Dear Colorado Water Conservation Board,

On behalf of the North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC), we are writing in support of the hearing on the proposed acquisition of the Shoshone Hydropower Water Rights. Agriculture on both the Western Slope and in Northeastern Colorado relies on Upper Colorado River water for agricultural production, and the status quo has provided critical reliability for both regions.

As a mutual ditch company, in addition to some native flows, about 60% of our water comes from 40,000 units of the Colorado-Big Thompson (CBT) Project. This water supports about 600 different shareholders, about 23,000 acres of farms and agricultural lands in the Wellington, CO area, and various municipal water providers in the region.

We believe the change needs to match the way these water rights were used, including in more recent years. We are concerned that the current proposed methodology for determining historic use of the senior and junior water rights overstates actual historical diversions and effectively expands the use of these rights. This expansion would change the call on the river and cut into the reliability of the CBT Project, which would significantly diminish the amount of water NPIC will be able to deliver to its shareholders.

Of our understanding of Rule 6(e) of the Rules Concerning the Colorado Instream Flow and Natural Lake Level Program, NPIC is most concerned that CWCB consider sections:

- (b) Any potential material injury to existing decreed water rights,
- (c) The historical consumptive use and historical return flows of the water right proposed for acquisition,
- (f) The effect on maximum utilization of the waters of the state,

If the CWCB supports the current ISF Draft Agreement as written, it could injure existing water rights. A more accurate study of historic use should be completed before moving ahead in water court.

I am a water resources engineer with over a decade of experience in working with Colorado River issues, including supporting with the 2021 update to the Colorado Basin Implementation Plan. My comments represent my opinion only, and do not represent the opinions of any other entity. Below are my reasons why I personally support inclusion of the Shoshone Water Rights through the State's Instream Flow Program (Shoshone Permanency Efforts).

1. Shoshone Permanency is a Priority for the Colorado Basin

The Shoshone Right is a vital piece of Colorado's water future. Protecting this right is a priority for the Colorado Basin Roundtable in our <u>Basin Implementation Plan</u>.

- This priority aligns with the Colorado Basin Roundtable's Theme # 5, to <u>Assure dependable basin administration</u>, and in particular its goal to "Protect and defend maximum mainstem calls at Shoshone Hydroelectric Plant, senior Grand Valley irrigation diversions, and Green Mountain Reservoir beneficiaries."
- This also supports Theme # 1, <u>Protect and restore healthy streams, rivers, lakes, and riparian areas</u>, and in particular its goal to "Support and provide for high-quality river and stream recreational opportunities with appropriate flows."

These themes and goals were developed with intensive stakeholder engagement across the Colorado River Basin and represent a consensus of priorities across the broad and diverse range of stakeholders throughout the basin. That level of consensus has to count for something, coming from such a diverse range of users.

2. Shoshone Permanency Supports Ecosystem Needs

The Shoshone Water Right pulls water past upstream diversions. This water right is fundamental to the natural hydrologic regime, especially in the face of increasing drought and climate variability. This keeps water in the Colorado River and its tributaries. This supports flows throughout the Basin: in the headwaters of the basin where flows are pulled past transmountain diversions, and in the Middle Colorado reach and below.

These flows support the Upper Colorado River Fish Recovery Program in the 15-Mile Reach. Native fish (Colorado pikeminnow, razorback sucker, etc.) are particularly sensitive to low flows in dry times.

Water quantity and water quality are inexorably linked. Greater flows support cooler temperatures, which are needed to sustain fisheries and reduce toxic algal blooms. Trout in particular are very sensitive to high water temperatures. Greater flows also provide dilution for other pollutants.

3. Shoshone Permanency Supports Colorado Economy

Per the <u>Colorado BIP</u>, "Colorado's outdoor recreation economy generates \$37 billion in consumer spending annually, contributes 511,000 direct jobs, and represents 10 percent of the states' gross domestic product. Those who work in the industry have collectively earned more than \$21 billion in wages and salaries, while those who support it have generated \$9 billion in state and local tax revenue."

Colorado's west slope economy is heavily dependent upon recreation based tourism. This economy includes boating and fishing, both of which are highly dependent on flows.

The flow provided by Shoshone is critical to the economy of the entire Colorado River Basin. Its flows allow for recreation downstream of Shoshone (especially fishing and boating).

Low flows increase water temperatures. When water temperatures exceed 67 degrees Fahrenheit, fish are too stressed to survive catch-and-release fishing. Even with the Shoshone water right, it is common in late summer of dry years for water temperatures to rise above 67 degF in popular fishing areas, triggering voluntary and even mandatory closures. Without Shoshone flows, these closures would be more frequent.

Losing Shoshone flows could have devastating impacts on the economy of the region.

4. Shoshone Flows Counts Toward Colorado Compact Flows

The Shoshone Water Right pulls water down past upstream diverters. After providing immense benefits to all of Colorado, these flows eventually cross the Colorado State line and count toward flows at Lees Ferry. Further depleting the flow of the Colorado River by failing to protect the Shoshone Right could exacerbate our risk of a Colorado Compact compliance scenario.

5. Shoshone Permanency Efforts are Compatible with the Needs of Colorado's Front Range

I am a resident of Glenwood Springs Colorado, and have lived in the Roaring Fork Valley since 2016. Before that, I lived my entire life on the Front Range of Colorado, where I was raised on transmountain diversions. I understand the importance of transmountain diversions for Colorado. I drank that water. I boated on those flows. I swam in those reservoirs. I ate produce grown with those diversions. I believe the Shoshone Permanency Efforts are compatible with the needs of Colorado's Front Range. The Shoshone Permanency Effort strives to maintain the status quo, not to change it. I understand some Front Range water providers have concerns about the exact amount per the historical use analysis. Those details can be worked out in the Water Court process. Please do not let concern over these details derail this monumental effort and once-in-a-FOREVER opportunity to protect the Colorado River.

I represent the City of Fort Collins Utilities. We provide water to approximately 143,000 people and numerous businesses in Fort Collins, which is the 4th largest city in Colorado. Although we are supported partially by flows from the Cache la Poudre River, about 60% of our demands are met from our ownership of units in the Colorado-Big Thompson (CBT) Project. This reliance on Colorado River supplies makes us very concerned about what may happen with the Shoshone Hydropower Water Rights.

Our organization supports changing the Shoshone Hydropower Water Rights to an instream flow use. However, we are concerned that the current proposed methodology for determining historic use of the senior and junior water rights significantly overstates actual historical diversions and effectively expands the use of these rights by not including the more recent years use of these water rights. This expansion would change the call on the river and cut into the reliability of the CBT Project, which would significantly diminish the amount of CBT water that is critical to meeting our customers' demands.

The City of Fort Collins has a history of conserving and using our resources efficiently, with programs and campaigns going back decades. Therefore, a decrease in CO River supplies could result in more frequent and severe water restrictions that would impact customers' quality of life, the ability to support our agricultural sector, and our local businesses, breweries, and other industries that are important to our community and economy.

From our understanding of Rule 6(e) of the Rules Concerning the Colorado Instream Flow and Natural Lake Level Program, Fort Collins Utilities is most concerned that the CWCB carefully considers the following sections:

- (b) Any potential material injury to existing decreed water rights
- (c) The historical consumptive use and historical return flows of the water right proposed for acquisition
- (f) The effect on maximum utilization of the waters of the state

It is our understanding that this is the largest instream flow acquisition request considered by the CWCB and the State of Colorado. Further, we understand the South Platte representatives of the CWCB have recused themselves from the issue, leaving our entity unrepresented. Thus, it becomes more important for the other Board members to ensure all concerns are appropriately considered.

We urge the CWCB to approve the acquisition with appropriate safeguards for the junior water rights that provide millions of people on the Front Range with critical water supplies. Those safeguards include:

- The CWCB maintaining its authority to determine when and how the rights are called.
- Accepting the Acquisition in a manner that directs staff to ensure no injury will occur to junior existing water rights.
- Supporting in the water court change case a historic use methodology that represents the actual historical use of the rights over the last 25 years and does not expand the use of the rights to the detriment of junior water users.
- Recognition of the terms of existing agreements between all the parties. These agreements entered into by the River District with Northern Colorado Water Conservancy District, Aurora Water, Denver Water, Colorado Springs Utilities and the Bureau of Reclamation have created a de facto instream flow right that also contains important drought protections.

The CWCB has an obligation to ensure that its ISF rights, particularly this one, comply with Colorado law, and balance the needs of users with the need to protect the environment. We urge the CWCB not to rush this process but to take the time needed to get this right. Please approve a plan that keeps the status quo river conditions, protects the environment, and all the communities it serves including those of us in Northeast Colorado.

Colorado Water Trust ("Water Trust") is writing to provide a public comment letter regarding the Colorado Water Conservation Board's ("CWCB") proposed acquisition of an interest in the Shoshone Water Rights for instream flow use on the mainstem of the Colorado River. These comments are offered neither in support of nor in opposition to the proposed acquisition. Rather, they are offered to provide clarification and insight on an issue that has been raised by several parties in their August 4, 2025, Prehearing Statements and are offered based on the Water Trust's professional experience working with the CWCB's acquisition program.

Several parties have argued in their prehearing statements that the proposed acquisition agreement between CWCB and the Colorado River Water Conservation District ("District") impermissibly limits the CWCB's statutory authority and discretion to manage instream flow rights. Specifically, these parties argue that the language in Paragraph 7 of the Draft

Shoshone Water Rights Dedication and ISF Agreement² requiring the CWCB to place a call for the Shoshone Water Rights for instream flow use—subject to some exceptions—any time the flow rate at a certain gauge drops below a specific rate represents a term that improperly limits the agency's ability to adjust or remove the call for other considerations.³ These parties also argue that allowing an exception to the above requirement if CWCB and the District agree in writing to reduce the instream flow call improperly grants the district "veto authority" over the CWCB's decision making power.⁴

In contrast, our decades-long experience in water sharing agreements reflects a different understanding of this issue: that CWCB's abilities outlined in Instream Flow Rule 10, 2 CCR 408-2 ("ISF Rule 10") to enter into agreements to a) partially limit its own discretion to manage an instream flow water right, or to b) delegate limited authority to act on its behalf are neither contrary to law nor a novel approach taken in this particular proposed transaction. ⁵

Because the Water Trust is not a party to this acquisition hearing, we do not offer a separate legal rebuttal in this comment letter to the Front Range Parties' position other than to say our experience is consistent with the positions on this limited issue described in the CWCB's and the District's prehearing statements. Rather, this comment letter describes the Water Trust's experience in facilitating acquisitions on behalf of the CWCB and the role that these two CWCB authorities play in maintaining the flexibility and durability of the state's instream flow program.

The mission of the Water Trust is to restore water to Colorado's rivers and streams. During its 24-year history, the Water Trust has completed 27 flow restoration projects across the

state, and many involve permanent or temporary acquisitions in support of the instream flow program. Several projects that we have completed in partnership with the CWCB are based on agreements that—in accordance with ISF Rule 10—either limit the CWCB's discretion or delegate limited authority to the Water Trust or other partners to act on its behalf.

Perhaps the best example of both of these ISF Rule 10 abilities is our McKinley Ditch Project in Division 4. In this project, we originally partnered with the non-profit entity Western Rivers Conservancy ("WRC") that purchased both irrigated ranch land out of foreclosure, as well as the associated water rights on the Little Cimarron River, tributary to both the Cimarron and Gunnison Rivers. While WRC worked to ultimately re-market the ranch, it sold the water rights to the Water Trust. The Water Trust partnered with the CWCB to seek water court approval to add instream flow use to the water rights. (Please see the decree for this project in Case No. 14CW3108, included herein as **Attachment 1**.)

Colorado Water Trust continues to hold title to these water rights, and we conveyed a permanent grant of flow restoration to the CWCB for instream flow use and a deeded a separate grant of use to the landowner for irrigation. (Please see the Grant of Flow Restoration Use between the Water Trust and the CWCB included herein as **Attachment 2** ("Grant").) Both agreements lay out the process by which these entities will coordinate use of the water each year, whether it is a full season of continued irrigation, a full season of instream flow use, or a split-season of shared use. In an average hydrologic year, the landowner may use the water to grow crops during the first part of the irrigation season; and in the second half of the season, irrigation ceases and the CWCB uses the water for instream flow on the Little Cimmaron and Cimmaron Rivers. These arrangements also allow for full season irrigation or full-season instream flow use if there is an exceptionally wet or dry year.

The Grant also specify how the parties, specifically the CWCB and the Water Trust, will work together to identify which use scenario they will implement each year. Similar to the proposed acquisition agreement between CWCB and the District, the Grant for our McKinley project also expressly grants limited authority to the Water Trust in accordance with ISF Rule 10 to act as CWCB's agent in the administration and monitoring of the instream flow use of those water rights.



This arrangement, as outlined by Paragraphs 5 and 7 of the Grant, provides both some level of certainty but also some flexibility for other users of this water. Such a split-season arrangement would be nearly impossible without the CWCB's ability to limit its own discretion. For projects of this nature to operate successfully as intended, the CWCB must have the flexibility to enter into agreements to reasonably limit its own discretion in how and when it operates the instream flow water right. Likewise, the CWCB needs to be able to delegate some level of authority to other parties to act on its behalf, given the growing number of projects it is involved with and its limited resources and capacity.

In addition to the McKinley project, over the years the Water Trust has helped facilitate other projects around the state—both permanent and temporary—that rely on similar limitation-of-discretion or delegation-of-authority arrangements with the CWCB for success. In our years of supporting the CWCB, the Water Trust has found these ISF Rule 10 abilities to be vital for creating successful partnerships between environmental flow protection and other water uses, such as agricultural and municipal. This flexibility allows water rights owners to enter into long-term and short-term acquisition agreements with the CWCB while retaining some autonomy to continued use of their property rights as needed (and as agreed to). The Water Trust is concerned that, without these options, the demand from water users to participate in flexible water-sharing agreements with the CWCB would be greatly diminished statewide.

The importance of these flexible arrangements is also reflected in the Colorado Water Plan, which identifies water sharing as a key strategy for balancing multiple uses of water in the state. Water sharing is described in the plan as critical to closing the gap in meeting environmental and recreational flow needs, while at the same time supporting continued agricultural and municipal use. In our experience, CWCB's ability to occasionally limit its discretion and delegate limited authority to partners can be key practical mechanisms that enable these agreements to function effectively and succeed over the long term. These ISF Rule 10 abilties also help build trust and confidence with partners by ensuring their needs are considered in the operation of the agreement, which in turn makes potential partners more willing to participate in water-sharing agreements for the first time.

In summary, the Water Trust does not agree with the Front Range Parties' characterization that the CWCB may not limit its own discretion or grant authority to another entity, as is proposed in the acquisition agreement with the District. Based on our experience, agreements incorporating limited discretion and delegation have long been part of the



CWCB's practice and are consistent with its statutory authority under ISF Rule 10. Moreover, these ISF Rule 10 abilities are critical to the continued success of the instream flow acquisition program: They allow the CWCB to implement flexible, durable watersharing arrangements that balance the needs of instream flow protection with the continuing needs of the water rights owners, whether they are agricultural, industrial, or municipal. Without these abilities, many long-term and short-term acquisitions would not be possible. The CWCB's use of these authorities has been a consistent and accepted practice, and they remain important to the continued flexibility and effectiveness of the instream flow acquisition program.

FINDINGS OF FACT, CONCLUSIONS OF LAW, RULING OF THE REFEREE, AND DECREE OF THE WATER COURT

This matter comes before the Water Referee upon the Application for Change of Water Rights (the "Application") filed by the above captioned applicants (the "Co-Applicants"). The Referee, having made such investigations as are necessary to determine whether the statements in the Application are true, and having become fully advised with respect to this matter, hereby makes the following findings of fact, conclusions of law, and ruling:

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. <u>Co-Applicants</u>. The Application in this matter was filed on December 31, 2014 by the Co-Applicants, the Colorado Water Trust ("Water Trust") and the Colorado Water Conservation Board (the "CWCB").
- **2.** <u>Jurisdiction</u>. All notices required by law have been duly given, and the Water Court has jurisdiction over the Application and all parties affected thereby, whether or not they have chosen to appear.
- **Statements of Opposition**. Statements of opposition to the Application were timely filed by David Taylor and Wayne Maurer. The Collier Ditch Company filed and was granted an Uncontested Motion to Intervene. All Opposers have stipulated to the entry of this Ruling and Decree.
- **4.** <u>Consultation Report</u>. The Court has considered the Summary of Consultation dated May 14, 2015 filed in this matter by the Division Engineer and the Co-Applicants' Response thereto.
- 5. Overview. The Water Trust is a Colorado nonprofit corporation that seeks to restore and protect streamflows in Colorado using voluntary, market-based tools. The Water Trust owns 1.5 of the 8 shares (18.75%) in the water rights decreed to the McKinley Ditch (the "Shares"), a ditch with four priorities that diverts water from the Little Cimarron River, a tributary of the Cimarron River, a tributary of the Gunnison River. In furtherance of the Water Trust's mission, the Water Trust conveyed to the CWCB a Grant of Flow Restoration Use (the "Grant"), attached as Exhibit A. The Grant conveys to the CWCB the permanent right to use the Shares to preserve

and/or improve the natural environment to a reasonable decree pursuant to the terms of the Grant. At its September 12, 2014 meeting, the CWCB found that the Grant would preserve and/or improve the natural environment of the Little Cimarron River and the Cimarron River, to be used exclusively by the CWCB pursuant to Section 37-92-102(3), C.R.S. (2016). The Water Trust retains the underlying ownership of the Shares.

Under the proposed change of water rights, the preferred use of the Shares will be a split season use, with the historical irrigation use being made during the first part of the irrigation season and instream flow use being made in the later part of the irrigation season. However, in some years the Shares will only be used for irrigation, and in other years the Shares will only be used for instream flow use. Accordingly, a change of water rights is sought to add instream flow use by the CWCB to the existing decreed irrigation use of the Shares.

6.6 Previous Changes:

- 6.6.1 Case No. 05CW132, decreed on May 2, 2008 by the District Court for Water Division 4, corrected the point of diversion for the McKinley Ditch to the point referenced in Section 6.3 above.
- 6.6.2 Case No. 12CW52, decreed on February 14, 2013 by the District Court for Water Division 4, confirmed the historical place of use irrigation under the McKinley Ditch. That case also confirmed that each priority under the McKinley Ditch may be used on all lands irrigated under the McKinley Ditch, subject to certain terms and conditions set forth in that decree.
 - 6.7 Decreed use: Irrigation.

7. Description of Proposed Change:

- 7.1 Change of Water Right to Add Instream Flow Use: In addition to the existing decreed irrigation use, Co-Applicants seek approval to use the Shares for instream flow use exclusively by the CWCB pursuant to the terms of the Grant and Section 37-92-102(3), C.R.S. (2016) for preservation and/or improvement of the natural environment to a reasonable degree, within stream Segments One, Two and Three described in Section 7.2 below. Any water so used for instream flow will be in addition to any other water to which the CWCB would otherwise be entitled pursuant to its existing or future decreed instream flow water rights on the Cimarron River described in Section 7.1.1 below.
- 7.1.1 <u>Existing Decreed Instream Flow Water Right</u>: The CWCB currently holds a decreed instream flow right on the Cimarron River, described in the table below.

The CWCB intends to use the Shares in priority for instream flow uses in Segment 3, described in Section 7.2 below, in combination with or in addition to the decreed instream flow appropriation described above. Use will be for preservation of the natural environment at times when the existing instream flow is not fully met, and for improvement of the natural environment at flow rates above the decreed rate of the existing instream flow right when the existing instream flow water right is fully met.

7.2 <u>Instream Flow Segments</u>: The instream flow use will occur in three stream segments of the Little Cimarron and Cimarron Rivers, described below and depicted on Figure 1 attached hereto.

7.2.1 Segment One:

(a) Upper terminus: A point on the Little Cimarron River in the NW1/4 NW1/4 NW1/4, Section 12, Township 47 North, Range 6 West, N.M.P.M., as further described in the UTM Coordinates Table 3 above. This is the existing point of diversion of the McKinley Ditch.

(b) Lower terminus: A point on the Little Cimarron River where the return flows from the historical use of the Shares returned to the Little Cimarron River, estimated

to be upstream of the Perrin Ditch headgate in the NE1/4, Section 27, Township 48 North, Range 6 West, N.M.P.M., as further described in the UTM Coordinates Table 3 above.

7.2.2 Segment Two:

- (a) Upper terminus: A point on the Little Cimarron River where the return flows from the historical place of use of the Shares return to the Little Cimarron River, estimated to be upstream of the Perrin Ditch headgate in the NE1/4, Section 27, Township 48 North, Range 6 West, N.M.P.M., as further described in the UTM Coordinates Table 3 above.
- (b) Lower terminus: The confluence of the Little Cimarron River and the Cimarron River, as further described in the UTM Coordinates Table 3 above.

7.2.3 Segment Three:

- (a) Upper terminus: The confluence of the Little Cimarron River and the Cimarron River, as further described in the UTM Coordinates Table 3 above.
- (b) Lower terminus: The confluence of the Cimarron River and the Gunnison River, as further described in the UTM Coordinates Table 3 above.

8. <u>Historical Use</u>.

The additional uses described in Section 7 are based on a historical use analysis performed by Bishop-Brogden Associates ("BBA"). Historical irrigation use of the Shares resulted in a net depletion to the Little Cimarron River during the irrigation season and a net accretion to the river during the non-irrigation season. Historically, there have been no calls on the Little Cimarron River outside of the irrigation season. During operation of the instream flow use of the Shares, the non-irrigation return flows are included in the bypassed water and will naturally accrue to the stream and be available to other water users below Segment Three. The study period for the analysis was 1974 through 2013. This study period is sufficiently long, includes a representative variety of wet, average, and dry years, and is representative of the historical use of the McKinley Ditch, meeting the requirements of § 37-92-305(d), C.R.S. (2016).

8.1 <u>Irrigation and Instream Flow Seasons of use</u>. The historical irrigation season of the Shares was from April through November. For the change of the Shares approved in this decree, the season of use shall be from May 1 through October 31, for either irrigation or instream flow use, subject to the volumetric limits set forth in 9.3.2 below. Any diversions at the McKinley headgate made by the ditch during the months of April or November attributable to the Shares shall be measured and immediately returned to and relinquished to the stream.

8.2 <u>Historical Diversions</u>. To determine the amount of in-priority diversions to the historically irrigated property, the total diversions were limited to diversions taken in-priority, up to the decreed flow rate and then were pro-rated by the ratio of 1.5/8 shares (18.75%). The historical in-priority diversions of the Shares are as follows:

- 8.3 <u>Ditch Losses.</u> Ditch losses in the McKinley Ditch suffered by the Shares were historically 10% of the amount diverted.
- 8.4 <u>Historical Net Depletions</u>. The Shares were used to irrigate pasture grass on the 194.5 acres depicted on Figure 1 attached hereto. However, this analysis of the historical depletions limits the irrigated acreage to 177.5625 acres per the decreed acreage in Case No. 12CW52. Furthermore, 87.5625 acres was used in the historical use analysis when only the senior McKinley Ditch water right (Priority 56) was in priority. Net irrigation season depletions were determined using the Modified Blaney-Criddle method in the State CU model. A value of 10% was used to account for ditch loss. Climate data was obtained from the NOAA Cimarron

weather station. A maximum irrigation efficiency of 55% was used in the model, as all the lands under the McKinley Ditch are flood-irrigated. Soil moisture capacity was determined through an analysis of underlying soils. Forty percent of ground water returns flows were lagged using a Glover analysis.

The historical net depletions from the in-priority diversions in each month of the future instream flow season of use resulting from such irrigation of 177.6 acres were as follows:

9. Future Operations.

9.1 <u>Use of the Shares - Scenarios</u>. The preferred future use of the Shares will be split season use, whereby the Shares will continue to be used to irrigate the historically irrigated land in the first part of the irrigation season and then used during the remainder of the irrigation season for instream flow use instead of irrigation. This will allow the historically irrigated land to remain irrigated for at least part of the year, but makes the Shares available to preserve and/or improve the natural environment in Segments One, Two and Three in the later part of the irrigation season when stream flows normally drop. Alternatively, the Shares may be also used

for irrigation throughout the entire irrigation season or for instream flow for the entire irrigation season.

- 9.2 <u>Notification</u>. To provide sufficient notice of which of the above operational scenarios will be used in any given year, the Co-Applicants will give the Division Engineer, the Collier Ditch Company [Jack Perrin, President of Collier Ditch Company, at his email address: Perrin, Karen (kperrin@coloradomesa.edu), or such other person as the Collier Ditch Company may designate], and Three P's LLC [Garry Forney, 1701 Bowker Rd., El Centro, CA 92243, garryf@bullentinc.net] or Three P's LLC's successor in interest 30-day notice before use of the Shares for instream flow.
- 9.3 <u>Instream Flow Rates by Segment</u>. Flow rates for instream use of the Shares will vary by Segment. When in priority, these flow rates will be available daily for instream flow use by the CWCB, subject to the limitations in Table 8. In the event that this amount is not physically available at the McKinley Ditch headgate, the CWCB will be entitled to place an administrative call on the Little Cimarron at the McKinley headgate.
 - 9.3.1 <u>Segment One.</u> As noted above, the historical use of the Shares was fully depletive to the Little Cimarron River throughout Segment One, as return flows from irrigation use of the Shares did not accrue to the stream until the upstream terminus of Segment Two. Accordingly, in Segment One, the rate of flow that may be bypassed past the headgate of the McKinley Ditch for instream flow purposes will be equal to the Co-Applicant's pro rata portion of the decree priorities for the McKinley Ditch then in priority available at the McKinley Ditch headgate, as limited herein, less 10% of such amount to be diverted down the McKinley Ditch to replicate historical ditch losses.
 - 9.3.2 Further, in order to avoid enlarged use of the Shares, Co-Applicants shall be limited to the following monthly, annual, and 20-year volumetric limits set forth in Table 8 for their pro rata share of water available for diversions at the McKinley Ditch, whether the water is used for irrigation or instream flows.

Co-Applicants' diversions in any month shall be limited to the lesser of either (1) the maximum allowable diversion for that month or (2) the maximum diversion that is allowable under the 20-year volumetric limitation for that month. The maximum diversion allowable under the 20-year volumetric limitation in any particular month shall be calculated by subtracting the total of the diversions during the previous 19 years in that particular month from the 20-year volumetric limitation for that particular month. In applying the 20-year volumetric limitations during the initial 20-year period following entry of this decree, the Co-Applicant's cumulative headgate diversion entitlements cannot exceed one-half of the 20-year monthly volumetric limitation in either the first or last 10-year period. In addition, the Co-Applicants' diversions shall be limited to 1,158 acre-feet in any May 1 through October 31 period.

9.3.3 <u>Segments Two and Three.</u> In segments Two and Three the rates of flow that can be used for instream flow purposes are the historical net depletions determined by multiplying the pro rata portion of the decree priorities for the McKinley Ditch then in priority available at the McKinley Ditch headgate determined in Section 9.3.1 for Segment One, by the monthly depletion factors shown in Table 9 (which factors take into account the ten percent ditch loss in the McKinley Ditch), and then reduced for transit losses pursuant to Paragraph 11.6 below.

10. Maintenance of Historical Return Flows.

- 10.1 <u>Irrigation Season Return Flows</u>. Under full season irrigation, irrigation season return flows will occur as they have historically. Under full season instream flow use, irrigation season return flows will be maintained through delivery of return flows as a portion of the bypassed instream flow water. Under a split-season scenario, historical irrigation season return flows will be maintained through a combination of historical irrigation use of the Shares and delivery of bypassed instream flow water.
- 10.2 Non-Irrigation Season Return Flows. There have been no historical calls on the Little Cimarron River outside of the irrigation season. As described in Section 7.1.1, the CWCB has an existing, year-round instream flow right downstream on the Cimarron River in Segment Three - the Cimarron River from its confluence with the Little Cimarron River to its confluence with the Gunnison River. Segment Three has benefitted from non-irrigation season return flows from the historical irrigation use of the Shares. However, pursuant to 2 CCR 408-2(6)(e) of the Rules Concerning the Colorado Instream Flow and Natural Lake Level Program, the CWCB has determined that the benefit to the natural environment of the Little Cimarron and the Cimarron River from this project during the irrigation season outweighs the potential detriment to the natural environment that could result in some years from unmaintained lagged return flows to the Cimarron River. During operation of the instream flow use of the Shares, the non-irrigation season return flows are included as part of the bypassed water and will naturally accrue to the stream and be available to other water users below Segment Three. Consequently, no injury will occur to downstream water rights and this change will not require the replacement of any historical non-irrigation season return flows during the non-irrigation season.
- 11. <u>Additional Terms and Conditions</u>. The following additional terms and conditions on the operation of the change approved herein are required, and are adequate, to protect other owners or users of water rights or decreed conditional water rights from material injury.
- 11.1. <u>Diversion/Bypass Only In Priority</u>. Diversions of the Shares for irrigation use and bypass of the Shares for instream flow use shall be limited to periods that the McKinley Ditch water rights are in priority, and only occur from May 1 through October 31 for irrigation and instream flow use.
- 11.2 <u>Limitation of Irrigated Acreage</u>. During periods of a valid downstream senior call, the use of the Shares for continued irrigation shall be limited to 87.5625 acres if only Priority 56 is in priority and limited to 177.5625 acres if all of the Shares' priorities are in priority. At times without a valid call, irrigation may occur on the entire 194.5 acres as provided in Case No. 12CW52.
- 11.3 <u>No Split of Priorities</u>. The Co-Applicants shall only use all the priorities of the Shares for continued irrigation or for instream flow uses, and will not split the uses by priority. The Co-Applicants shall apply the Shares to continued irrigation or to instream flow uses for

whole-month increments throughout the irrigation season. Once the Shares are used for instream flow purposes in any one year, the Shares shall continue to be bypassed for instream flow purposes for the remainder of that irrigation year.

- 11.4 <u>Ditch Loss</u>. During months that the Shares are being bypassed to the stream for instream flow use and other McKinley Ditch shares are being diverted for irrigation, 10% of the flow rate bypassed at the McKinley Ditch for instream flow as determined in Section 9.3.1 shall be left in the McKinley Ditch to protect the remaining shareholders for ditch loss.
- 11.5 <u>Dry-up</u>. During the months that the Shares are being bypassed to the stream for instream flow use, the historically irrigated land may not be irrigated by the Shares or other existing McKinley Ditch shares; however, the historically irrigated land may be irrigated by sources approved in a subsequent decree, through a substitute water supply plan, or by other statutory mechanism.
- 11.6 <u>Transit Losses</u>. The transit losses associated with delivery of the changed right through the instream flow segments will be determined and assessed by the Division Engineer, as provided in the Stipulation Between Co-Applicants and Opposer the Collier Ditch Company ("Collier Ditch Company Stipulation"), at the time deliveries are made.
- 12. <u>The Collier Ditch Company Stipulation and Wayne Maurer Stipulation Terms</u>. Co-Applicants have filed stipulations herein with The Collier Ditch Company and Wayne Maurer, which the Court has approved and hereby incorporates into this decree.
- 13. <u>Administration Past Downstream Headgates</u>. The Division Engineer shall administer the portion of the Shares in priority and changed to instream flow use past any headgates in Segment One as determined in Section 9.3.1, including the Collier Ditch headgate, provided that adequate structures are in place to bypass and measure such bypassed water, as provided in the Collier Ditch Company Stipulation. Within Segments Two and Three, the Division Engineer shall administer the portion of the Shares in priority and changed to instream flow use as determined in Section 9.3.3 past any headgates, provided that adequate structures are in place to bypass and measure such bypassed water.
- 14. <u>Conjunctive Administration</u>. For the purposes of administration of the McKinley Ditch for instream flow purposes, the CWCB shall be entitled to call for and exercise the Shares, up to the amounts decreed herein, alone or in combination with the existing instream flow water right described in Section 7.1.1 or any future instream flow water right(s), under each water right's respective priority. The CWCB's exercise of the McKinley Ditch for instream flow purposes shall not decrease the amount of water that can be called for and used under its existing instream flow water right.

- Measurement and Accounting. The Co-Applicants shall install such measuring devices and maintain and submit monthly accounting records as may be required by the Division Engineer. Co-Applicants shall also submit such required monthly accounting records to a designated representative of the Collier Ditch. Co-Applicants shall also submit such required monthly accounting records to Three P's LLC or its successor in interest at the address in Section 9.2 until notified otherwise.
- **16. Downstream Use.** During years in which the Shares are used for instream flow use, either for a partial or full season, the Water Trust retains the right to bring about beneficial use of the historical consumptive use of the Shares downstream of Segment Three as fully consumable reusable water pursuant to section 37-92-102(3), C.R.S. (2016).
- 17. <u>No Material Injury.</u> The change of water rights described herein, subject to the terms and conditions set forth herein, will not injuriously affect any person entitled to use water under a vested water right or a decreed conditional water right.
- **18.** Can and Will. The change of water rights described herein is not speculative, can and will be completed within a reasonable time, and otherwise meets all legal requirements.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- **19.** <u>Incorporation</u>. To the extent they constitute legal conclusions, the foregoing Findings of Fact are incorporated herein.
- **20.** <u>Complete Application</u>. The Application is complete, covering all applicable matters required pursuant to the Water Right Determination and Administration Act of 1969, C.R.S. §37-92-101-602.
- **21.** <u>Fulfillment of Legal Requirements</u>. Applicants have fulfilled all legal requirements for a decree as requested.

RULING OF THE REFEREE

THEREFORE, the Water Referee rules as follows:

- 22. <u>Fully Incorporated Ruling of the Referee</u>. The foregoing Findings of Fact and Conclusion of Law are hereby fully incorporated into this Ruling of the Referee.
- 23. <u>Change of Water Rights</u>. The change of water rights described above is hereby granted, subject all of the terms and conditions set forth above.

- 24. Retained Jurisdiction. Pursuant to the provisions of C.R.S. §37-92-304(6), the Court shall retain jurisdiction over the change of water rights granted herein for reconsideration of the question of whether the provisions of this decree are necessary or sufficient to prevent injury to the vested water rights of others. The Court's retained jurisdiction period shall automatically terminate five years after the first day of instream flow use of all or part of the Shares hereunder by the CWCB below the Collier Ditch. During said period, the Court's retained jurisdiction may be invoked by any existing party to this case by petition, with appropriate notice to all other parties. The petition shall set forth with particularity the specific injury alleged, together with proposed decretal language that the petitioner contends would remedy the alleged injury that is the basis for the petition. The person filing the petition shall have the burden of proof to establish that the modification sought is required to avoid injury to the petitioner.
- 25. <u>No Precedent</u>. This Decree is entered into by way of compromise and settlement of this litigation. Any agreements or terms and conditions herein are due solely to the unique circumstances and facts of this case. This Decree shall not establish any precedent and shall not be construed as a commitment to include any specific findings of fact, conclusions of law, specific engineering methodologies, or administrative practices in future stipulations or decrees..
- 26. **Filing**. A copy of this Judgment and Decree shall be filed with the Water Clerk for Water Division 4, and this Decree shall become effective upon such filing. A copy of this Judgment and Decree shall also be filed with the Division Engineer for Water Division 4 and with the State Engineer.

GRANT OF FLOW RESTORATION USE

This GRANT OF FLOW RESTORATION USE (this "Grant") dated this 22 day of April, 2015, is between the COLORADO WATER TRUST (the "Trust"), a Colorado nonprofit corporation, and the COLORADO WATER CONSERVATION BOARD (the "Board"), an agency of the State of Colorado (sometimes collectively referred to herein as the "Parties").

- 1. The Water Rights. The following water rights were decreed to the McKinley Ditch that is located or irrigates land in the Counties of Montrose and Gunnison, and were conveyed to the Trust by Special Warranty Deed dated January 6, 2014, which was recorded in the real property records of Gunnison County, Colorado on January 15, 2014, at Reception No. 625180 and in the real property records of Montrose County, Colorado on January 29, 2014, at Reception No. 853303. The Trust owns an undivided 18.75% in each of the following priorities ("Water Rights"):
 - Priority 56, decreed in Civil Action No. 1319, District Court, Montrose County, March 28, 1904 for 12.17 cfs
 - Priority 125, decreed in Civil Action No. 1745, District Court, Montrose County, May 8, 1913 for 3.125 cfs
 - Priority 128, decreed in Civil Action No. 1745, District Court, Montrose County, May 8, 1913 for 3.125 cfs
 - Priority 285, decreed in Civil Action No. 4742, District Court, Montrose County, April 21, 1941 for 12.58 cfs

The Water Rights were subsequently changed by decree in Case No. 05CW132 dated May 30, 2008 and by decree in Case No. 12CW52 dated February 15, 2013, District Court, Water Division 4.

- 2. Grant. Subject to the covenants and reservations hereinafter contained, the Trust, for due and sufficient consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, does hereby grant to the Board the permanent right to use the Water Rights to preserve and/or improve the natural environmental to a reasonable decree (the "Grant") in the following stream reaches for the following purposes:
 - a. Instream flow use ("Full Season Instream Flow Use") exclusively by the Board for the entire irrigation season to preserve and/or improve the natural environment to a reasonable degree in the following stream reaches (the "Instream Flow Reaches):
 - i. Little Cimarron River from the McKinley headgate downstream to its confluence with the Cimarron River.



- ii. Cimarron River from its confluence with the Little Cimarron River downstream to its confluence with the Gunnison River.
- b. A split-season arrangement ("Split-Season Use"), where during a single irrigation season, the Water Rights are used for irrigation in the first part of the irrigation season and then instream flow use exclusively by the Board for the remain of the irrigation season to preserve and/or improve the natural environment to a reasonable degree in the Instream Flow Reaches.
- 3. The Parties intend that the Grant shall run with the Water Rights and shall burden the Trust's successors and assigns.
- 4. <u>Change Case</u>. The Parties recognize the need to obtain a change of the Water Rights to allow the desired use of the Water Rights for instream flow purposes as contemplated herein. Pursuant to the Water Rights Acquisition Agreement dated <u>April 2</u>, 2015 between the Parties regarding the Water Rights, the Parties will file as co-applicants an application for such a change with the District Court in and for Water Division No., 4 (the "Change Case"). This Grant shall be subject to any terms and conditions in the Change Case decree. If the Change Case is denied, in whole or in part, for any reason, or is conditioned in such a manner as to prevent the purposes of this Grant from being fulfilled, the Parties shall consult with each regarding future use of the Water Rights.
- 5. <u>Annual Operation</u>. The Parties agree that Split-Season Use is the preferred use of the Water Rights in any given year. Recognizing that Split-Season Use may not be feasible or desirable by the Parties in every year, the Trust and the Board agree that under the following circumstances, full season irrigation or Full Season Instream Flow Use may occur under the following circumstances (the "Special Circumstances"):
 - a. Full season irrigation may occur if the Parties agree that:
 - i. projected climatological conditions are such that there is no need to use the Water Rights to preserve and/or improve the natural environment in the Instream Flow Reaches; or
 - ii. there is a land management issue that requires full season irrigation, such as re-vegetation of the historically irrigated land; or
 - iii. there is an unanticipated or pressing situation that renders full season irrigation necessary.
 - b. Full Season Instream Flow Use may occur if the Parties agree that:



- i. projected climatological conditions are such that there is a need for the use of the Water Rights for Full Season Instream Flow Use to preserve and/or improve the natural environment in the Instream Flow Reaches; or
- ii. circumstances make irrigation impractical, including unavailability of a lessee for irrigation; or
- iii. there is an unanticipated or pressing situation that renders Full Season Instream Flow Use necessary.

The Parties agree to consult before April 1 of each year to determine whether any Special Circumstances exist and to discuss the use of the Water Rights during the upcoming irrigation season. If no Special Circumstances exist, but the Parties do not agree on whether to begin instream flow use on July 1 or August 1, the Parties shall hire a mediator to assist them in reaching agreement on the start date. Subject to the availability of funds, the Parties shall split the costs of the mediator.

- 6. <u>Irrigation Use</u>. Under either the full season irrigation or Split-Season Use scenario, the Trust shall have the right to allow the use (by lease or otherwise) the Water Rights for the period in question to irrigators under the McKinley Ditch or other ditches below the McKinley Ditch for irrigation use, for such consideration and on such terms as the Trust desires, provided there is no diminishment of yield to the Water Rights for instream flow use or injury to existing instream flow water rights, to the satisfaction of CWCB. The Board shall have no responsibilities and bear no costs for such irrigation use of the Water Rights. Under the Split-Season Use scenario, the Trust shall coordinate all aspects of the irrigation use, including the switch from irrigation to instream flow use.
- 7. Administration. Pursuant to 2 CCR 408(2)(10), the Board hereby authorizes the Trust to be the CWCB's agent for administration and monitoring of the instream flow use of the Water Rights. If the stream flow at any monitored point falls below the decreed instream flow amount provided by the Water Rights, the Trust shall notify the staff of the Board. Upon consultation with the Trust and the Division of Water Resources, the staff of the Board shall place a call for administration of the Water Rights if appropriate. The Trust shall provide an annual report to the Board regarding the use of the Water Rights each year and the actions taken by the Trust as the Board's agent. Such report shall be due on or before December 31st of each year.
- 8. <u>Injury with Mitigation</u>. If the Board and Trust successfully obtain a decree in the Change Case, the Board commits to use the Water Rights, as changed, for instream flow purposes to preserve and/or improve the natural environment to a reasonable degree, consistent with the terms of the decree and this Grant, and to take all reasonable steps to enforce those rights for instream flow purposes and protect them from injury. If the Board receives a request to consider injury with

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mitigation for the portion of the Little Cimarron River and/or Cimarron River benefited by the change of the Water Rights, the Board shall promptly inform the Trust of such request, consult with the Trust regarding such request, and not take any action that, in the Trust's reasonable judgment, would impair the benefits to the Little Cimarron River and/or Cimarron River resulting from the Trust's Grant to the Board of the Water Rights and their change to add instream flow uses.

- 9. <u>Stream Gages</u>. Subject to the availability of funds, the Board shall be solely responsible for the installation and maintenance of any stream gages within the Instream Flow Reaches that are required by law or needed to exercise the instream flow uses added to the Water Rights. The Board shall consult with the Trust regarding the type, location, and other aspects of the gaging.
- 10. <u>Reserved Rights</u>. The Grant is subject to the following rights that are expressly reserved to the Trust:
 - a. the right to use the Water Rights for irrigation purposes pursuant to Section 4 above; and
 - b. the right to bring about, by sale, lease or otherwise, the beneficial use of the historical consumptive use of the Water Rights as fully consumable water downstream of the Instream Flow Reaches, pursuant to 37-92-102(3), C.R.S, subject to such terms and conditions as the Water Court deems necessary to prevent injury to vested water rights or decreed conditional water rights.
- 11. <u>Enforcement</u>. The Parties agree that the exclusive venue and jurisdiction of any action pertaining to the interpretation or enforcement of this Grant shall be in the District Court, Water Division No. 4, to the extent permitted by law. If jurisdiction or venue is not proper in the water court, it is agreed that the exclusive venue and jurisdiction of any action pertaining to the interpretation or enforcement of this Grant shall be in the District Court of Gunnison County, Colorado. Before commencing any action for enforcement of this Grant, the party alleging a breach shall notify the other party in writing of the alleged breach and the Parties shall make a good faith effort to resolve their differences through informal consultation. Specific performance shall be the exclusive remedy for failure of either party to comply with any provision of this Grant.
- 12. Right of First Refusal. In the event the Trust begins actively marketing the Water Rights, the Trust will give the CWCB notice within two (2) weeks of the commencement of such activity. The Trust hereby grants to the Board a right of first refusal to purchase all or a portion of the Water Rights in the event the Trust seeks to convey these interests to a third party. Upon receipt of an offer to purchase that the Trust may accept, the Trust shall give the Board at least one hundred twenty (120) days' notice of the Trust's intention to transfer or convey the Water Rights by delivering to the Board a bona fide written offer to purchase made by a third party.

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During the one hundred twenty (120) day notice period, the Board shall enjoy its right of first refusal, entitling it to purchase the Water Rights proposed for sale. If within one hundred twenty (120) days following notice by the Trust of the Trust's intention to sell the Water Rights, the Board chooses to exercise its right to purchase, the purchase price of the Water Rights shall be the fair market price of the Water Rights prevailing at the time of the offer. Provided that the Board notifies the Trust within one hundred twenty (120) day notice period of its intent to exercise its right to purchase, the Trust shall cooperate with the Board to allow sufficient time to complete the purchase of the Water Rights. In the event that the Board decides not to exercise its right to purchase the Water Rights offered for sale, the Trust shall be free to sell the Water Rights to the third party. In any sale to a third party, the Trust shall, as a part of that conveyance, require the third party purchaser to abide by the terms of this Grant.

We serve indigenous and rural communities through training, technical and financial assistance, and advocacy. RCAC is a significant drinking water and wastewater technical assistance provider in Colorado working under several state and federal grant programs.

RCAC currently supports over 50 rural water utilities in Colorado, many of which are on the western slope. Many of these rural communities are directly impacted by the Shoshone water right and are dependent on the Colorado River for their water security, which forms the basis for a thriving economy. For example, water treatment expenses are already rising for many communities supplied by the Colorado river that we have worked with, such as Palisade, and protecting this water right will help improve raw water quality for municipal utilities which already face many other rising costs and competing priorities & threats to their water services. Even more communities we have relationships with are directly and indirectly impacted by the sustained agricultural and recreational benefits all along the Colorado River mainstem and Grand Valley regions.

RCAC respectfully requests that the Colorado Water Conservation Board accept the Colorado River Water Conservation District's purchase of the senior and junior non-consumptive water rights associated with Shoshone Hydroelectric Facility. Greetings Colorado Water Conservation Board Members,

I am writing to express my support for inclusion of the Shoshone water rights into the Colorado Instream Flow Program, and urge Colorado Water Conservation Board members to accept the proposed acquisition.

I am a resident of Glenwood Springs, which is directly downstream of the Shoshone Power Plant in Glenwood Canyon. Our community and our neighbors upstream and downstream on the Colorado River depend on the Shoshone water right to maintain instream flows during the non-irrigation months of the year. These flows are essential for a healthy river ecosystem, fishery and riparian habitat.

I have a professional connection to the Shoshone water rights. In the 1980s and 1990s, I was the lead water reporter for *The Daily Sentinel*. In 1986, I reported that Denver Water had obtained a right of first refusal for the Shoshone water rights from what was then Public Service Co. of Colorado. ("Denver grabs Shoshone water," *The Daily Sentinel*, Oct. 12, 1986.) By uncovering this contract, *The Daily Sentinel* alerted residents and decision-makers in western Colorado to the risks of having this water right changed to benefit Denver Water. If exercised, it would have undoubtedly led to more transmountain diversions from the Colorado River basin.

Denver Water withdrew that right of first refusal in 2013 as part of a broader set of water-related compromises with the Colorado River District and other parties. That deal, however, sharpened the awareness of Western Slope of the risks to the flow regime if Xcel Energy were to retire the Shoshone hydropower plant. In the years since, motivated by those risks, the Colorado River District negotiated a purchase agreement with Xcel to acquire the water rights, with the intent of having the rights protected in perpetuity as part of the Colorado Instream Flow Program. Again, I urge the Colorado Water Conservation Board to accept the proposed acquisition.

While I fully support the concept of the Shoshone water rights purchase and protection within the Instream Flow Program, I am concerned about the financial transaction. The Colorado River District and many other Western Slope local governments and water districts have pledged millions of dollars from taxpayers and ratepayers to

finance this purchase. Additional funds are pending from the federal government. My concern is how Xcel Energy, a private, investor-owned utility, will use this \$99 million windfall.

I have been told that once the purchase is close to completion, Xcel must submit a plan to the Colorado Public Utilities Commission for its use of this money. It is worrisome to me that taxpayers and ratepayers across the Western Slope are not being given any information about how Xcel will use these funds, and whether any of this money will return to the Western Slope. Ideally, Xcel would direct these funds toward its Western Slope customers in the form of grid improvements, renewable energy projects and efficiency incentives for residential and commercial customers.

I recognize that oversight of Xcel's use of these funds is beyond the direct purview of the Colorado Water Conservation Board. However, the board holds an influential position in this proposed transaction. I urge board members to call on Xcel Energy to do the right thing when it receives the proceeds of the Shoshone purchase, namely, to re-invest those funds in Western Slope communities.



The Collbran Conservancy District strongly supports the inclusion of the Shoshone water rights through the State's instream Flow Program and urges the CWCB to accept the proposed acquisition.

Located in Mesa County, Collbran Conservancy District (CCD) provides irrigation water for over 19,000 irrigated acres and operates Vega Reservoir and the Southside Canal, which is owned by the Bureau of Reclamation as part of the Collbran Project. CCD recognizes the importance of the Shoshone water rights to the security and viability of Colorado's Western Slope and its agricultural industries that are dependent on a healthy, flowing Colorado River.

It is critical that the Shoshone water rights stay in the Colorado River. The Shoshone water rights collectively holds some of the largest, most senior nonconsumptive water rights in the Colorado River. These rights ensure essential water flows down the Colorado River's mainstem, providing vital ecosystem, habitat, and restoration benefits from the river's headwaters in Grand County to Grand Junction. While the CCD is not on the mainstream of the Colorado River, the absence of this water in the Colorado River would have substantial consequences that would go upstream of every tributary below the Shoshone power plant. The absence of this water in the river would cause a River Call earlier in the season. It could affect HUP beneficiaries and change the way irrigators have been operating for over a hundred years. It could and would cause depletion of Reservoir water storage in normal years to make up the difference, to complete dry-ups of land in dry years. The CCD believes that this would cause a reduction in groundwater and return flows that would have a compounding effect that would go the whole length of the Colorado River. These water rights are vital for agricultural, recreation, water wells, power production, and Municipal water storage in the Plateau Valley.

The CCD asks that the Colorado Water Conservation Board accept these flows into the State's instream Flow program and secure this vital protection for the Colorado River and the communities that rely on it.

Dear CWCB Board,

The Colorado Basin Roundtable strongly supports the Colorado Water Conservation Board's Acceptance of the proposed donation of the Shoshone Powerplant senior and junior water rights for instream flow purposes. Supporting this donation advances a long-standing, Tier 1 priority for the Roundtable. Specifically, Project-00988, Permanency of Shoshone Call Flows "recognizes that permanent management of the flow of the Colorado River that mimics the Shoshone Call is important to the Colorado River basin and the State of Colorado. Accordingly, the roundtable supports activities that promote the permanency of the Shoshone Call flows, including but not limited to West Slope acquisition of the Shoshone assets." The importance of Shoshone permanency was identified in both of the Colorado Basin Roundtable Basin Implementation Plans.

This priority aligns with the Colorado Basin Roundtable's Theme # 5, to <u>Assure dependable basin administration</u>, and in particular its goal to "Protect and defend maximum mainstem calls at Shoshone Hydroelectric Plant, senior Grand Valley irrigation diversions, and Green Mountain Reservoir beneficiaries." This also supports Theme # 1, <u>Protect and restore healthy streams, rivers, lakes, and riparian areas</u>, and in particular its goal to "Support and provide for high-quality river and stream recreational opportunities with appropriate flows."

Colorado River water users benefit greatly from Shoshone's flows, which provide vital environmental, economic, and community benefits both upstream and downstream from the hydroelectric plant. Shoshone's flows provide critical habitat to four fish listed under the Endangered Species Act in the 15-Mile Reach of the Colorado River. Without the exercise of the Shoshone call, the stretch of the Colorado River known as the 15-Mile Reach in and around Grand Junction would have significantly less flow during large periods of the year, especially in dry years, when Shoshone can contribute half of the flow in the 15-Mile Reach. All Colorado River water users rely upon the benefits of the Shoshone flows as a bedrock for the success of the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program and continued compliance with the Endangered Species Act (ESA), which provides compliance protections for over 1,250 projects in Colorado. In addition, Shoshone flows are one of the four identified long-term protection measures for the Upper Colorado River Wild and Scenic River Alternative Management Plan.

Shoshone flows support Colorado's \$11.9 billion agricultural economy through greater water security by preserving Green Mountain Reservoir's Historic User Pool (HUP) water supplies, supporting Endangered Species Act compliance, and creating higher water quality for irrigators up and down the mainstem. According to Colorado's Division of Water Resources, without Shoshone flows, the downstream Cameo call could be longer and deeper each year (up to 2,260 cfs vs. 1,950 cfs), triggering less opportunity for in-priority diversions, a greater frequency of April calls, and an insufficient replacement of supplies for some West Slope augmentation plans.



Colorado's robust recreational economy relies heavily on the Colorado River mainstem, with Shoshone flows strengthening the state's iconic river recreation industry throughout Grand, Summit, Eagle, Garfield, and Mesa counties. River recreation in Colorado contributes \$14.6 billion annually to the state's GDP, with nearly \$4 billion coming directly from the Colorado River basin on the Western Slope. As temperatures rise and streams diminish, Shoshone permanency provides security for this economic industry, protecting the recreational fishery and boating that sustain local businesses and attract water-based recreators.

Communities large and small along the Colorado River mainstem benefit from the enhanced water quality Shoshone flows provide, distilling pollutants in the source drinking water for towns like New Castle, Rifle, Palisade, Clifton, and the greater Grand Junction area served by Ute Water Conservancy District. Without the higher flows of clean and cold headwater sourced supplies provided by the Shoshone call, a higher pollutant concentration creates increased costs for municipal drinking and wastewater treatment.

For more than 20 years, the Colorado River District and 19 other western Colorado governments and water entities, including Summit, Grand, Eagle, Garfield, and Mesa Counties and many of the municipalities and major water organizations therein, have been working together to find a way to permanently preserve the Shoshone flows. Since the time the Colorado River District successfully contracted for the purchase of the Shoshone water rights, even more entities have stepped up and committed funds to the purchase price. We are now on the cusp of the unprecedented alignment of multiple factors that present a real opportunity to finalize this long-standing goal. The Colorado Basin Roundtable strongly supports this effort.

This public comment conveys my support for the inclusion of the Shoshone Water Rights through the State of Colorado's Instream Flow Program. I strongly urge the CWCB to accept the proposed acquisition in its full amount, for the reasons stated below.

My name is Michael Gheleta, a currently retired water attorney and avid whitewater boater for nearly 50 years. Upon moving to Colorado in 1984 to attend law school, one of the first stretches of river I boated was the Colorado River through Glenwood Canyon below the Shoshone Power Plant. I have floated this stretch numerous times in the years since, in both a raft and inflatable kayak. And last weekend, over 40 years later, I once again enjoyed guiding a raft down this stretch, enjoying the challenging yet manageable river flows close to the level of the 1,408 cfs water right possessed by the Shoshone Power Plant. During this latest float, I observed dozens of other rafts, kayaks and other water craft, all floating this stretch of river supported by the outflows of the Shoshone Power Plant, which I took the time to observe closely flowing into the river below the Plant.

The flows entering the Colorado River from the Shoshone Power Plant under its water right are crucial to support recreation and the environment in this stretch of the Colorado River. During my rafting experience, I observed others fishing, including one gentleman who landed a trout just below the Power Plant inflow that appeared to approach two feet long and three pounds. From the perspective of whitewater rafting, the full range of flows available under the water right – low, medium, and high – are needed to support different types of rafting experiences. At this time of year in late August, this stretch of river is one of the only ones with sufficient water to enjoy the recreational rafting experience, due to the Shoshone Power Plant outflows continuing to flow down the river. That water used non-consumptively continues to flow further down the West Slope, supporting agriculture, recreation, the environment, communities, and the overall state economy. Such multiple beneficial uses should be protected and continued into the future.

Accordingly, I strongly support the CWCB's acceptance of these flows into the State of Colorado's instream flow program, at the full amount of this 1905 water right and maximum historic use made for over 100 years. I have worked on water rights issues under federal and state law over several decades as a water attorney in the federal government, private practice, and non-profit environmental organizations. It is

refreshing to see Colorado state law, implemented through the State's instream flow program, utilized to protect vital flows in the Colorado River and support communities relying on them. Supporting inclusion of this water right in the State's program at its full amount is a logical and important continuing evolution of this program.

Dear Colorado Water Conservation Board,

On behalf of Greeley of Greeley Water Utilities, I write in support of the proposed acquisition by the Colorado Water Conservation Board ("CWCB") of an interest in the Shoshone Hydropower Water Rights for instream flow use on the Colorado River. The water resources from the Upper Colorado River play a very important role in Greeley's municipal water supply portfolio and they are an essential resource that supplements South Platte mainstem and tributary resources to generate a robust food and fiber economy in Weld County and beyond. The City of Greeley is a vested stakeholder in Upper Colorado River water through a couple of long-standing investments in the Colorado-Big Thompson and Windy Gap projects, and a portfolio of irrigation company shares that contain Grand Ditch water resources that work as an integrated portfolio of water resources to meet the needs of Greeley, its residents and our value added industrial users. Greeley's public comments herein are rooted in the fact that Shoshone Water Rights are an important and consequential water right throughout the state, including to water users and communities in Weld County and the South Platte River Basin.

Greeley's Water & Sewer Utilities Board and staff aim to be well informed, engaged and effective collaborators on intrastate and interstate Colorado River issues. While we support the proposed acquisition and change of use for the Shoshone rights to facilitate instream flow use, our support is predicated on a fair and representative assessment of the historical use period of record, and terms of agreement that generate benefit for all Coloradoans. To maintain the status quo administration for water users within Colorado, the instream flow agreement and change decree should accurately reflect the historic flow regime and DWR administration on the River. The long-standing administration and operational agreements around Shoshone have been beneficial for Front Range and Western Slope water users, and that status quo operation supports Colorado's stewardship and maximization of benefit from the River's water resources within the framework provided for under the 1922 compact. Greeley strongly recommends that CWCB only move forward with an instream flow agreement that prioritizes and protects communities, agriculture, recreation and environmental interests on both the West and East slopes of Colorado.

The Colorado River District ("River District") and Public Service Company of Colorado ("PSCo") indicate that they have proposed to maintain the water rights administration status quo. However, the proposed methodology for determining the historical use of the Shoshone Water

Rights will, in our professional opinion, likely result in an expansion of historic use. Most water interests have become aware of the Shoshone powerplant's operational challenges and less than full operations over the decades. Sound cooperative operating agreements have been built around actual water use in the current period of record, so to claim the full decreed rights, year round, would lead to a real expansion of use and thereby have water rights administration impacts to various tributary river system on both sides of the divide. As the CWCB Board weighs their role and duties in advance of entering into the proposed Agreement, we ask for their thoughtful consideration of the equity for water user communities who have come to rely upon agreements and status quo protective policies. Further, we ask that CWCB staff and Board consider and document how the proposed agreement and acquisition conform to CWCB ISF Rule 6e.

Lastly, the Shoshone Outage Protocol Agreement dated June 27, 2016 ("ShOP Agreement") reflected a real compromise among major transmountain diverters and Western Slope entities. The ShOP Agreement established a "virtual call" for water rights administrative purposes that has guided the agreed upon status quo administration. The ShOP Agreement was suitable for all parties at the time and widely considered to strike a fair balance between diversion for storage and maintenance of flows. The acquisition of an interest in the Shoshone Water Rights by CWCB and subsequent water court filing should better reflect the regime maintained by the ShOP Agreement. As we go forward, we conjecture that what is best for all Coloradoans and for Greeley is something that looks a lot like the last 30 years of water rights administration that sought to make a shared best use of the finite Colorado River water resources that we need and value on both sides of the divide.

The City of Greeley and our Northeast Colorado agricultural neighbors have a great respect for the value of upper Colorado River water and our ancestorial connection to Delph Carpenter and the wisdom applied to the Colorado River's framework for administration. Greeley authentically appreciates the value and resiliency that upper Colorado River supplies add to our community, our regional agricultural production, and environmental and recreational non-consumptive uses. Greeley encourages agreements that maintain water administration that is consistent with the past 30 years status quo and protective of the related benefits realized by all parties. Please hear and understand that Greeley advocates herein as a proactive water utility with certain vested rights, as a Colorado community and as a regional hub of robust agriculture; and we not advocating for more water than historically received from upper Colorado River rights, but we are asking that the proposed agreements and decree not leave us with a less reliable water supply or cause stranded investments in water utility infrastructure. Accordingly, Greeley strongly urges CWCB to reevaluate the historical use analysis proposed by the River District and amend the currently proposed Draft Dedication and ISF Agreement to reflect a reasonable historic use analysis prior to approving the acquisition of an interest in the Shoshone Water Rights.

We urge the CWCB to accept this once-in-a-lifetime, stabilizing proposal to permanently preserve the historical flow regime of the mainstem of the Colorado River on which water users and the environment on both sides of the Continental Divide depend. West Divide believes the Shoshone water rights will preserve and improve the natural environment of the Shoshone Reach to a reasonable degree and therefore meets the letter and spirit of the instream flow acquisition statute.

Dear Members of the Colorado Water Conservation Board,

The White River and Douglas Creek Conservation Districts (the Districts) are political subdivisions of the State of Colorado, made up of locally elected officials whose special expertise is to provide leadership in the wise use of the natural resources within the Districts' boundaries. The Districts' authorities, power, and structure are contained in the Colorado Revised Statutes, Title 35, Article 70.

As local governments under Colorado law, the Districts are charged with representing the interests of local landowners in land and natural resource decision-making. In fulfillment of this role, the Districts—alongside Rio Blanco County—developed the Rio Blanco County Land and Natural Resource Use Plan and Policies (LNRUPP). This plan expresses the locally developed policy framework that guides our coordination with state and federal agencies and reflects the values, needs, and priorities of our communities. One of our statutory responsibilities is "to prepare a plan for the care, treatment, and operation of the lands within the district." (Colo. Rev. Stat. § 35-70-108(1)(k)).

The LNRUPP affirms that local communities must have a strong voice in water policy decisions that affect their long-term economic, environmental, and cultural sustainability. As such, the Districts submit the following comments in strong support of permanently protecting the **Shoshone Water Right**:

- Downstream Benefits for Agriculture and Livelihoods: The Shoshone right has ensured consistent, year-round flows in the Colorado River for over a century, helping maintain water availability for downstream users, including agricultural producers in Rio Blanco County. These producers rely on predictable flows for hay production, livestock, and irrigation infrastructure. The LNRUPP prioritizes sustainable agricultural use of water and opposes water decisions that threaten long-term land productivity and rural economies (LNRUPP Section 4.12.4).
- Protecting the White River and Tributary Health: Though the Shoshone right is not located within Rio Blanco
 County, decisions affecting its status impact the entire Yampa-White-Green Basin, including our tributaries.
 Maintaining flow stability improves aquifer recharge, water quality, aquatic habitat, and local watershed
 function—directly aligning with the LNRUPP's emphasis on interconnected watershed health and coordinated,
 basin-wide water management (LNRUPP Section 4.13.2).
- Water Security as Economic Security: In rural counties like Rio Blanco, water security is a linchpin of economic resilience. The LNRUPP highlights that water use tied to agriculture, energy production, and recreation is critical to maintaining local employment, tax revenue, and infrastructure (LNRUPP Section 4.13.3). The loss of the

Purpose: To make available technical, financial, and educational resources, whatever their source, and focus or coordinate them so that they meet the needs of the local land manager with conservation of soil, water, and related natural resources.



Promoting the wise use of all natural resources

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Shoshone right would threaten vital operations in the **Piceance Basin**, disrupt energy production, and jeopardize private investments dependent on reliable water access.

- Opposition to Trans basin Diversions and Out-of-Basin Transfers: The LNRUPP clearly opposes transmountain
 and out-of-basin diversions that undermine the long-term viability of local communities and ecosystems. A
 permanent, non-consumptive Shoshone right ensures that senior water stays in the Western Slope, preventing
 junior Front Range demands from undermining established, beneficial, and locally guided water use (LNRUPP
 Section 4.13.4).
- Local Policy Backing for Water Protection: The LNRUPP states that the Districts: "oppose any action, lack of action, or permitted use that results in a significant or long-term decrease in water quality or quantity."
 (LNRUPP, Section 4.13.2, p. 88). If the Shoshone right is not protected, Western Slope water users face direct threats to flow reliability, agricultural viability, energy operations, and aquatic species conservation.

Furthermore, the potential loss of this right would reverberate in **Upper and Lower Basin Compact negotiations**. In an already over-allocated system, the stability offered by Shoshone's senior, non-consumptive status is vital for reducing legal uncertainty and supporting **collaborative**, **science-based** solutions.

We also underscore the **local financial commitment** to this issue: over \$57 million has been raised by counties, water users, and municipalities to protect the Shoshone Water Right, reflecting widespread, grassroots support.

In closing, we thank the Colorado Water Conservation Board for the opportunity to comment and **strongly urge the Board to permanently protect the Shoshone Water Right.** Doing so aligns with both state goals and locally adopted land and water policies that safeguard the economic, ecological, and cultural health of Rio Blanco County and the broader Western Slope.

Dear Colorado Water Conservation Board,

On behalf of Greeley of Greeley Water Utilities, I write in support of the proposed acquisition by the Colorado Water Conservation Board ("CWCB") of an interest in the Shoshone Hydropower Water Rights for instream flow use on the Colorado River. The water resources from the Upper Colorado River play a very important role in Greeley's municipal water supply portfolio and they are an essential resource that supplements South Platte mainstem and tributary resources to generate a robust food and fiber economy in Weld County and beyond. The City of Greeley is a vested stakeholder in Upper Colorado River water through a couple of long-standing investments in the Colorado-Big Thompson and Windy Gap projects, and a portfolio of irrigation company shares that contain Grand Ditch water resources that work as an integrated portfolio of water resources to meet the needs of Greeley, its residents and our value added industrial users. Greeley's public comments herein are rooted in the fact that Shoshone Water Rights are an important and consequential water right throughout the state, including to water users and communities in Weld County and the South Platte River Basin.

Greeley's Water & Sewer Utilities Board and staff aim to be well informed, engaged and effective collaborators on intrastate and interstate Colorado River issues. While we support the proposed acquisition and change of use for the Shoshone rights to facilitate instream flow use, our support is predicated on a fair and representative assessment of the historical use period of record, and terms of agreement that generate benefit for all Coloradoans. To maintain the status quo administration for water users within Colorado, the instream flow agreement and change decree should accurately reflect the historic flow regime and DWR administration on the River. The long-standing administration and operational agreements around Shoshone have been beneficial for Front Range and Western Slope water users, and that status quo operation supports Colorado's stewardship and maximization of benefit from the River's water resources within the framework provided for under the 1922 compact. Greeley strongly recommends that CWCB only move forward with an instream flow agreement that prioritizes and protects communities, agriculture, recreation and environmental interests on both the West and East slopes of Colorado.

The Colorado River District ("River District") and Public Service Company of Colorado ("PSCo") indicate that they have proposed to maintain the water rights administration status quo. However, the proposed methodology for determining the historical use of the Shoshone Water

Rights will, in our professional opinion, likely result in an expansion of historic use. Most water interests have become aware of the Shoshone powerplant's operational challenges and less than full operations over the decades. Sound cooperative operating agreements have been built around actual water use in the current period of record, so to claim the full decreed rights, year round, would lead to a real expansion of use and thereby have water rights administration impacts to various tributary river system on both sides of the divide. As the CWCB Board weighs their role and duties in advance of entering into the proposed Agreement, we ask for their thoughtful consideration of the equity for water user communities who have come to rely upon agreements and status quo protective policies. Further, we ask that CWCB staff and Board consider and document how the proposed agreement and acquisition conform to CWCB ISF Rule 6e.

Lastly, the Shoshone Outage Protocol Agreement dated June 27, 2016 ("ShOP Agreement") reflected a real compromise among major transmountain diverters and Western Slope entities. The ShOP Agreement established a "virtual call" for water rights administrative purposes that has guided the agreed upon status quo administration. The ShOP Agreement was suitable for all parties at the time and widely considered to strike a fair balance between diversion for storage and maintenance of flows. The acquisition of an interest in the Shoshone Water Rights by CWCB and subsequent water court filing should better reflect the regime maintained by the ShOP Agreement. As we go forward, we conjecture that what is best for all Coloradoans and for Greeley is something that looks a lot like the last 30 years of water rights administration that sought to make a shared best use of the finite Colorado River water resources that we need and value on both sides of the divide.

The City of Greeley and our Northeast Colorado agricultural neighbors have a great respect for the value of upper Colorado River water and our ancestorial connection to Delph Carpenter and the wisdom applied to the Colorado River's framework for administration. Greeley authentically appreciates the value and resiliency that upper Colorado River supplies add to our community, our regional agricultural production, and environmental and recreational non-consumptive uses. Greeley encourages agreements that maintain water administration that is consistent with the past 30 years status quo and protective of the related benefits realized by all parties. Please hear and understand that Greeley advocates herein as a proactive water utility with certain vested rights, as a Colorado community and as a regional hub of robust agriculture; and we not advocating for more water than historically received from upper Colorado River rights, but we are asking that the proposed agreements and decree not leave us with a less reliable water supply or cause stranded investments in water utility infrastructure. Accordingly, Greeley strongly urges CWCB to reevaluate the historical use analysis proposed by the River District and amend the currently proposed Draft Dedication and ISF Agreement to reflect a reasonable historic use analysis prior to approving the acquisition of an interest in the Shoshone Water Rights.
