \$32,000 mini grants. The average funding for projects was \$13,000.

- Mely Whiting made a motion to approve funding as long as there is an effort to engage the Southwest Ag community or conservation district and that there is a caveat that the funds stay in the Southwest area. Al Pfister seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous consent.
- Florida-Pastorius Reservoir Request (\$46,275) Darren Rowley
 - The request was made to replace a headgate that poses community safety issues with a new Rubicon headgate. Brandon Johnson shared that the Rubicon headgates do not work in temperatures below 30 degrees and could that be a concern to the project? It was not. Buck Skillen made a motion to approve the request. Al Pfister seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous consent.
- San Miguel FloodPlain Restoration Request (\$49,850.00) Adrian Bergere
 - The initial presentation focused on conservation of wetlands and decrease floodplain restoration and working with BLM and the Forest Service to finalize sites to complete 2024 field studies. Bruce Whitehead expressed concern that the project may be in conflict with Senate Bill 270 and pending legislation. Knowledge of types of depletion and evaporation depletions as well as permits and other costs to move forward with the project seems to be lacking. The conversation changed from identifying locations to a mere planning standpoint to address feasibility studies, scopes of work and budget preparation.
 - Bruce Whitehead made a motion to approve funding as long as the project is compliant with Colorado Water Law. Al Pfister seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous consent.

Funding FAQ for Southwest Basins Roundtable Updated April 27, 2023

What is CWCB's Water Plan Grant Program?

In a nutshell, the <u>Water Plan Grant Program</u> is state funding to advance the goals of the Colorado Water Plan. The program is divided into the following categories: Water Storage & Supply, Water Sharing Agreements, Conservation & Land Use Planning, Engagement & Innovation, Agricultural Projects, and Watershed Health & Recreation Projects. <u>Adding storage? Have a multi-benefit project? Lots of project partners, collaboration? An innovative or landscape-scale project?</u> It might fit well here.

<u>Pro-tip:</u> Have an idea? Talk with the CWCB early on! It may take 3-6 months to gather everything needed for a successful application so start now. CWCB is available to coach you in application development.

Another pro-tip: Roundtable letters of support, while not required, add value to your application. If you want their consideration, the Southwest Basin Roundtable requests the draft application and a draft letter of support two weeks prior to the meeting along with a presentation at a meeting. As a last resort, the Roundtable may consider a letter of support if requested via email at least two weeks in advance of the CWCB application deadline.

What is the Water Supply Reserve Fund?

In a nutshell, the <u>Water Supply Reserve Fund</u> is intended for basin projects that align with the Basin Implementation Plan and the Colorado Water Plan. Projects can be funded through basin funds and/or statewide funds, both of which <u>need Basin Roundtable approval</u>. The statewide fund is great for aging infrastructure and drought resilience projects and basin funds can be used to address critical needs in the basin.

CWCB is now considering grant applications for 1) Local Capacity to support your organization in hiring help to organize projects and apply for federal funding and 2) Technical Assistance (coming soon) to connect your organization with a CWCB contractor to help you prepare a federal grant request.
