Water Activity Overview

The Grand County Stream Management Plan (GC SMP), created in 2010 and the first of its kind in Colorado, is the guiding framework for LBD. LBD's focus is the Cooperative Effort Area (CEA), which includes over 100 river miles in the Upper Colorado River Watershed. Since LBD formed in 2013, we have established a long-term scientific-based program to fund and collect data in the CEA.

Since the inception of the GC SMP, changes have occurred throughout Grand County that warrant a reexamination of the technical aspects of the SMP to reflect current conditions. New data has been collected that supports a Watershed Assessment to improve characterization and prioritization of areas of concern. The Intergovernmental Agreements that founded LBD state that it is the responsibility of LBD to update the GC SMP.

This Grand County Stream Management Update – Phase 1 Project will include a comprehensive analysis of data collected to date (i.e., Watershed Assessment) and a broad stakeholder outreach program. WSRF funding for this grant application is requested specifically for analysis, interpretation and report compilation of the Watershed Assessment only. This Phase 1 Project is fundamental to the actual update to the GC SMP in Phase 2 of the Project.

This project supports the goals of the Colorado Basin Roundtable in that it:

- Supports the Basin Implementation Plan's ongoing project of developing stream management plans throughout the basin (page 12, BIP). Once the Watershed Assessment is complete, it will then inform an update to the Grand County Stream Management Plan (GC SMP).
- The project's main goals are to identify areas of concern and improve the Upper Colorado River above the confluence of the Blue River, which is located in Learning By Doing's Cooperative Effort Area (page 14, BIP Theme #1).
- Ensures continued collaboration among new and current stakeholders and major water providers which the Colorado Basin Roundtable has identified as "undercurrents" of the six themes.
- This project supports the Colorado River Cooperative Agreement which provides stream health benefits to Grand County streams (page 9, BIP).
- Ensures Learning By Doing will be the driver of the project to direct, coordinate, and apply
 resources as well as continued sampling for macroinvertebrates and water quality (page 12,
 BIP).

This project supports the Colorado Water Plan:

- A central goal of the Colorado Water Plan is to "Cover 80 percent of the locally prioritized lists of rivers with stream management plans, and 80 percent of critical watersheds with watershed protection plans, all by 2030" (page 10-7 in Colorado Water Plan). While the GC SMP was the first of its kind in Colorado in 2010, it is in need of an update. This Phase 1 project to develop a Watershed Assessment and Stakeholder Outreach program will provide the foundation for updating the GC SMP in Phase 2 of the project.
- Another goal is to "Engage Coloradans statewide." While not part of this WSRF grant application request, this Phase 1 Project contains a broad stakeholder outreach program that will engage all water stakeholders in the Grand County area. The results of the Watershed Assessment in this Phase 1 Project, which is the subject of this WSRF grant request, will be shared as part of the broad stakeholder outreach in this phase and will support the continuation of stakeholder outreach in Phase 2 of the Project to update the actual GC SMP itself. Furthermore, the Colorado Water Plan states that, "Engaged community members are more likely to participate in building political will, developing management options, and supporting project implementation" (page 7-6 in Colorado Water Plan). Learning By Doing fully supports this engagement approach and this is one of the reasons we want to update the GC SMP.

This project supports the most recent Analysis & Technical Update:

• The Analysis and Technical Update stresses, "the need to take an adaptive approach to developing water management strategies and projects and methods to fill potential future gaps" and Learning By Doing (LBD) is an adaptive management approach at its core. Learning By Doing's ongoing work will inform the watershed assessment and includes documenting existing aquatic monitoring efforts and implementing supplemental monitoring efforts where needed, prioritizing river reaches where restoration is needed, and coordinating voluntary

releases of environmental water to respond to low flows and high stream temperatures (Executive Summary, page 5).

One of the project's main goals is to better understand the current hydrological conditions
within the CEA since 1985 by summarizing the daily and instantaneous flows, seasonal
patterns, magnitude and timing, and spatial and annual variability. A key component of the
Analysis and Technical Update is understanding how climate change will impact streamflow
and the E&R assets. Once we have a better understanding of the current conditions LBD will
be able to improve its water management decisions by coordinating voluntary releases of
environmental water when the stream needs it the most (Colorado Basin Results, page 90).
