RE: Mountain Top Environmental Proposal, DRMS File Number M-2024-007, Division Response to "Is It Mining?" Questionnaire, Reclamation Permit is Required

Dear Thomas Halm.

On March 8, 2024, the Division of Reclamation, Mining and Safety (Division) received information for an "Is It Mining" questionnaire regarding a proposed project west of Idaho Springs, Colorado in Clear Creek County. Based on the information communicated to the Division, your proposed operation includes hauling piled waste rock off-site to Denver or Commerce City to be loaded on a train for shipment to Missouri for further processing. The approximate areal extent of the proposed extraction acres was stated to be one acre. The approximate volume to be extracted is 8,000 cubic yards.

The Mined Land Reclamation Board has requested the Division make determinations as to the need for a Mined Land Reclamation Permit. Based on the information provided in the questionnaire, it has been determined a reclamation permit **is required** for the proposed operation. The proposal meets the definition of a mining operation in accordance with C.R.S. 34-32-103(8) of the Colorado Mined Land Reclamation Act. In accordance with C.R.S. 34-32-109(2) an operator proposing to engage in a new mining operation must first obtain from our office a reclamation permit. There are several types of reclamation permits available and the appropriate one to apply for depends on the nature of the mining operation, material to be excavated, the number of acres to be affected, and the tons of mineral, overburden, or combination of the two planned to be extracted per calendar year. Based on the information you provided, a 110d permit will need to be obtained prior to conducting the operation. The applications for these types of permits may be viewed on our website (<a href="https://drms.colorado.gov/forms/minerals-program-forms">https://drms.colorado.gov/forms/minerals-program-forms</a>) and the applications include instructions and additional information you should review.

If you disagree with this decision, you may petition to appear before the Board during a formal public hearing for a Declaratory Order concerning this matter. Pursuant to Rule 2.5.2(1), the request must be submitted to the Board in writing and be received no later than ten (10) days prior to the hearing. The written request must contain the information required pursuant to Rule 2.5.2(2). The next available Board hearing will be held on March 20, 2024. All hearings are held at 1313 Sherman St., Room 318, in Denver, Colorado 80203.
