Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Soward Ranch Pit - Big Bull Dog Trucking Inc. Permit Conversion to M1988021 and expansion proposal in Mineral County. Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) has a statutory responsibility to manage all wildlife species in Colorado; this responsibility is embraced and fulfilled through CPW's mission to perpetuate the wildlife resources of the state, to provide a quality state parks system, and to provide enjoyable and sustainable outdoor recreation opportunities that educate and inspire current and future generations to serve as active stewards of Colorado's natural resources. CPW has reviewed the proposal and would like to offer the following comments on potential impacts on wildlife.

The proposed sand and gravel mining project would occur on a 1,390-acre private property owned by Soward Ranch of Creede, CO. This project would encompass ~56 acres, including ~10 acres currently permitted as a sand and gravel pit. The area is currently used for cattle grazing and drops off a bench to the Rio Grande River and associated riparian areas on the north and west sides. It is flanked to the south by Red Mountain Creek and its associated riparian areas and USFS Road #523 to the east. The proposed project area flora consists of native grasses and forbs, fringed sage, and rabbit brush.

Numerous wildlife species utilize the proposed project area and its direct surrounding habitats, including big game species such as deer and elk, small game species such as Gunnison's prairie dogs and coyote, and non-game species such as small mammals, songbirds, and raptors. River otter, a state-listed Threatened species, is also found in the Rio Grande River and its tributaries. CPW offers these comments regarding potential conflicts with wildlife in the proposed project area.

## **Big Game:**

Big game species, including elk and mule deer, utilize the proposed project area for forage and travel. Mining activities may impact these species' concentrations and increase conflicts with surrounding private lands. The project area is located within or adjacent to winter range and migratory pathways for these species. The project is within a mapped elk Severe Winter Range - High Priority Habitat (HPH). CPW recommends no permitted or authorized human activity from December 1st to April 30th annually in Severe Winter Range to protect elk during this vulnerable period. If this cannot be achieved, CPW



recommends that winter mining activities be restricted to loading and hauling operations. For detailed information on these areas of concern, please contact CPW or visit cpw.state.co.us/maps for various ways to access species activity map data. Regarding any potential fencing during the project and postmining reclamation, CPW recommends using wildlife-friendly fencing designs to reduce wildlife injury and fence maintenance. CPWs "Fencing with Wildlife in Mind" informational PDF can be found HERE.

### **Aquatic species:**

The project area lies within close proximity to Red Mountain Creek and the Rio Grande River. This portion of the Rio Grande River is classified as a Sportfish Management Water - HPH. There are special fishing regulations from the lower boundary of River Hill Campground downstream to the Highway 149 bridge at South Fork to protect fish populations and enhance public fishing opportunities for species, including rainbow and brown trout. CPW recommends no ground disturbance year-round within 500 feet of the ordinary high water mark. CPW's primary concern regarding aquatic species is maintaining water quality by limiting stream erosion and sedimentation. CPW recommends that Best Management Practices for sediment runoff control be outlined and included in the permit.

#### Non-native/Invasive Weeds:

One of the area's most visible and immediate threats to ecosystem health is non-native/invasive weeds. Invasive weeds typically flourish following surface disturbance, and active weed management should be incorporated during and after the lifespan of the proposed project. Regarding post-mining reclamation, native drought-tolerant revegetation is recommended. CPW is happy to provide a drought-tolerant native seed mix upon request, as the proposed reclamation seed mix originally was void of a native forb and shrub component.

- Other: All water used on-site shall be a legal supply of water provided by an appropriate supplier. The applicant shall confirm the legality of any proposed source of water supply with the Division of Water Resources prior to use in the operation.

**COMMENTS:** DWR office identified the location of the pit to be in section 18, which conflicts with the section 2 location claimed on portions of the application.
