The Hermanas Del Rio River Sisters Project aims to improve water quality while building a turquoise necklace of parks and improving riparian area for recreational use along the South Platte River in Denver, Colorado through Segment 14 in the Metro Area.

Riverdale Park's Master Plan in Adams County aims to have a fishable and swimmable waterway for swim based recreation in Adams County which is Segment 15 of the South Platte River.

We will employ and engage youth and young adult leaders from the local communities adjacent to the river in watershed planning, riparian area improvements, water quality sampling and community outreach and engagement for these two projects.

We will educate and employ youth in the planning and implementation of water quality improvement projects for a healthy South Platte River Watershed for recreational use.

# **Water Project Justification**

Page 2 of the Colorado Water Plan Executive Summary lists four Water Plan values that guide the approach.

- 1. A productive economy that supports vibrant, sustainable cities, agriculture, recreation, and tourism.
- 2. An efficient and effective water infrastructure system.
- 3. A strong environment with healthy watersheds, rivers, streams, and wildlife.
- 4. An informed public with creative, forward-thinking solutions that are sustainable and resilient to changing conditions and result in strong, equitable communities that can adapt and thrive in the face of adversity

The values that most closely reflect our work are 3 and 4.

3. We are working towards a fishable and swimmable South Platte River for all people in the Denver Metropolitan Area. We understand that there is a multitude of benefits for people and nature in achieving our goal.

4. We work directly with youth, families and neighbors who are most affected by the issues of a polluted South Platte River. We recognize that the voices of those most affected are necessary to find appropriate solutions.

This vision is presented in the South Platte River Advisory Youth Council "Our River, Our Voices, Our Future" Plan to restore the South Platte River that will be updated in August of 2025.
