You can download the [Watershed Boundary Dataset](#) and overlay the mine boundaries in GIS to see how the Deserado Mine or other projects are located in their respective HUC 10 watersheds. Colorado's current [Collared Gray Wolf Activity Map](#) shows wolf activity located East of Craig, which I don't believe would interact with Deserado Mine, but I would be happy to take a more detailed look with a map of their permitted boundary and surface operations if you still have concerns.

If a project does not interact with a polygon where wolves have been detected, as reported by Colorado's current [Collared Gray Wolf Activity Map](#), we do not have any gray wolf best management practices that would apply to that project. The project proponent should contact CPW if a gray wolf is spotted in the project area and fill out the [wolf sighting form](#). CPW will advise on best management practices to avoid potential take and facilitate any necessary conversations with USFWS.
