Good Afternoon Wendi,

Please find below my answers to your questions.

Where should the mine sign be placed?

At a minimum, per Rule 3.1.12, the Operator will post a sign at the entrance of the mine site which shall be clearly visible from the access road. They will need to post, at a minimum, a mine sign where the haul road(s) enter the State Pit.

When should the mine sign be placed?

They will have to post a mine sign when they have Division approved access to the mine site. As you noted the haul road alignment that you show is not part of the original permit and will need an amendment to update the permit.

I hope these answer your questions.

Hey Patrick, Thanks for getting back to me.

If they place the signs at the entrance of the state pit south and east side. These will not be visible to the public at ALL! The closest public road from the east (40th lane) is about 2 miles accross private land. The one from the west (36th lane) is about 1 mile accross private land and behind a large hill. The signs are for the public correct??

You are right about many changes since the first division hearing.

I believe that part of the intent of the Rule is to make the signs visible to the public.

As the operator is planning on entering and exiting the Pueblo County Aggregate Project (PCAP) permit through the State Pit permit then a possible solution would be an additional mine sign for PCAP placed at the entrance of the State Pit.
