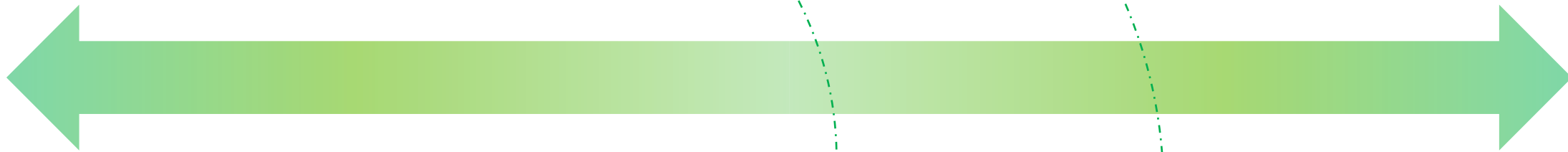

Many public outreach and messaging efforts have been launched since the 2015 Water Plan to raise awareness about the importance of water to Colorado. Building on the momentum and efforts of past messaging campaigns, a state-led and Water Plan-branded water education messaging effort will be critical in building awareness around the key water issues Coloradans are facing.

As part of the Water Plan update, CWCB will develop and brand a statewide education and outreach campaign to help reinforce the critical issues and opportunities that the Colorado Water Plan brings to light. This work will include looking at recent state surveys across agencies to help identify knowledge gaps and messaging opportunities that will help reinforce and build on local water knowledge. An interagency tool box of materials will be developed, along with a public outreach campaign that can help organizations, stakeholders, and other partners enhance public awareness. These partnerships and collaboration will help unite CWCB and the nine basin roundtables in sharing consistent, clear, bilingual, and accessible messaging to educate the public on Colorado's most critical water issues.

HOUSE BILL 05-1177

BY REPRESENTATIVE(S) Penry, Buescher, Decker, Liston, Massey, White, Berens, Clapp, Crane, Gallegos, Hall, Hoppe, Jahn, Kerr, Knoedler, Paccione, Rose, Stafford, Stengel, Sullivan, Romanoff, Boyd, Brophy, Coleman, Frangas, Harvey, King, Madden, May M., McCluskey, Merrifield, and Todd;
also SENATOR(S) Isgar, Tapia, Taylor, Entz, Grossman, Kester, Fitz-Gerald, Groff, Teck, and Tupa.

CONCERNING THE NEGOTIATION OF INTERBASIN COMPACTS REGARDING THE EQUITABLE DIVISION OF THE STATE'S WATERS, AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. Title 37, Colorado Revised Statutes, is amended BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW ARTICLE to read:

ARTICLE 75 **Interbasin Compacts**

37-75-101. Short title. THIS ARTICLE SHALL BE KNOWN AND MAY BE CITED AS THE "COLORADO WATER FOR THE 21ST CENTURY ACT".

Capital letters indicate new material added to existing statutes; dashes through words indicate deletions from existing statutes and such material not part of act.

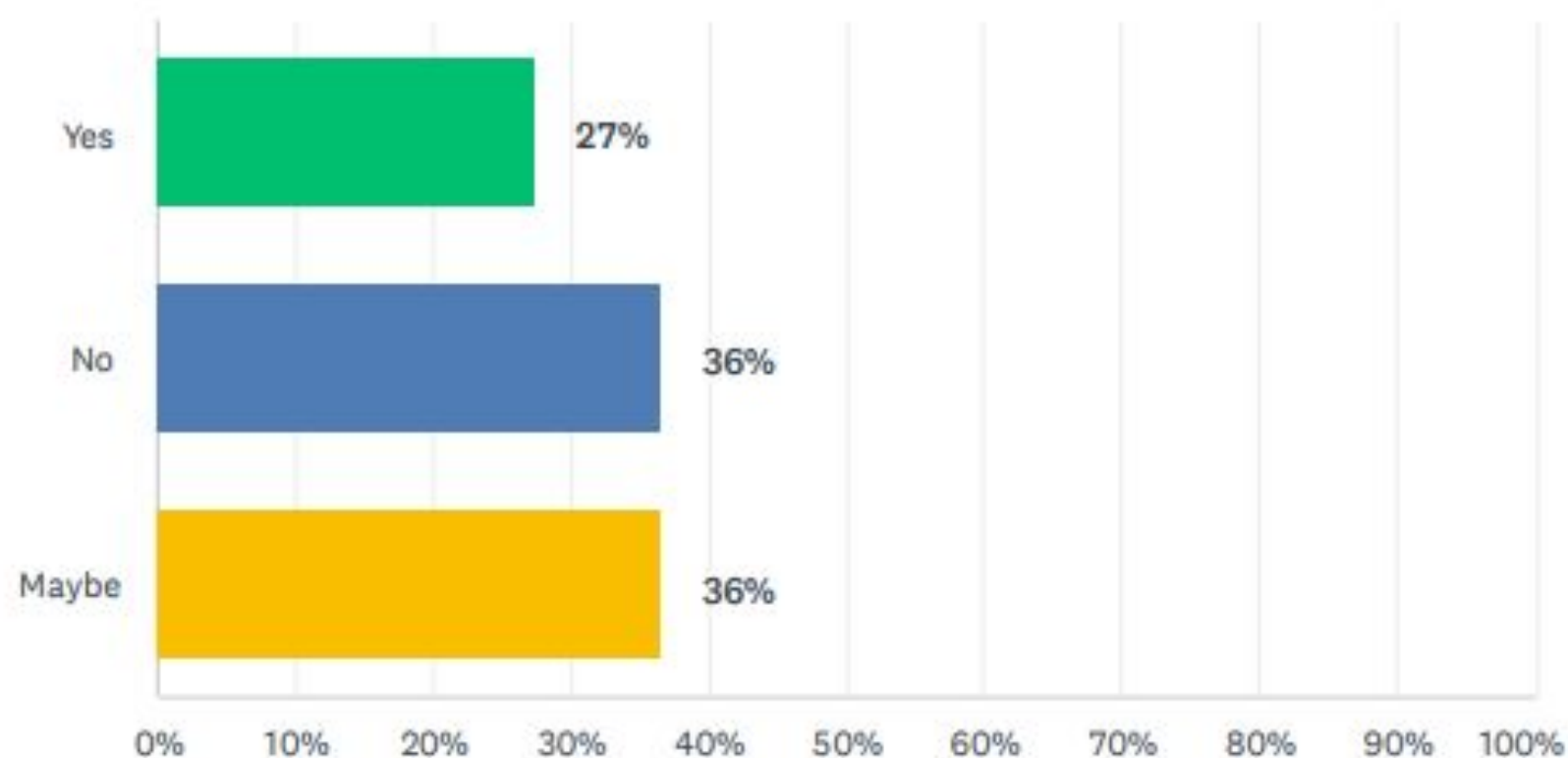

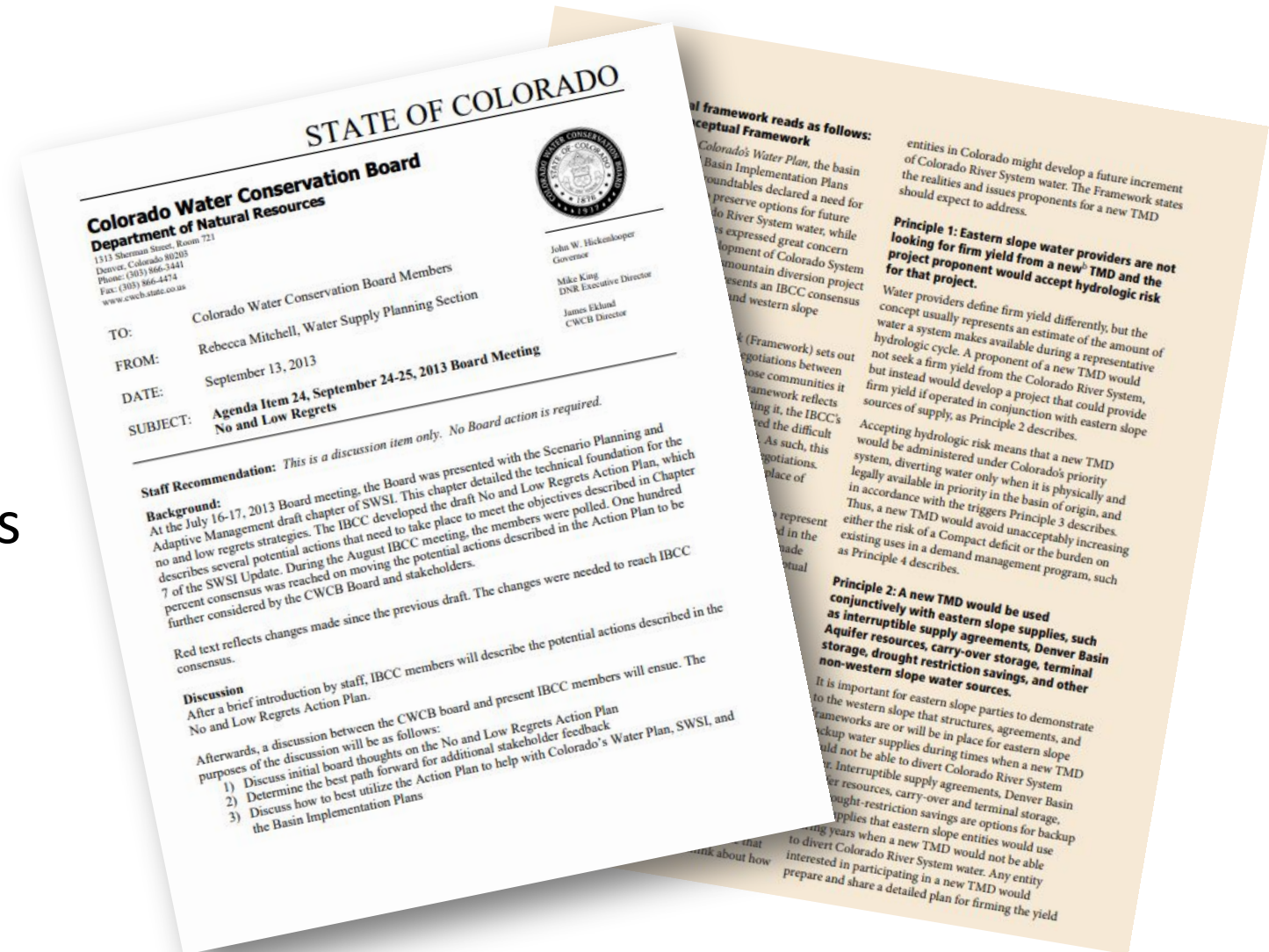

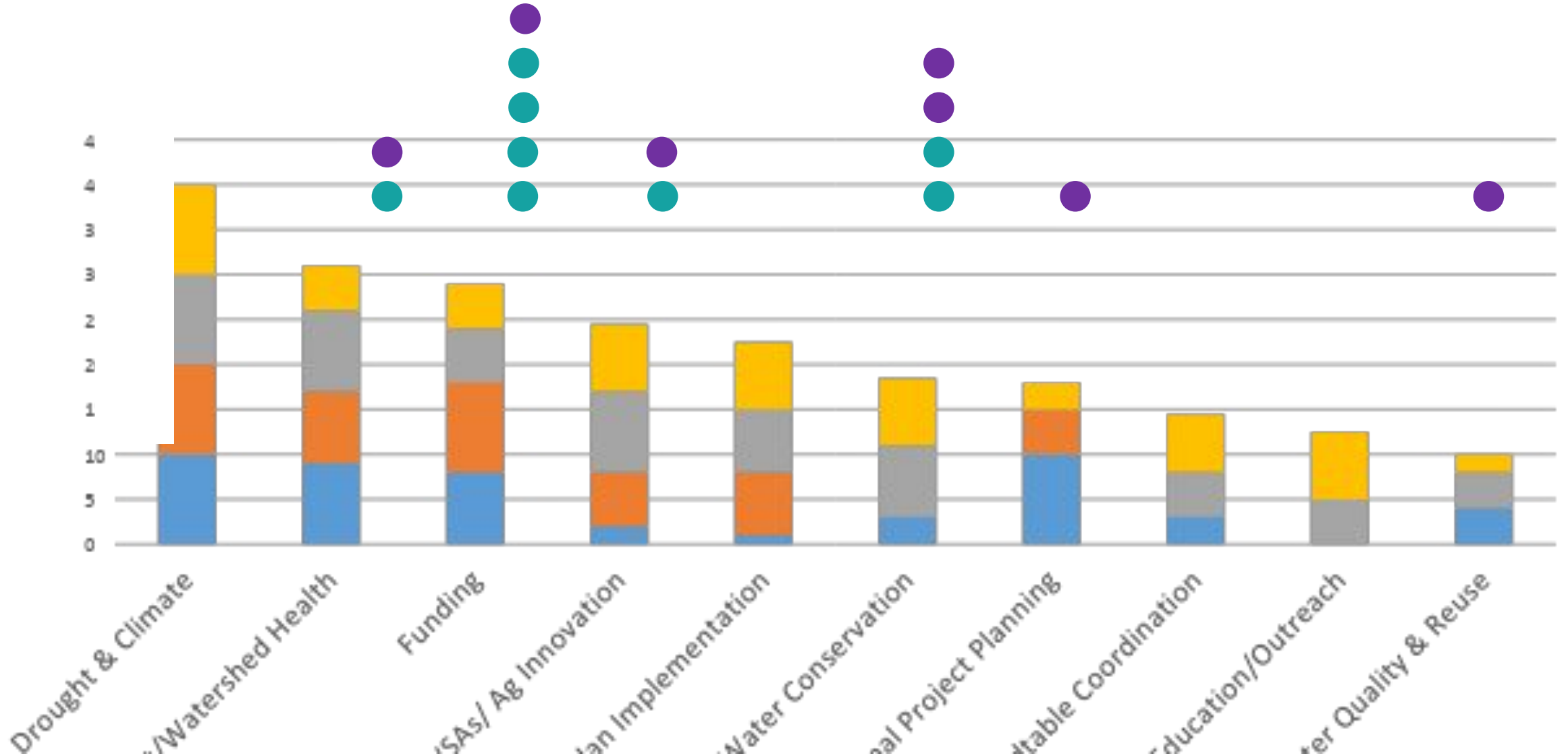

- Could we develop a set of common goals or priorities we want forestry to consider?



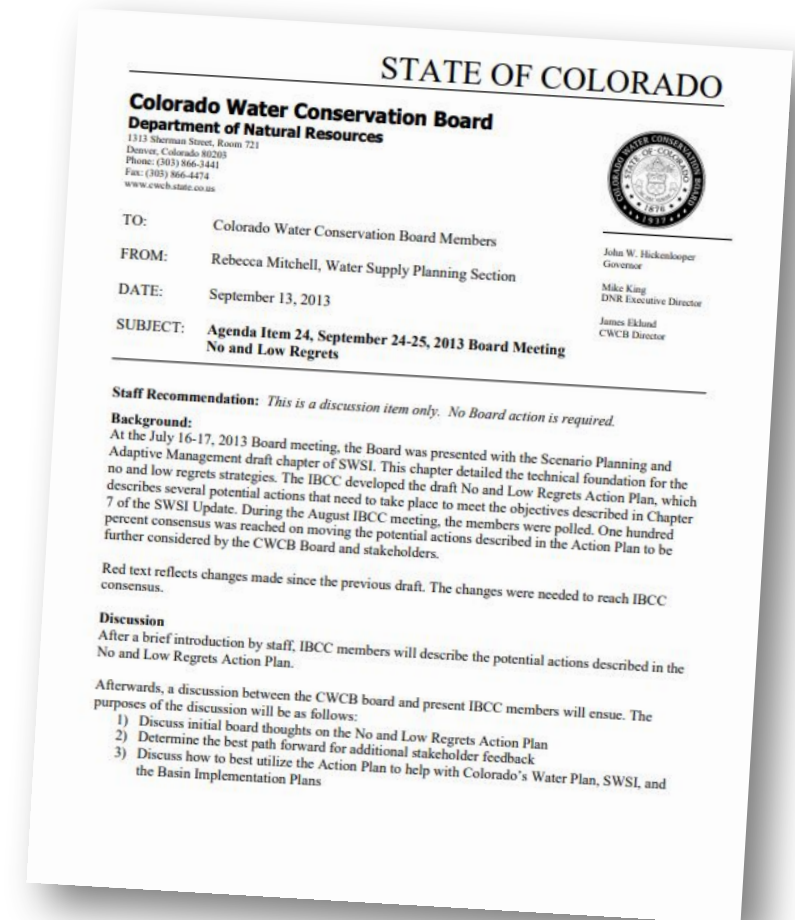
CLIMATE/DROUGHT EXAMPLE – LISA DARLING

- Can we get an update on where things sit with scenario planning?
- Can we maybe see how potential scenarios might change in the next Water Plan?
- How can IBCC support building greater drought resilience across scenarios?



LOW REGRETS 2.0? – LISA DARLING

- Is there a way to touch on all the IBCC identified topics in a new Low Regrets Strategy 2.0?
- Could we pick up on the Colorado Drought Task Force recommendations and add more?
- Would this let IBCC reassert its role and the roundtables' role while adding value to the conversation?
- Can we engage CWCB and the roundtables on this idea?



ACTIONABLE PROJECTS

- Broad basin support
- Not in conflict with another group's authority
- Supported by the CWCB/Water Plan (staff can work on it)
- Minimal costs or CWCB already has funds
- Results in something IBCC can workshop with basins and CWCB board to approve



**WHERE IBCC WANTS TO BE
(DOING WORK)**

DISCUSSION

- Single person/basin issue
- Someone else has authority (CWCB; legislature)
- May conflict with CWCB; legislature; etc. (staff can't work on it)
- Requires funding, contractors, etc.
- Does not have an outcome or an outcome that can not be supported by basins and CWCB

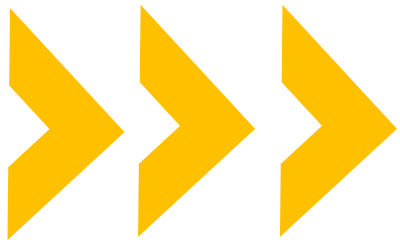

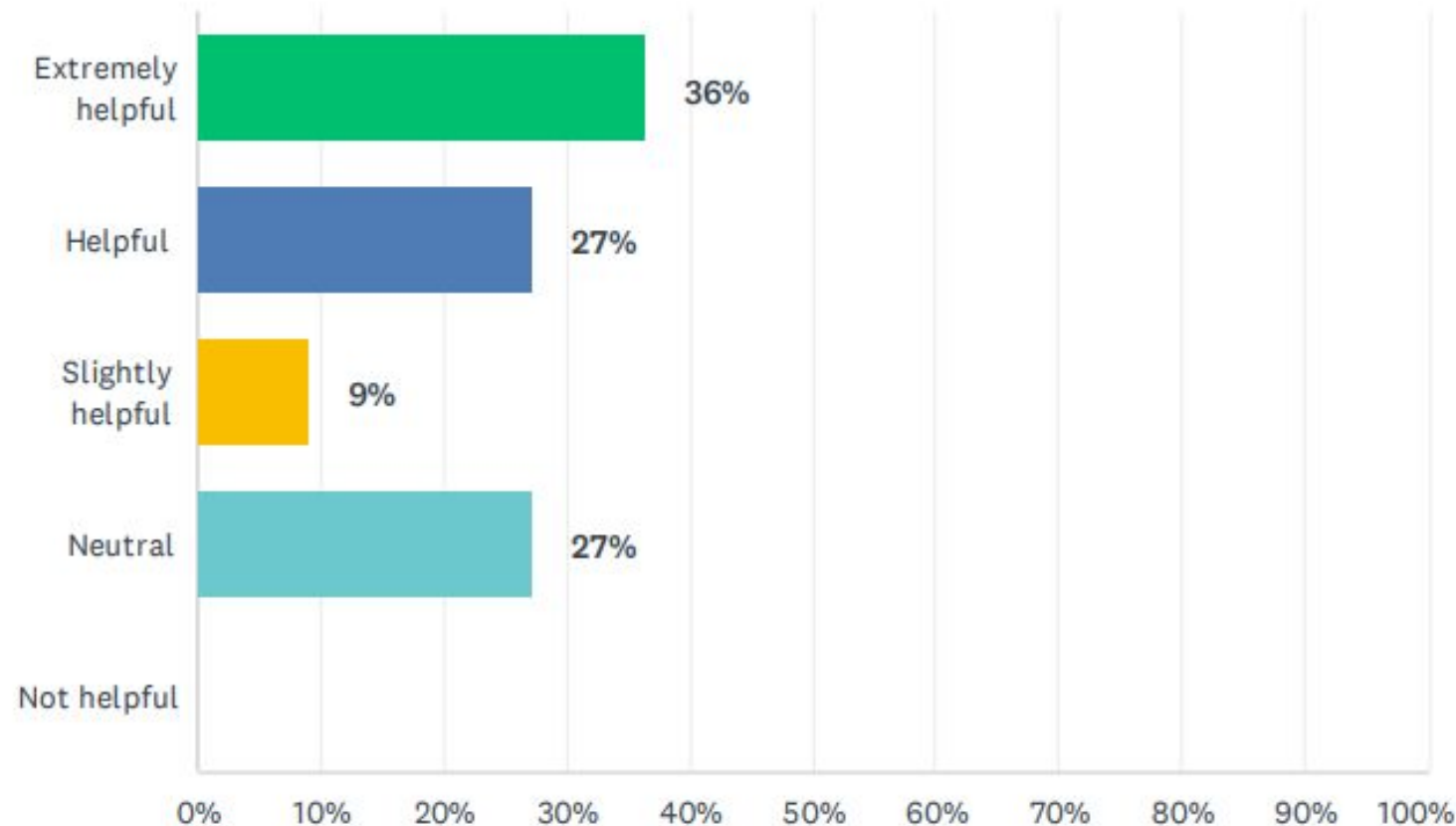

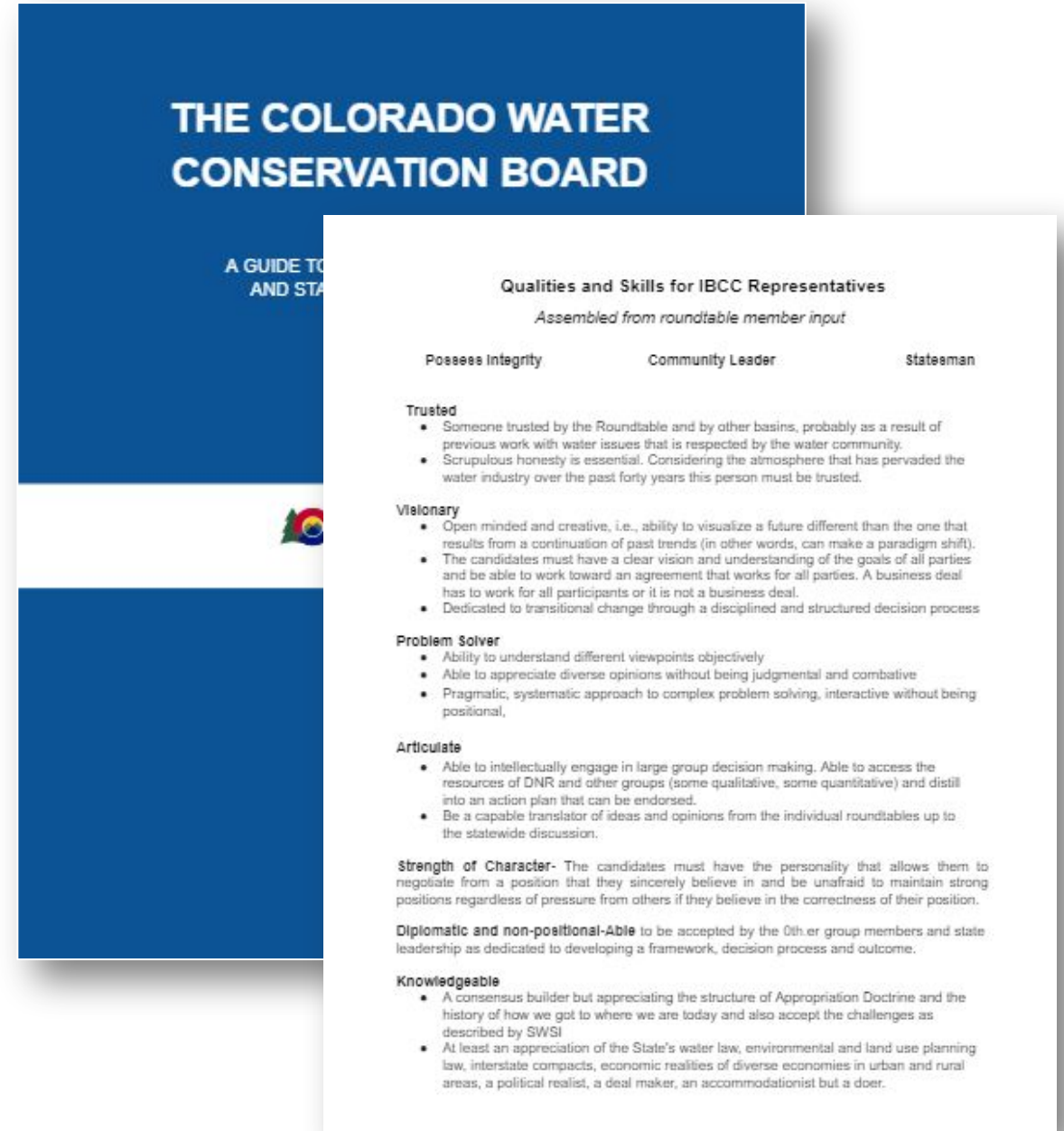

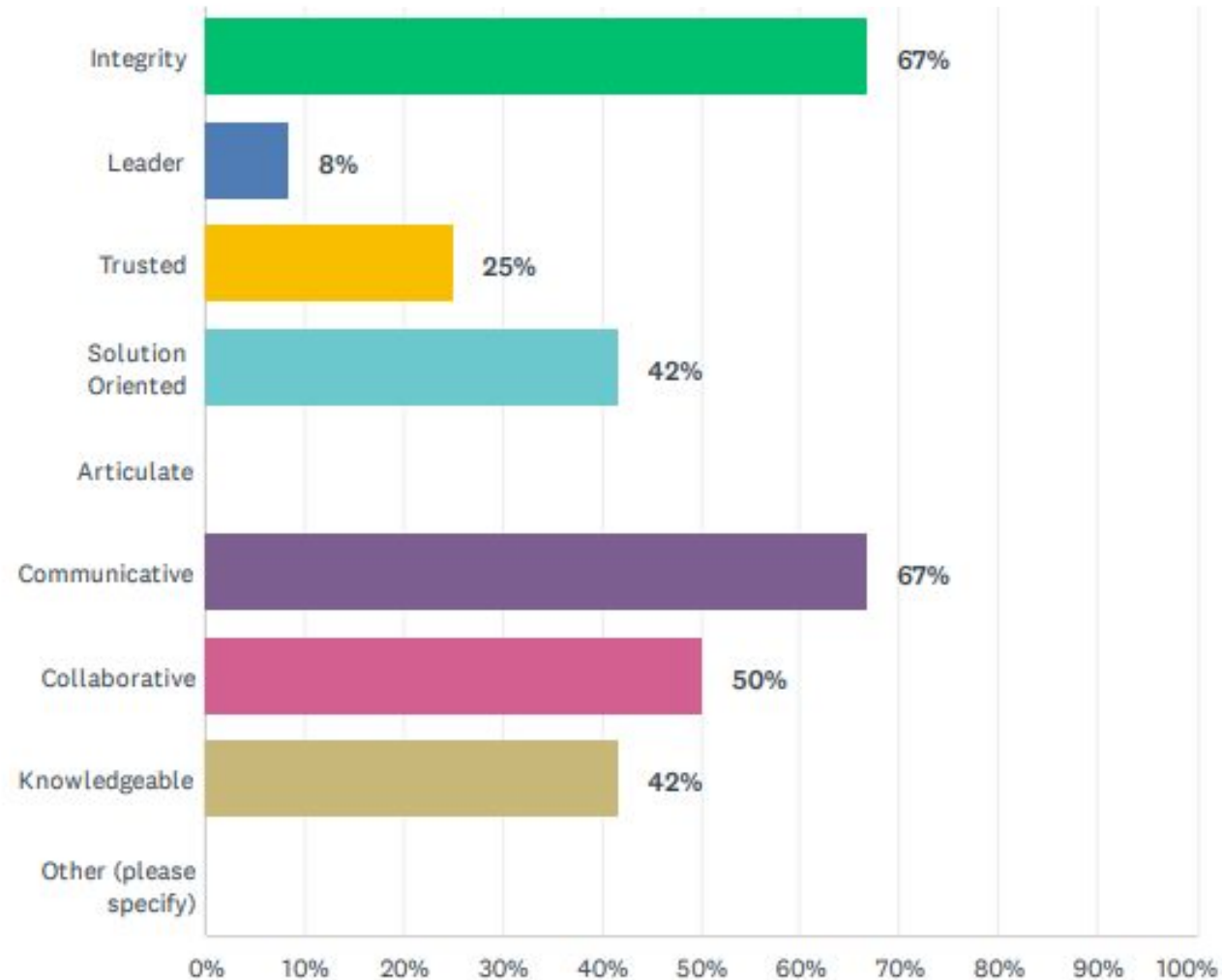

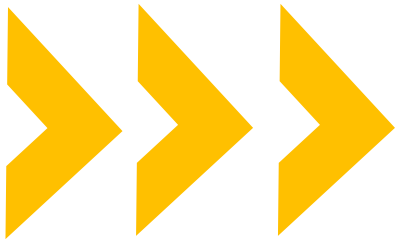
