- 5. A map of the mine facility surface area in the town that is now covered by the Town's Special Use Purpose Permit and operating under the state of Colorado mine tour and inspection program. The entire area and the mine was covered by a now completed "Voluntary Remediation Act" permit arranged through the EPA. The site department of health and environment provided the on-site inspection and with the EPA testified to the town board in a public meeting as to the complete implementation of the remediation actions.

The actions in 2024 have not involved any surface disturbance other than the spreading of gravel to control dust generated by the tour traffic. Grass seed was also spread in the area. The grass is being controlled by the local big horn sheep herd who frequent the property very frequently.

Any action later in 2025 would be under an appropriate town permit. No mining disturbance is intended at this time.

 - a. Clean up on the approved tour path has continued involving spreading gravel to improve the walking surface as has improvement of the rail line.

The Division of Reclamation, Mining and Safety (Division) has completed its review and has accepted your Notice of Intent to Conduct Mineral Prospecting Operations (NOI) submitted for Aetna Exploration, File No. P-2021-017.

All prospecting activities are underground with a 250 ton limit. No new surface disturbance is permitted.

The Division has also reviewed and approved the financial warranty submitted for the NOI in the amount of \$2,000.00.

Pursuant to Rule 5.1.3(d)(iv), the Division's determination will not take effect until the expiration of the five business days allowed for an appeal, or in the case of an appeal, until the Mined Land Reclamation Board issues its decision. If there are no appeals within the five day appeal period, you may commence prospecting operations.

In accordance with Rule 5.8, an Annual Report and associated fee of \$86.00 must be submitted on your notice approval anniversary date (April 22) for each year following the filing of an NOI until reclamation responsibility release is granted. In addition, Rule 5.3.4 requires the prospector to notify the Division of completion of prospecting operations and Rule 5.7 requires the submittal of a final report for drill holes within 60 days of completion of the abandonment for artesian flow holes and within one year of completion of the abandonment for any other drill holes.

Please note, the acceptance of this NOI shall not be construed to abrogate the duty of the prospector to comply with other applicable laws or regulations, including but not limited to all federal, state, or local permits, licenses, and approvals, as well as any access agreements, as applicable to the specific operation.

was envisioned by the old-time miners. A veteran prospector named D. E. Dulany lived in that locality, and the presence of rich float ore among the slide talus on the side of the mountain led him to hunt for silver veins long after less persistent prospectors gave up and abandoned all hopes of success. He was finally so fortunate as to strike a lode of extraordinary richness in 1876 which he called the Free America. Reports of mill runs quickly brought in an army of prospectors from Georgetown and Central City. Dulany soon sold to General J. I. Gilbert and W. H. Moore for \$25,000 and the latter sold to Joseph Reynolds of Chicago. Other discoveries were made and the town of Lawson was built along Clear Creek at the base of the mountain during this period. The following summer the Colorado Central Railroad's Georgetown branch was extended from Floyd Hill to Georgetown, passing close by Red Elephant Mountain at Lawson, and within a half mile of its mines. After that the district was a very prosperous one. The Free America paid handsomely the following year. When the location was made, not enough work had been done to determine the course of the vein, and the consequence was that only a part of it was secured. The remainder fell to the Free America

Extension on the east, and the Boulder Nest on the west. The White—an equally important discovery—joined with the Boulder Nest and turned out to be on the same vein. The Free American had five levels leading off from the main shaft. The lower one was started in 1879 and was reported to be 430 feet below the surface at the time. There was a small vein of solid ore in the lower workings, and there were large pockets and ore-bodies at various places from the surface down: a crosscut driven on the second level for a distance of thirty-six feet encountered no walls. Reports in 1879 showed an increase of ore, which indicated as good a body in the newly opened ground as in the upper levels. The yield of the Free America was reported to have been \$100,000 in 1877, and the receipts for ore sales about \$60,000 in 1878.

Few mines in the country can show as fine a record for production and profit in the first two years of work as the Boulder Nest. When Randall visited this mine, his luck was with him as the miners had just broken into a good sized cavity where crystals lined the walls. He was able to extract some superb mineral specimens on the spot and saved them from being destroyed as mining continued. Dubois Tucker, Walter Clark and A. Fellows leased a portion of it for one
