#### Introduction (This is for information only and no action is necessary)

Attached is the draft summary of the proposed 2021 CWCB Projects Bill for discussion and modification as necessary.

Summary of the \$6.25 million Bill request includes:

- 1. \$3.25 million funding of important CWCB Programs and Projects
- 2. \$3 million Non-Reimbursable for the San Luis Valley Confined Aquifer Recovery Project
- 3. Revision to the statute that returns the funding source to the Water Efficiency Grants that expired in July 2020.

# SENATE BILL SB21-\_\_\_ THE 2021 WATER PROJECTS BILL

## Background

The General Assembly annually authorizes water projects from the Construction Fund and the Severance Tax Perpetual Base Fund. The CWCB provides low-interest loans to domestic and agricultural water providers for water supply projects. These revolving loan funds generate interest earning that are then used for CWCB operations, programs, projects and grants to help implement Colorado's Water Plan. To date, over 600 loans have helped finance engineering, construction, and the purchase of water.

The CWCB is celebrating the fifth anniversary of Colorado's Water Plan. This Bill represents a significantly smaller list of projects and programs compared to from previous years. This minimalized project funding list will help maintain the CWCB's efforts to implement the Plan including consumptive and non-consumptive projects and activities throughout the state.

The Construction Fund was created in 1971 to provide low-interest loans for water projects and provide monies for non-reimbursable investments. The Fund is a revolving loan fund that allows the CWCB to operate without money from the state's General Fund. Revenues come from interest earnings and royalty distributions from federal mineral leases.

The Severance Tax Perpetual Base Fund was established by the General Assembly in 1997. The Fund is a revolving loan fund that receives revenues from interest earnings and from severance taxes paid by the producers of gas, oil, coal and other minerals.

**Small Project Loan Report** - A report detailing the 17 loans made in calendar year 2020, providing about \$44 million, was submitted to the General Assembly on January 15<sup>th</sup> 2021. A copy of the report is available on the legislative website at <u>www.colorado.gov</u>.

Loan interest rates are adjusted bi-monthly by CWCB. The rates midyear 2020 were:

1.30 % for agricultural loans and 1.85% to 2.35% for municipal loans 6.0% for commercial loans 2.0% for hydroelectric projects

### **Other Provisions**

(Section G)

Statutory Revision: Revision to the Colorado Revised Statutes CRS 109.3(2)c - Water Efficiency Grant Program Cash Fund

Add:

(I) To the water efficiency grant program cash fund created in section 37-60-126 (12), C.R.S., for use in accordance with that section, the following amounts:

(A) For each state fiscal year commencing on or after July 1, 2021, five hundred fifty thousand dollars.

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(II) Moneys transferred pursuant to this paragraph (c) shall be in addition to and shall not replace any moneys appropriated to the Colorado water conservation board pursuant to paragraph (d) of subsection (1) of this section.

(III) This paragraph (c) is repealed, effective July 1, 2030.

Justification - This will allow the transfer of Operational Grant funding to the Water Efficiency Program Cash Fund. It will reinstate the funding source that was repealed on July 1, 2020. The date lines up the repeal date with the program repeal date.
