



4.3 Create a collaborative Colorado Water Plan education and outreach campaign

Lead Agency: CWCB

Collaborating Agencies: CDPHE; CPW; DOLA

Many public outreach and messaging efforts have been launched since the 2015 Water Plan to raise awareness about the importance of water to Colorado. Building on the momentum and efforts of past messaging campaigns, a state-led and Water Plan-branded water education messaging effort will be critical in building awareness around the key water issues Coloradans

As part of the Water Plan update, CWCB will develop and brand a statewide education and outreach campaign to help reinforce the critical issues and opportunities that the Colorado Water Plan brings to light. This work will include looking at recent state surveys across agencies to help identify knowledge gaps and messaging opportunities that will help reinforce and build on local water knowledge. An interagency tool box of materials will be developed, along with a public outreach campaign that can help organizations, stakeholders, and other partners enhance public awareness. These partnerships and collaboration will help unite CWCB and the nine basin roundtables in sharing consistent, clear, bilingual, and accessible messaging to educate the public on Colorado's most critical water issues.




Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. Title 37, Colorado Revised Statutes, is amended BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW ARTICLE to read:

ARTICLE 75 Interbasin Compacts

37-75-101. Short title. THIS ARTICLE SHALL BE KNOWN AND MAY BE CITED AS THE "COLORADO WATER FOR THE 21ST CENTURY ACT".







At the July 16-17, 2013 Board meeting, the Board was presented with the Scenario Planning and Adaptive Management draft chapter of SWSI. This chapter detailed the technical foundation for the no and low regrets strategies. The IBCC developed the draft No and Low Regrets Action Plan, which describes several potential actions that need to take place to meet the objectives described in Chapter 7 of the SWSI Update. During the August IBCC meeting, the members were polled. One hundred percent consensus was reached on moving the potential actions described in the Action Plan to be

WHERE IBCC WANTS TO BE (DOING WORK)

DISCUSSION

- Single person/basin issue
- Someone else has authority (CWCB; legislature)
- May conflict with CWCB; legislature; etc. (staff can't work on it)
- Requires funding, contractors, etc.
- Does not have an outcome or an outcome that can not be supported by basins and CWCB

WHRE IBCC IS MOST OFTEN (IN CONVERSATION)



Possess Integrity

Community Leader

Statesman

Trusted

- Someone trusted by the Roundtable and by other basins, probably as a result of previous work with water issues that is respected by the water community.
- Scrupulous honesty is essential. Considering the atmosphere that has pervaded the water industry over the past forty years this person must be trusted.

Visionary

- Open minded and creative, i.e., ability to visualize a future different than the one that
 results from a continuation of past trends (in other words, can make a paradigm shift).
- The candidates must have a clear vision and understanding of the goals of all parties and be able to work toward an agreement that works for all parties. A business deal has to work for all participants or it is not a business deal.
- Dedicated to transitional change through a disciplined and structured decision process

Drohlam Solver

- Ability to understand different viewpoints objectively
- · Able to appreciate diverse opinions without being judgmental and combative
- Pragmatic, systematic approach to complex problem solving, interactive without being positional.

Articulate

- Able to intellectually engage in large group decision making. Able to access the
 resources of DNR and other groups (some qualitative, some quantitative) and distill
 into an action plan that can be endorsed.
- Be a capable translator of ideas and opinions from the individual roundtables up to the statewide discussion.

Strength of Character- The candidates must have the personality that allows them to negotiate from a position that they sincerely believe in and be unafraid to maintain strong positions regardless of pressure from others if they believe in the correctness of their position.

Diplomatic and non-positional-Able to be accepted by the 0th or group members and state leadership as dedicated to developing a framework, decision process and outcome.

Knowledgeable

- A consensus builder but appreciating the structure of Appropriation Doctrine and the history of how we got to where we are today and also accept the challenges as described by SWSI.
- At least an appreciation of the State's water law, environmental and land use planning law, interstate compacts, economic realities of diverse economies in urban and rural areas, a political realist, a deal maker, an accommodationist but a doer.




