3. Administrative Reports

- Review and Approval Minutes
 - Bruce Whitehead moved to approve the July 27th Roundtable minutes. Steve Harris seconded. The motion passed by unanimous consent.
- Officer Reports-Ed Tolen
 - C-9 scheduled November 14 will be held at the Westin in Westminster, CO. Per Jeff Rodriguez,
 10 people from each roundtable can be reimbursed for travel, mileage, and lodging. No funding for food since food will be provided.
- WSRF Basin Roundtable Fund Balance is currently at \$707,559. \$300,000 was added October 1, 2023. The funding year runs from October 1 through September 30.

4. Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB): Federal & Water Information Section-Colorado River Presentation-Amy Ostdiek, Emily Halverson, Emily Zmak

- Becky Mitchell is the first full time Colorado River Commissioner on the Upper Colorado River Commission as of July 5, 2023. She is travelling around the state to discuss Colorado interests with water users. Additionally, she will replace Dan Gibbs, Director of Department of Natural Resources, as the IBCC Director.
- Amy Ostdiek is assisting Becky Mitchell by also travelling throughout Colorado to capture water issues and report back.
- Law of Colorado River-Emily Halversen
 - o Big Three
 - Co River Compact 1922-contract among states authorized by the US Constitution and ratified by US Congress and state legislators-falling under Federal and State law.
 - Mexico Treaty 1944-1.5 MAF; reduced allotment in extraordinary drought years
 - *Upper CO River Compact 1948*-apportions water among states on a percentage basis of total water supplies available.
 - o Functional Four
 - Boulder Canyon Project Act 1928-authorized construction of Lake Mead
 - CO River Storage Project Act 1956-prioritizes Lake Powell, Flaming Gorge, Navajo, Aspinall Reservoirs
 - AZ vs CA Supreme Court Case 1963-apportioned water with 3 lower basin states-Nevada-California-Arizona
 - CO River Basin Project Act 1968-authorized central Arizona Project; and releases and storage of Lake Powell
 - Summarized points of the Colorado River Compact 1922
 - o Compact is both state and federal law-1st interstate
 - Defines the Colorado River and tributaries
 - 7.5 MAF allocation for both the Upper and Lower Basin states
 - Provides water to Mexico will come from surplus water "recognized deficiency" shall be equally borne by the Upper and Lower Basin
 - The Upper Basin is not the cause of the flow issues at Lee's Ferry being depleted below aggregate of 7.5 MAF

5. General Discussion - Colorado River Issues

 Upper CO River Compact 1948 divides allocation among states based upon percentages of available water

- The Lower Basin continues to pull more water than was available.
 - o The Bureau of Reclamation released a draft of supplemental EIS
 - Lower Basin does not have priority. They need to use less water on a permanent basis
 - Focus on rebuilding water levels/storage in Lake Mead and Lake Powell
 - The Lower Basin is now willing to acknowledge overuse
- June 2022: Bureau of Reclamation called for 2-4- million AF in conservation.

- o Upper Basin devised a 5-Point Plan and continues to manage water within the means of what is available. The Upper Basin was never out of compliance and responded with:
 - System Conservation Pilot Program SCPP
 - Demand Management Feasibility Investigation
 - Drought Response Operation Agreement (DROA)

SCPP

- o Earlier application window began in October 2023
- o Pay water users not to use water on a temporary basis
- o Transparent pricing mechanism
- o Increased education and outreach
- o Expand information and opportunity to provide comment
- o Prioritize projects that support innovative water conservation development of drought resiliency tools
- Climate variability is real
 - o Prepare for variability
 - o Prepare for both ends of hydrology-dry and wet years
 - o Be flexible

- Steve Harris moved to have the SWBRT write a position paper supporting Becky Mitchell, Bruce Whitehead amended the motion to use the Colorado's Post 2026 Principles rooted in irrefutable truths that we can all agree to: 1) Acknowledging that climate variability is real. 2) Recognizing that water users in the Lower Basin are not more important than water users in the Upper Basin. 3) Preventing overuse in the Lower Basin. 4) Defending against attempts at Compact curtailment in the Upper Basin States. 5) Operating Lake Powell and Lake Mead to respond to actual hydrology and protect storage. 6) Preserving federal reserved water rights for Tribal Nations. In addition, any interstate agreement must comply with federal environmental law and advance coordination between the United States and Mexico. Dave Kanzer seconded. The motion passed by unanimous consent.
