I am submitting my comments which are strongly opposed to issuing a mining permit to Peak Materials as a resident of Silverthorne, Colorado. We have owned a property in Summit County the past 15 years and have certainly witnessed first-hand the operations of the current mine owner. As such, the residents of Summit County have no basis to believe that the new mine will be operated any better. Simply put by a recent article in the Summit Daily by Susan Knopf, **"The additional truck traffic is hazardous to our health. It will tear up our roads, snarl our traffic, be dangerous to bikers and destroy the tranquility of the Lower Blue River Basin"**.

In addition, as a former Administrator at the US Department of Transportation (2001-2005), I also have insights into the negative impact on roads and bridges that are caused by excessive trucking. I had the honor of serving Secretary of Transportation, Norm Mineta, and assisting him in passing through Congress and enacting the SURFACE TRANSPORTATION EXTENSION ACT, OF 2004. In this legislation, we were very concerned about mitigating damage to roads caused by heavy truck loads. Please note that on average trucks alone cause approximately 60% of the damage to our roads and bridges. It has been reported that if the new mine is issued a permit, it will result in about **230 additional truck loads per day**. This is in addition to the current truck load entering and exiting the existing facility. This simply cannot be sustainable over a period of time and will result in rapid deterioration of our roads. In these days of limited funds to support transportation infrastructure, the minimal cost benefit to the mine owners, does not outweigh the cost of the destruction to our fragile transportation infrastructure and the taxpayer.

I am writing to seek Non-Party status to testify about the application by Peak Materials to establish a gravel mining operation at the site designated as Peak Ranch Resource.

I am specifically aggrieved by this proposed project for the following reasons. I believe a gravel mine in the Lower Blue River will adversely impact wildlife, (including the Blue River fishery) directly or indirectly because of air pollution, noise, and alteration of the native geology negatively impacting the quantity and/or quality of well water. Peak's reclamation plan is inadequate.

Even though DRMS is not required to address highway safety, but it is obvious that 230 one-way gravel truck trips a day for eight months out of the year back and forth to Maryland Creek for processing, creates a huge safety hazard for humans and wildlife. There is potential for these huge trucks to collide with wildlife, hikers, and cyclists. Gravel trucks could pose a hazard too for the many vehicles entering or exiting the various subdivisions between the proposed mine and Maryland Creek.

It's a bad idea to put a gravel mine in the middle of a rural agrarian valley with Federal Wilderness on both sides, thousands of acres of County protected open space, and thousands of working ranches forever protected by conservation easements. It's clear to me that industrial activity particularly of this nature is antithetical to the natural, rural, and economic values of the valley. There is inherent protection from Summit County's Blue Master Plan to block such industrial activity. I strongly object to the plan to allow gravel mining for any reason in the Lower Blue River Valley.

To Whom it May Concern:

I am writing a letter of Objection to the application by Peak Materials to establish a gravel mining operation at the site designated as Peak Ranch Resource. It would enable the firm to mine gravel for 15 years. We and our Pebble Creek Homeowners Association (19 homes and 38 residents) are convinced that the application should be rejected. The proposed, additional mining activity violates the principles of Summit County's Lower Blue Master Plan which deems any industrial activity antithetical to the natural, and economic values of the valley, and its sustainability.

The Lower Blue Valley has Federal Wilderness lands on both sides of Route 9; it includes thousands of acres of County protected Open Space plus 1000's of acres of working ranches protected from developers by in-perpetuity conservation easements. Residents in the valley actively volunteer in County and individual efforts to eradicate noxious weeds, remove dead Pine Beetle infested trees, monitor trails and remove roadside trash. Pebble Creek Ranch residents are good stewards of their water and forest inheritance. It is the first "Firewise" community in Summit County recognized by The National Fire Protection Association in 2016. *Sally and I have had our house at Pebble Creek Ranch since 1991*.

We believe that Peak's mining plan will adversely impact wildlife, air and water quality and exacerbate the growing problem of overuse of state lands by the public. The 230 one-way gravel truck trips a-day for 8 months a year back and forth to Maryland Creek present a safety (and noise) hazard for motorists, bikers, hikers and wildlife. Even without the additional traffic from the mining proposal, Route 9 is already congested year-round.

I am writing to seek Party status to testify about the above-mentioned application by Peak Materials to establish a gravel mining operation at the site designated as Peak Ranch Resource.

I am specifically aggrieved by this proposed project for the following reasons:

My family has lived off of Highway 9, <1 mile south of proposed mining location, since 1978. What was once an idyllic valley has slowly given way to "progress" as more and more vehicles travel through to get to points to the north and south. Our development (Sierra Bosque) is situated along a straight portion of the highway where, as soon as vehicles round a bend, they overtake slower vehicles as soon as possible, seemingly using the highway as a racetrack. Every semi-truck immediately gets passed by long streams of cars that essentially play chicken with oncoming traffic. Adding several hundred semi-truck trips per day will undoubtedly turn many of these adventure seeking Mario Andretti types into hunks of twisted metal as there isn't even enough room for all of the vehicles of today.
