OBSERVATIONS

This inspection was conducted by Brock Bowles of the Division of Reclamation, Mining and Safety (Division). Cody Brewer (Operator) and John Lee of the U.S.F.S. were present for the inspection. The site is a NOI operation. At the time of the inspection, it was partly cloudy, warm, and the ground was dry.

Financial Warranty:

The Division holds a bond in the amount of \$9,377. This bond was calculated on 1 July 2025 when the permit was issued. The bond amount is still adequate.

Gen. Compliance With Mine Plan:

The site features two historical portals: a lower portal, now collapsed and not used next to the main pad/parking area, and an upper portal, located approximately 500 feet uphill and to the left of the pad. Both portals were existing when the NOI was issued in July, earlier this year.

The lower pad contains a portable Conex box, leveled on wood timbers, which serves as a living/bunk area and tool storage (photo 1). To the south of the pad area, a historic tailings pile appears stable with some vegetation (photo 2), but it is not approved for mining, leveling, or any disturbance under the current NOI. Additionally, an old, antique compressor with steel wheels, housed in a makeshift lumber shed, is situated just east of the pad area, having been on-site prior to the current NOI.

The upper portal, located further up the hillside from the lower portal, is not accessible via a trail and requires bushwhacking. Mr. Brewer is considering constructing a small, low-impact walking trail to allow for safe passage with heavy backpacks, and he will coordinate with the USFS on the trail's specifics.

Approximately 30 feet in front of the upper portal (photo 3) lies a small tailings pile (photo 4), which is not approved for disturbance, mining, or expansion under the current NOI. The portal opens into a small rock outcrop (photo 5), where about six inches of water was observed extending back into the mine. A large dirt berm prevents water discharging from the mine, as the current NOI mandates that all water must remain within the mine workings. Mr. Brewer, who is fully aware of this requirement, has removed several old hoses that were previously in place, presumably for water removal.
