


### WHO WE ARE:

- Non-profit organization who works statewide to restore flows to Colorado's rivers
- Formed in 2001 to partner with Colorado's Instream Flow Program and amplify its work
- We work with water users to put together voluntary transactions that benefit the environment
- Transactions are tailored for each water right and each water system
- We work within the prior appropriation system and compensates water rights owners at fair market value








### WHAT WE DO...

We've successfully completed 27 projects, adding over 82,000 acre-feet of water to over 800 miles of natural stream in Colorado.



### **Request for Water**

Colorado Water Trust works in partnership with water rights owners to restore water to rivers while protecting water rights and livelihoods.

The Request for Water Process, launched in collaboration with the Colorado Water Conservation Board, is a streamlined process for water rights owners to explore options for using their water to benefit Colorado's rivers and streams.

There are many legal tools available that protect water rights while also benefiting local streams and rivers. Voluntary water sharing arrangements or voluntary acquisitions of senior water rights, on a temporary or permanent basis, can help restore water to rivers for ecological benefits and complementary uses downstream or on irrigated property.

Request for Water is confidential, completely voluntary and open to all water rights owners, including agricultural, municipal, industrial, or others. Interested water rights owners can submit a confidential, non-binding Preliminary Interest Form to RFW@coloradowatertrust.org at any time.

#### Potential benefits to water rights owners are:

- Compensation for water can provide additional income to support agricultural operations.
- · Protection of water rights and use from diminishment or abandonment
- Knowing that you are helping keep Colorado's natural environment healthy and beautiful for future generations

#### Request for Water has several goals:

- To invite water rights owners to explore how their water might be able to benefit rivers
- To streamline complex transaction processes and utilization of resources


















Water Right Priority






- Split-season irrigation approved in water court
- CWT owns water right subject to grants of irrigation and environmental flow uses










**Decreed Instream Flow Reach** 




- Stored water in

5/10 TEMPORARY TO INSTREAM FLOW Stagecoach Reservoir



### Crystal River rancher, Water Trust again try to boost flows

A Crystal River Valley rancher and a nonprofit organization are teaming up for the second time to try to leave more water in a parched stream.

Cold Mountain Ranch owners Bill Fales and Marj Perry have inked a six-year deal with the Colorado Water Trust to voluntarily retime their irrigation practices to leave water in the Crystal River during the late summer and early fall, when the river often needs it most. In addition to a \$5,000 signing bonus, the ranchers will be paid \$250 a day up to 20 days, for each cubic foot per second (cfs) they don't divert, for a maximum payment of \$30,000.

The water would come from reducing diversions from the Helms Ditch and could result in up to an additional 6 cfs in the river. The agreement would become active in the months of August and September any time streamflows dip below 40 cfs and extend through October once it is active. The agreement will lift if streamflows rise above 55 cfs.

If requested, market-based COMPENSATION is available for water that is successfully leased or conveyed to CWCB for ISF use.

Additional benefits include protection against abandonment, safeguarding HCU and helping the local stream.
