To Whom It May Concern:

I write in support of Transit Mix's application to open a quarry on Hitch Rack Ranch.

Hitch Rack Ranch is the single best location for a new quarry in El Paso County. There are 1500 residences within one mile of Pikeview quarry, compared to only 13 residences within one mile of Hitch Rack Ranch. Because Hitch Rack Ranch is 1,432 acres and Transit Mix is proposing to mine fewer than 200 acres, there would be a significant buffer between the quarry and those few neighbors. As far as quarries go, it doesn't get any better than that.
