Objective: Increase lead time for anticipating heavy rainfall over Colorado during the warm season (May – September)




- 14 Forecast Zones with a large range in topography
- Product informs users on heavy rainfall:
 - timing
 - location
 - intensity
 - confidence
 - nature of the threat

Products

Flood Threat Bulletin (FTB)

- Issued by 11am daily
- Identifies areas of flood risk for next 24-hours
- Possible PM updates
- State Precipitation Map (SPM)
 - Issued by 12 pm daily
 - Recaps the past 72-hours of hydrometeorological conditions
 - Rainfall totals, flooding, antecedent soil conditions
- Flood Threat Outlook (FTO)
 - Issued Monday and Thursday by 3PM
 - Outlook of threat and precipitation totals over the next 15 days
 - Rapid snowmelt, local heavy rainfall, drought development
- Fire Burn Forecast (FBF)
 - Issued by 11 am daily
 - Standalone webpage for 2021



2021 Improvements - Fire Burn Forecast

- Dedicated wildfire burn area forecast page
 - Daily monitoring and threat forecasting of 6 large burn areas
 - Fields include:
 - Multi-variable estimate of antecedent conditions
 - Percentage of burn area that received rainfall
 - Assessment of whether flooding occurred in past 24 hours
 - Threat forecast for next 24 hours
 - Archived daily (blog style) for better awareness during multi-day events






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Proposed Program Improvements

SPM Map Upgrade


- Include USGS real-time gages



Summary:

As discussed in the Flood Threat Bulletin yesterday, there was plenty of available moisture in the atmosphere on Finday and it materialized as heavy rain across the state. There were lots of heavy rain reports in the Central Mountains, Grand Valley, and Southwest Stope including another 1.75 inches reported in Olathe (who got over 1.5 inches yesterday). Other reports in this region yesterday range between 0.50 – 1.00 inches, all of which will help improve drought conditions in the very dry west.

Along the Northern Mountains, Front Range Mountains, and Urban Corridor flash flood warnings or flood advisories were issued yesterday, especially for small and urban streams after significant rainfall. The Calwood Burn Scar, Cameron Peak Burn Scar, and Hayden Pass Burn Scar we also included in these advisories. While no flooding was reported on the burn scars themselves, there was a report of flooding in Masonville. near Horselooth Mountain, west of Fort Collins (fext below).

Remark: BUCKHORN ROAD SOUTH OF BIG BEAR ROAD CITIZEN REPORTED WATER RUNNING 5 TO 6 INCHES DEEP AND GROWING RAPIDLY.
